Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: Calls the July 12, 2023, Regular Commission Meeting to order at 9:03 AM.

Janice Barela – Madam County Manager: I have the honor of recognizing Sharaya Medina, who has been with us for two years. This goes back to her starting off as a summer intern through the program that we have through the Public Education Department. She was hired as a float clerk and was working here at the county after she graduated from high school, Sharaya was hired at the Sheriff's Office. We are so honored to have her on staff here. She's a hard worker. She has excellent customer service skills and is a team player, we enjoy interacting with her every day. It's nice to see our youth from within our community decide to stay here and become active in local government, and to see her invest here and want to be here.

6. PUBLIC COMMENT and COMMUNICATIONS

Patrick Riley & Marcie Wallin – Torrance County Fair Board:

Patrick Riley: The reason we wanted to address the commission is to discuss and voice our concerns over the unfinished kitchen in the fairgrounds building.

Marcie Wallin: When it was set into motion that there was a grant for the repair of the kitchen, I was at the meeting and voiced concern over the two-month time to accomplish the big feat of getting the kitchen redone. It was also expressed that the deadline to receive the funding for that grant was June 30th. The equipment is all over in the fair building, it's in the flower areas in the main hall and the kitchen is in total disrepair.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: I reached out to the contractor; he assures me that it will be ready before the fair and a useable kitchen before the fair. Right now they have all that equipment stored in there. They're going to be sheet rocking, and will be moving that equipment in. I understand that the Fair Board would like to set up and want to set up indoor exhibits this weekend. Correct?

Marcie Wallin: That was our initial plan. I also met with Mr. White, the project manager, and he did say that there's a function going on, on the 22nd. So the plan is to hopefully have it accessible to whoever rented that building. He did comment that they may have to move all that equipment off site, to be able to use the fair building. He stated that the kitchen may not be up and running for the fair. That does present another problem for each group that is planning on using the facility. Today his words were "in all probability". He did state that this equipment and stuff may be ready but it's pending inspections, and then after that the Environment Department has to come and inspect before each group would be allowed to use it. 4H doesn't want to purchase the food that they need ahead of time, if they can't use it, because there's no returning it. There was also a comment as to why didn't the FFA run the concession as they have throughout the years. They were all offered but denied the ability to run the concession stand because school has already started don't have the manpower. Food trucks were a good idea but too expensive and there were a lot of complaints from the exhibitors that they couldn't afford the food.

Patrick Riley: One of the main things we wanted to address is if it's not completed by July 23rd, we won't have ample time to set up all the indoor exhibits, because July 27th is our last cleanup day. That would be our last day that we would have parents, 4H members, and FFA exhibitors help with not only any cleanup that needed to be done in the building, but also moving around of cases and setting up for the indoor exhibits.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: I'm told it takes about five hours to set up indoor?

Marcie Wallin: It's strategic with the amount of equipment we have in there. It takes a long time; the manager of the indoor exhibits is very particular about it looking nice. So it needs to be cleaned and mopped. All the exhibits need wiped down exhibit pieces need to be put out.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: Indoor exhibits come in August 8th?

Marcie Wallin: Yes. We don't want to wait till August 7th to set it up. We've had to do that one year, it was unacceptable. July 23rd would be acceptable.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: I don't know if I can guarantee July 23rd, but I will talk to the contractors and see what we can do. Is there any flexibility after July 23rd?

Marcie Wallin: July 25th, we keep giving extensions, we are going to have to work with you, and the contractor to get it done.

Patrick Riley: With two of the schools in the county starting the week of the first or teachers and students being back to school that week, the week prior to August 1st, is really the last time they would have the manpower and flexibility.

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: I'm willing to work with you and work with the contractor to get the exhibit hall cleared out so that you can begin, even if he's not done with the kitchen. We can resolve that problem very easily. I'm willing to work with the board as well, in coming up with Plan B if the kitchen is not finished and not inspected and certified. And apparently you have a plan B?

Patrick Riley: Yes, a possible plan B is if the county would be willing to help us fund a kitchen trailer for the Desperados and for each group that has volunteered to do the concession, it will have refrigeration and a place to cook hamburgers, hot dogs, etc. Assuming the kitchen is not up and ready to serve.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: I need to visit with the contractors. I need hard dates for the fair. That's two weeks prior to before exhibitors get in. That's a hard date. That's what we have to go by. I can't make any guarantees. If we have some wiggle room and extra weight there may be a difference. If we can set that back, what does that involve? What kind of help does the fair need, in order to get the exhibitors up and ready?

Patrick Riley: If we are pushed back past the week of the 25th - 28th, then we would need some manpower to just help move.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: After July 23rd, it is a manpower issue, is that correct?

Patrick Riley: Correct.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: So I think we can probably accommodate that. I will open up a door to communication with a contractor, we'll see where they are at and make a timeline on what's coming so you can plan ahead and make this work.

Patrick Riley: At the next commissioners meeting, would that be an appropriate time to come back for a contingency plan?

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: We will have a contingency plan.

Marcie Wallin: Would it be possible at that meeting to have somebody from the county finding out about the portable kitchen? Who's going to pay for it and what group is trying to plan and purchase food.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: We can look into it. I would encourage you guys to make phone calls also. I understand the Fair Board is very nervous, and a little anxious and rightfully so. But it's going to happen.

Marcie Wallin: If we look into the price and come back, can it be put on the next Commission meeting agenda so the Commission could act on it if it's not completed by that date?

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: Yes, let's put it on the agenda.

Don Dirks-County Fire Chief: I was going to address today all of what we're doing but it pales in comparison with the number of traffic accidents we've had in the county in the last three weeks. Just yesterday, there were five separate accidents involving multiple vehicles requiring extrication and med flights, everything just in the Clines Corners area. There was also a wreck on the overpass in Moriarty and a wreck between Edgewood and Moriarty. I would caution everybody please pay attention when you're driving, slow down. We've got people driving way too fast on some of these roads. It's unbelievable the amount of damage from all these accidents. Time involved in hospitalizations and ambulances. Please be careful on the roads!

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: A training opportunity came across my email the other day regarding using the jaws of life, extrication on electric vehicles, hybrid vehicles and high voltage dangers. Have you heard about it?

Don Dirks-County Fire Chief: Yes, I'm aware.

Ann Schropp – Torrance County Resident: Let's pretend that Torrance County won a magnificent lottery. We've got new buildings, we've got emergency equipment, fire equipment, operational, everything. But there's a catch. We can't change anything in our management or personnel. Salaries don't change and workload doesn't change. All of that equipment, all of those facilities are absolutely useless, worthless, without quality, motivated people to work. You don't get quality motivated people with poor pay, and poor work conditions. That has to change. Every two weeks, three wealthy men sit in this room and make decisions that greatly affect and impact over 15,000 citizens in this county and 125 employees of this county. Having that kind of power shouldn't be an exciting or heady thing. It would be very humbling and even scary to realize that with a simple yea or nay, you are improving the lives of other humans or not. Two weeks ago, I sang the praises of this commission for its work on that marathon budget meeting in May. The commissioners agreed to moderate pay raises and cost of living. To bring our county a little closer to competitive rates. New hires were approved to ease the workload into overworked departments, improvements in personnel, facilities, and training, which bring our county up to state and federal requirements. All of that was accomplished, staying within budget. This county is dying on the vine. There are issues outside our control that we can't do anything about. They make thriving and even surviving in this county more difficult. The major reason we're falling behind is lack of attention to the humanity of good governance. Thank you.

Linda Jaramillo-County Clerk: I received an email yesterday about four o'clock. So I took it upon myself to fix the minutes by listening to the audio and I entered everything that was said, as per request of Commissioner Schropp. I'm asking everybody that has any corrections to get them to us in a timely manner for the corrections to be made. We send them out to all the different departments in the county, when they are complete, for their review and corrections if necessary.

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: The corrections were concerning the fire suppression system at the McIntosh Fire station, and how Chief Dirks was not getting definitive guidance from any of the state regulatory agencies. I asked Chief Dirks for his professional opinion as to whether or not that facility was safe for our firefighters to be sleeping in, he answered in the affirmative. That was very important to have that included in the minutes, because we're going to move forward with other projects, and we needed this in the record to establish why we're doing it.

Donald Goen-County P & Z Director: Included in your packet is the application and the minutes with the findings from the Planning & Zoning Board. This is to finalize the process so that they can move forward with the development of this RV park. The location was at the former Cattle Country Estates where there's power and water already there. They've been proactive with the State Environmental Department. Included in that was also the Petroleum Storage Tank Bureau with the state, everything's in order. This is one of the best thought out applications that I've seen. Carol Ansley is available for questions.

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: I'm in favor of this project. The county needs the gross revenue tax and the money that this would bring in. This project owns 44.25 acre feet of water, ample water, and the footprint of this development will be used by people who constantly come up with concerns about developing in this county and water use. The footprint of this piece of property will use less water than a comparable acreage raising alfalfa or corn silage. While this will be a development which uses water, it will be using less water than a domestic development because of the nature of an RV park. We need to start weaning ourselves away from the Torrance County Detention Facility, this is a step in that direction. So with those things said I'm in favor of approving the special usage.

Dan DeCosta-P & Z Code Enforcement: We are here for four different considerations of resolutions for county cleanup and lien. The first one is going to be for cleaning lot D-106 Echo Ridge Subdivision on Massachusetts Court. There's pictures in your packet of what needs to be cleaned up and there's a deed of ownership. We have not been able to contact them. The taxes are partially paid as I recall. It's been here since I started 13 years ago. I've tried to contact the owners on different occasions, and I've never had any luck.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: To explain the process, Planning and Zoning has attempted to contact the landowners with notice when there's been no attempt to clean it up or pay their taxes. We're assuming that's okay for recovery at this point. Within our ordinance, we have the ability to proceed with cleaning up the property. The county goes in there cleans up the property, a lien is placed to recoup the money. At any time the landowner could come up and pay the bill. If they don't show up. What is the timeframe?

Dan DeCosta-P & Z Code Enforcement: We have some that have been on for years. So unless they go to auction, which they could, then the state could auction them off and that would be part of the price, starting base for what they auctioned it off for. We haven't seen that happen on a lot of them, but we have a few of them paid off over the years. It's within the state statute that allows the county to do this. It's 30-18-5, dangerous buildings and debris. That's where the authority comes through is through state statute, basically it's kind of like a condemnation of the property. We go in and clean it, and then that gives us the authority to lien it afterwards.

Juan Torres-Deputy County Manager: You also have one other option available for liens that are outstanding, to foreclose the lien and that will be a decision of the Commission directing legal to start that process. What that will do is legally force the sale of the property. So it is almost like creating an auction for it. It's one of those if it goes to auction, no more purchases, then the property becomes Torrance County's.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: This is something I would like to discuss further at a later date, I am concerned about what we have in front of us.

is alive. It's doubtful that she has the means to do anything about it. Right now she has an arrest warrant. When we were supposed to go to trial she took off. If she gets picked up and we get her into court. We can try to get as much out of her as we can but the chance that that's actually going to happen could be slim. She hasn't paid taxes in years. She got the property from her father who died, and she lived in it for years.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: So where's that funding? What do you estimate these four projects are going to come in at?

Dan DeCosta-P & Z Code Enforcement: From right now our fund is somewhere about \$47,000. When we were doing these before, we were doing them a little bit differently. It used to cost us anywhere from \$4,000 to \$6,000. I am estimating that right now, that probably be \$6,000 to \$8,000. We're not going to know that until we actually do this. We're going to use the road department on this. They're going to do it on their days off. We did one a couple of years ago, where we used the road department. We used to use a private contractor, and we also had an MOU with Estancia Valley Solid Waste, they were hiring a contractor and we are just paying them but now we are using the Road Department.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: So based on that I will direct our attorney to get with Mr. Torres and see what it takes to push in these projects to where we can continue to push forward. These are not the only four that need cleaning.

Dan DeCosta-P & Z Code Enforcement: I've got a list. This is just this list I did a couple of years ago, 25-30 properties. When the fire happened in Echo Ridge, we went through and hit a lot of them. Out of the all the ones that we put notices on we've got a few people that we actually were able to contact. We are looking at another one over on Ice Plant Rd. that we gave a NOV, that guy is selling the

property and there's a real estate company that's coming in to buy it. We think that one is going to get cleaned up. We do hit some that get cleaned up. As of 2016-2017, We've cleaned up over 125 mobile homes since 2010. I stopped counting after that. We have been successful. Doesn't always look it but there's a lot of stuff that's got done, we have done it through the courts, through grants that we got through New Mexico Environment Department and county funds that we've had. It's a long process, finding the people, getting them into court. Sometimes it takes a year or two.

Noah Sedillo-County Finance Director: You approved in the budget \$150,000 for cleanup this year.

E. CLERK: Resolution 2023-21 Designating polling places and locations for all statewide elections conducted in 2024 and 2025.

Linda Jaramillo-County Clerk: According to statute 1-3-2, precinct duties of County Commissioners, For the conduct of statewide elections during the period beginning January 1 of the next succeeding even numbered year until December 31 of the odd numbered year thereafter, in June or July of each odd numbered year the Board of County Commissioners shall by resolution designate the polling place of each precinct that shall provide individuals with physical mobility limitations and unobstructed access to at least one voting machine consolidate any precincts pursuant to section 1-3-4, designate any mail ballot election precinct pursuant to section 1-6-22.1, create additional polling places in existing precincts pursuant to section 1-3-7.1.

This is in conjunction with the correspondence we sent out to the departments from my department. I want to thank Toni Lowery, our purchasing director. This is a hard process to learn. She's done very well. So thank you, Toni. With that being said, this is the final compilation as of June 30, that the county has booked for our FY 23 assets. This is state statute required. Furthermore, this is also encompassed in our annual fiscal audit every year. We had no deletions, but we did have additions. With that, there is a letter for the chairman to sign if you so approve.

- B. COMMISSION:** Submission of proposal to Planning & Zoning Board to remove D-3 zone designation from Parcels R030279, R026580, R017643, R016832, R020735 and R026581, located north and south of Exit 203 and designate as D-2. (Commissioner Schwebach)

Michael I. Garcia-County Attorney: When we talk about zone changes in New Mexico land use law, they have a very specific process that has to be observed it is called a quasi-judicial process. It means that the Commission involved are almost like judges in this particular kind of case. Legislators or in your circumstance, administrators, when it comes to a quasi-judicial process, presumes you're like judges in a courtroom, and the only thing that you can take into account when you're making a decision is the law that you're applying and the facts that are before you in the present case. Things that you may have heard or things that you may even know on your own, are not things that you necessarily inject into your decision. Another thing that is critical about a quasi-judicial process is that take for example, if you were a judge in a criminal matters, and the defendant wanted to talk to you, you could not talk to that party about the case outside of the courtroom.

It's called in legal terminology, ex parte. So it's one of those things that can actually be dangerous to process or cause problems or result in recusals. Another thing, if there's a personal interest or a family interest or financial interest in the outcome of the case, then those are things that need to be disclosed publicly, or else the individual decider would need to recuse himself from the case. In this particular case, because it deals with a particular parcel of land, it's going to be a quasi-judicial case. New Mexico land use law seems to have caused more problems in my experience than just about any other thing that governments do in terms of dollars in damages that can be awarded, if it's not done properly.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: We're deciding whether or not we're going to present this Planning & Zoning change to the Planning Zoning Commission, essentially, we're going to turn it over to Planning & Zoning to review this.

I have no personal family or financial interest. In this case, I was approached to try this process and move forward. So now I'd like to turn it over to Planning and Zoning.

Donald Goen-County P & Z Director: I was approached about this about two months ago. I was getting a lot of unconnected, and conflicting information. Through the course of the research, The D3 zone first appeared in the ordinance as a revision that was done in 2009. Prior to that, to see how that came about, for the determination of the locations of the D3 zones, I did speak with Mr. Harlan Lawson, who was on the Long-Range Planning Committee at that time and had direct involvement in the discussions that took place on this. I also spoke with Mr. Dennis Wallin, the former county attorney, to try and get some background, because there were implications that there may be federal law involved with the establishment of these districts. Mainly where that applied was first amendment rights for freedom of expression. Looking at it from that aspect, this can be done, you can't just legislate out the ability for the D3 zones, the people who have the adult entertainment establishments. There are several other locations down the I-40 corridor. D3 zones will still be available within the county if somebody was to choose to engage in this type of activity. The main difference between the D3 and the D2 is that while everything that's allowed in the D2 is also allowed in a D3. It's just the addition of the adult entertainment. It was Mrs. Ansley's and others' desire to address this issue. There are two more parcels that are currently owned by Sheradon LLC. They had obtained a conditional use permit for a truck stop where the old 203 club was. They have gone in and done all the environmental cleanup, and they've made a lot of preparations. I did speak directly with the principal of that company. When they got their conditional use was when all the COVID hit.

They had a delay because of materials, contractors, etc. They are in full intention of proceeding or moving forward with the development. One concern was the change of zoning affecting that conditional use. I did provide him with a letter stating that it would have no effect on that conditional use, they would still be able to have a truck stop there. He was fully in support of this. One of the parcels is owned by Longhorn Holdings, Mr. Terry White, and I contacted him via email, he responded in full support. So we have three main property owners, Donny and Carol Ansley, Sheradon LLC, and the Longhorn Holdings, and all three of the respective property owners are in full support of this. They all like to see this converted just straight over to D2, to prevent that type of business from coming back into this location at a future date.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: How many other property owners are there?

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner:

Donald Goen-County P & Z Director: A total of three applying for a zone change or an amendment to ordinance falls under the same section. Procedurally, this is what it states in the ordinance. One of the avenues that they have is for the Commission to submit it and send this back to the Planning and Zoning Board for review. The other option that an applicant would have, and it applies to either one of those is an amendment to the ordinance or to the zone change instead of bringing it from the top back down, is to bring it from the bottom up. One of the differences here are the application fees, another one of the main impacts is the timeframe for resolute for final determination on the issue.

Michael I. Garcia-County Attorney: In Section 24A, county zoning code, it says the County Commission may amend any part of this ordinance, including the zoning district boundaries, the County Commission may elect to submit a proposal for amendment to the Zoning Board for review and recommendation by the Zoning Board. There's two other avenues, you can get a direct application from the applicant, or the Board of Commissioners can direct the Planning and Zoning Board to entertain the zone change.

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: In the commission, sending it back for review will the same application fees apply?

Donald Goen-County P & Z Director: No, sir, they will not.

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: First off, I'm not in favor of taking this avenue and circumventing the normal process. Secondly, I look at application fees as a type of user fee, which helps defer some of the costs to the county of the

diligent work that Don Goen and his staff have done. Mr. Goen says that the timeline will be approximately the same. I don't think this will put a burden on the landowners. I'm not opposed to what they want to do. I'm opposed to the process which they are proposing.

D. FIRE: Request approval for reclassification of one Firefighter/EMT position to an EMS Lieutenant.

Don Dirks-County Fire Chief: This is also a carryover from the last meeting, we discussed and was directed to discuss this with the County Manager as to what we were asking, this is going back towards our original plan. To change one of the positions, we're not adding or removing a position. We have more people hired and added a third shift. We're asking for that one position to be made back into a lieutenant position.

Janice Barela – Madam County Manager: I did visit with Chief Dirks and Deputy Chief Sanchez on this issue. I am in agreement that this would be something that would be good for the department. I think having that oversight for that shift as well as the others would be in the best interest of the department and also the county. As far as the amount of money that this will require for the budget, we already have each one of the EMT positions, salaries set as if a paramedic were to come into that position. That's the amount in the budget. In order for a person to come in as an EMS Lieutenant., it's just one more dollar per hour added to their

salary versus if they were just an EMT firefighter. We would be adding \$1 per hour more to the budget. Funds that the Chief has already been encompassing, we wouldn't have to worry about where that money would come from, it's able to absorb. That's assuming that the EMT Lieutenant is at a paramedic level. If we end up hiring one that's intermediate, then we're at the salary that it currently is, as an EMT Firefighter.

Action Taken:

Kevin McCall – County Vice Chairman: Motion to approve request approval for reclassification of one Firefighter/EMT position to an EMS Lieutenant.

E. EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT: Acceptance of 2023 Emergency Management Performance Grant in the amount of \$38,770.50.

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: We received the acceptance for our Emergency Management Performance Grant the EMPG grant in the amount of \$38,770.50. However, we had requested a grant for the amount of \$57,342.16. The information that I handed out to you includes the breakdown of where that amount that we requested came from, as well as a list of the deliverables for the EMPG grant. Under the deliverables, I have listed the ones that would continue to be required, even if EMPG was not something that the county chose to continue to participate in. On their EMPG deliverables list, there's also a couple of resolutions that are addressed and I've attached those to the documents that I handed out to you as well. This was not fully funded because there was a one-million-dollar budget shortfall in the EMPG grant process. What Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management decided to do is to fund as many of the departments as they could but at last year's budget instead of this year. So this is the \$38,770.50 that we received last year. They funded us the same amount as last year and that's what they did with the agencies across the state who requested an EMPG fund for this year.

Janice Barela – Madam County Manager: I called the Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, that's where I learned about the 1-million-dollar shortfall. In the discussion, they did find out that none of the agencies were notified in advance of the shortfall prior to their application being submitted. I wanted to make sure that was something that we did not know in advance. As stated earlier, Samantha did let the Commission know that they did notify that there will be no new positions, they said that some positions across the state were not funded at all. I'm happy that we at least have some partial funding for each one of our positions. One of the things that was also disclosed to me is that they were having a discussion between the grants, the bureau chiefs, the finance department, and the deputy secretary to decide how to handle this, they decided that they wanted to allocate money to every one of the programs that are in place. They also stated that when they visit this midstream, at the middle of the fiscal year, if they determined that they actually have more money than they have projected, maybe they've been more fiscally responsible in how they manage the budget. If they find that money is available, then they would entertain doing an amendment to the agreement to allocate more money out to the programs. I did ask, "If you're pulling back part of our funding from the grant, are you also cutting out some of the deliverables?" In other words, we don't have to do as much as to requirement. I received a chuckle on the phone, the answer was no. So I'd also like Samantha to explain how they actually added more things this year, in regard to the deliverables, and now we have less funding to do more.

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: They did add under the NIMS, the National Incident Management Systems component, that was something that was there before, but they have now added in the National Qualification System. What that entails is anybody in an emergency management position that is funded by EMPG, is required to complete, and submit a Position Task Book for EOC positions, you have three years to complete this. This is a FEMA requirement. This is something that would be required through other federal funding as well. We are required to complete it within the three years, the requirements are several classes, there are two classes that I would still need to take at this point. They require you to work in an EOC in three different positions, observed by an evaluator so that they can sign off on that position. That's for the general task book, once you complete that task book, then they ask that each person that's in the Emergency Management realm funded by a federal grant, submit additional textbooks, Planning Section Chiefs or Operations Section Chiefs, the EOC Director, so this is

kind of a steppingstone to additional position task books that are going to be required. We do have a part of the qualification system that's under NIMS. We have a resolution 2017-48, which is in the packet that I provided you with where the county did adopt the NIMS System. The National Qualification System and the Position Textbook is something that they have just rolled out this year. Previously, it was a suggestion. Last year, the state adopted it and this year, they're expecting all of the counties to adopt it and move forward with it.

Kevin McCall – County Vice Chairman: On this page that you sent the deliverables for the grant, did you say that these are required whether we get the grant or not?

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: If we do not have the grant then things that would go away would be the quarterly reporting for the grant and the annual exercise participation, which really we should be doing anyway. The other things that are listed here are required for any type of federal funding. So if we do not comply with these, we would not be eligible for any other federal funding.

Kevin McCall – County Vice Chairman: How many hours for the quarterly reporting?

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: Three or four hours of quarterly reporting to get all of the documents together and submitted.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: We accept this money, or we don't. So most of the same amount that we received last year, does this marry us to that amount. Are we looking for a full-time and a part time employee?

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: It's two full-time positions, however, as far as what's covered under EMPG, would be full time for my position and the second position part time because it's half Emergency Management and half safety. They only cover the Emergency Management portion of it.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: The same dollar amount does that tie us to the same full time and part time position?

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: They funded both of the positions.

Janice Barela – Madam County Manager: They funded it at the last fiscal year salaries, which was a full time and a part time.

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: The difference in what we requested and what we were awarded is \$18,571.66.

Kevin McCall – County Vice Chairman: What deliverable could we cut, if we didn't take the grant?

Samantha O'Dell-County Emergency Manager: Nothing if we want to be eligible for other federal funding down the road.

Ryan Schwebach – County Chairman: What I've seen in the last year is that as a commissioner, since I really haven't seen Emergency Management to what it could be, it's almost like an insurance policy, you don't know you need it till you need it, by then it's too late. So I am supportive of this. It's hard to see deliverables until you actually have an issue. I would like a little bit more deliverable consequences. A Commission needs to know why they're funding this. I think there's a lot more, but for me, that's a big question, "where are the deliverables"?

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: On the question of deliverables. These are good practices. I know that nobody likes having an outside agency come in and tell us that we need to establish these best practices. There's nothing onerous or out of line in what is being passed as deliverables here. These are the things which will build a competent emergency manager's office and help build our Fire and Sheriff's Departments as well.

Samuel Schropp – County Commissioner: I'm working on a project to bring excess equipment to the mountain communities from the Fire Department. There are some conditions which I believe would have to be met before I would recommend that transfer of that equipment to the mountain communities. I don't want to see this equipment go up to the mountain communities and freeze and break the pumps or drop the tires. So the original conversation that I'm having with representatives from the mountain communities, and John Perea and Chief Dirks is to use this in conjunction with building a Wildland Firefighter Program to keep young people here in the county with job opportunities and to expand from wild lands into structured certification and hopefully begin building our volunteer system. There's a lot of things that need to be ironed out. This is on the table, the earliest I could see it coming before this commission will be August 6.

2022 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Award

This Subgrant Agreement made effective July 1, 2023, by and between the New Mexico Department of Public Safety, acting through the Administrative Services Division - Grants Management Bureau (GMB) herein referred to as the "BUREAU" and **Torrance County**, serving as the Fiscal/Fiduciary Agency for the **Torrance County Sheriff's Office**, as the Program herein, jointly referred to as the "SUBGRANTEE."

WHEREAS, this Subgrant Agreement is made by and between the Bureau and the Subgrantee, pursuant to The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program, specifically authorized under 34 U.S.C. §§ 10151 - 10158, (CFDA #16.738) which is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. JAG funds support all components of the criminal justice system, from multi-jurisdictional drug and gang task forces to crime prevention and domestic violence programs, courts, corrections, treatment, and justice information sharing initiatives. JAG funded projects may address crime through the provision of services directly to individuals and/or communities and by improving the effectiveness and efficiency of criminal justice systems, processes, and procedures; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Department of Public Safety is the designated State Administering Agency (SAA) in New Mexico that may apply for the JAG formula grant and administer funds to other state agencies and local units of government. The NMDPS is responsible for conducting coordinated and transparent strategic planning, along with the implementation of structural reforms that improve the administration of justice. Strategic planning is utilized to analyze crime trends, evaluate the priorities of all segments of the criminal justice system, set out a plan for reducing crime and victimization, and guide the use of the grant funds. The Bureau is, therefore, responsible for: coordination of JAG funds among state and local justice initiatives; preparation and submission of the state JAG application; administration of JAG funds including establishing funding priorities; distribution of funds; supervision of the Subgrantees' compliance with all Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) special conditions and provisions. The Bureau provides ongoing assistance to subgrantees; and is responsible for submitting financial reports, programmatic reports, performance measures, any other necessary subgrant information, and closes out the awards to BJA. The Bureau is responsible for the fiscal management of this award and will provide leadership and technical assistance to all subgrantees in identifying programmatic needs, preparing JAG subgrant proposals, and administering JAG subgrant awards; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the subgrantee to enter into this Subgrant Agreement with the Bureau in order to receive and expend funds from the JAG Program for the purpose of implementing activities that qualify for funding under the JAG Program; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

SECTION ONE: PURPOSE

1. The purpose of the Agreement is to specify and delineate the rights and duties of the parties hereto as described in the 2022 JAG program solicitation, and any other relevant rules, laws, and regulations. JAG funds may be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, law enforcement overtime, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and information systems for criminal justice. The award shall not be used for research and development. The funding for the 2022 JAG award is as follows:

2. The NMDPS and the New Mexico Drug Enforcement Advisory Council (DEAC) have vetted the adoption of two main purpose areas for the 2022 Byrne JAG grant application. Program purpose areas for the FY2024 funding cycle have been limited to:

A. Law Enforcement Programs

B. Prevention and Education Programs

SECTION TWO: SCOPE OF WORK

- The subgrantee agrees that it shall implement its program as detailed in their submitted 2022 Edward Byrne Justice Assistance Subgrant (JAG) Program Application (attached and incorporated herein as Attachment A). Specifically, the subgrantee shall use grant funds to achieve the following goals and objectives.
 - **Goal #1** – Reduce property, violent, and drug-related crime.
 - **Objective:** Identify property crime offenders and launch targeted investigations to solve a minimum of 50% of property crimes where solvability factors exist.
 - **Goal #2** – Engage the community to develop, foster, and maintain relationships to build trust in the TCSO and identify crime trends and areas of concern to develop solutions.
 - **Objective:** Increase the visibility in three targeted areas by increasing the number of community events and coordinated police operations to include three events each quarter (12 per year).
 - **Approved Grant Funding for Implementation of Goals and Objectives is as follows:**
 - **Overtime @ \$13,917.50**
 - **Confidential Informant funds @ \$2,400.00.**

TOTAL FUNDING = \$16,317.50.

- The subgrantee agrees to, at a minimum, demonstrate an emphasis on effective, evidence-based strategies that use intelligence and all available data to focus on reducing violent crime and drug trafficking. A detailed program description is incorporated herein as part of the Subgrantee's Application (attached and incorporated herein as Attachment A).
- The subgrantee agrees to provide all the necessary qualified personnel, materials, and facilities to implement the program described herein.

SECTION THREE: TERMS OF THIS SUBGRANT AGREEMENT

1. This Subgrant Agreement shall become effective July 1, 2023 and shall terminate on June 30, 2024.
2. The subgrantee may not obligate, expend, or request any funds under this award until a budget reflecting the final award amount has been received and approved by the Bureau; and
3. The Bureau shall evaluate the subgrantee's program's progress to determine if the subgrantee is on track to expend funds by the end of the Subgrant Agreement period. Spending reviews are scheduled to occur at mid-year and after the third quarter of the grantee period. If it appears funds will not be fully expended by the end of the Subgrant Agreement period, the Bureau will make a recommendation to the DEAC Budget and Funding Sub-

Committee to amend the Subgrant Agreement's budget in an effort to revert funds. This action may occur prior to the end of the Subgrant Agreement period to allow for funding to become available for other subgrantee programs.

- A. If extenuating circumstances exist, applicants may petition the DEAC Budget and Funding Sub-Committee for relief from the reversion of unexpended funds.
 - B. Upon review and analysis of the petition, the Budget and Funding Sub-Committee through the Bureau shall forward their recommendation to the Secretary of the Department of Public Safety for disposition.
 - C. In all cases, the Secretary of the Department has the final authority in determining if the reversion shall occur.
4. This Subgrant Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. Any claimed covenant, term, condition, warranty or promise of performance not expressly included in this document, or its amendments, is not part of this Subgrant Agreement and not enforceable pursuant to this Subgrant Agreement. Performance of all duties and obligations herein shall conform with, and shall not contravene, any state, local, or federal statutes, regulations, rules, or ordinances.
 5. In the event that, due to unusual circumstances, it becomes apparent that this agreement cannot be brought to full completion within the time period set forth in this Section, the Subgrantee shall notify the Bureau, in writing, at least forty-five (45) calendar days prior to the termination date of this Agreement to request a Subgrant Agreement extension.

SECTION FOUR: SUBGRANTEE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Subgrantee must adhere to the following duties and responsibilities, and other terms and conditions under this Subgrant Agreement in order to receive the compensation described in Section Five.

1. Act in the capacity as the fiduciary for this Program.
2. Include the Subgrant Agreement number on all correspondence and submittals to the Bureau.
3. Have the program commenced and operational within ninety (90) days of the last signatory executing this Subgrant Agreement. If the subgrantee's program has not commenced or is not operational within ninety (90) days, the subgrantee must report in writing to the Bureau the steps taken to initiate the program, the reasons for delay, and the expected starting date prior to the end of the ninety (90) days. Additionally, subgrantee must obtain an extension, in writing, from the Bureau prior to the end of the ninety (90) days. If an extension is not obtained prior to the ninety (90) days, the subgrantee's program, at the Bureau's discretion, may be terminated and, if the Program is terminated, the BJA funds allocated to that program will be redistributed to fund other BJA programs.
4. Submit all program-related contracts, subcontracts, agreements, and subsequent contracts to the Bureau for review and approval prior to execution.
5. Provide the Bureau for its review for compliance and approval in writing, prior to any overtime being reimbursed, the overtime policy for all participating agency(s), if applicable.
6. Retain all records that pertain to the amount and disposition of the funds from all sources budgeted for the Subgrant Agreement period, descriptions of all expenditures made, the reason the expenditure was made, and the benefit received by the subgrantee for the expenditure, the amount and nature of all contributions from other sources, and such other records as the Bureau shall prescribe. Such records shall be preserved for a period of not less than six (6) years following completion of the Subgrant Agreement.
7. Understand and agree that the Bureau, Department of Justice (DOJ) (including OJP and the Office of the Inspector General (OIG)) and its representatives, and the Government Accountability Office (GAO), shall have access to and the right to examine all records (including, but not limited to, books, papers, and documents in any form) related to this award, including such records of any Subgrantee, contractor, or sub-contractor.

8. Understand and agree that the Bureau, DOJ, and the GAO are authorized to interview any officer or employee of the subgrantee (or of any contractor or sub-contractor) regarding transactions related to this award.
9. Have both fiscal and programmatic personnel attend trainings when provided by the Bureau.
10. The subgrantee agrees they will submit to the Bureau for review and approval any curricula, training materials, or other written materials that will be published, including web-based materials and web site content, or any publications (written, visual, or audio, but excluding press releases, notices, newsletters, and issue analyses) issued by the subgrantee describing programs funded in whole or in part by this agreement. The subgrantee shall submit the above-stated material to the Bureau at least forty-five (45) working days prior to the targeted dissemination date or public release.
11. The subgrantee agrees to have a representative attend quarterly Drug Enforcement Advisory Council (DEAC) meetings and be able provide a report on program progress if requested.
12. The subgrantee agrees to submit the minutes from all quarterly Region Board meetings to the Bureau;
13. The Bureau reserves the right to conduct periodic on-site monitoring visits upon reasonable notice to the subgrantee prior to each visit. Further, the subgrantee understands that it may be subject to additional financial and programmatic on-site monitoring, which may be on short notice, and agrees that it will cooperate with any such monitoring.
14. Per 2 C.F.R. §200.313 requirements, post-award property standards will continue to be managed for all equipment purchased with Federal grant funds over \$5,000.00. The NMDPS GMB requires that Property/Equipment Inventory Reports continue to be provided annually by the deadline of January 30 until disposition of all property/equipment purchased with these grant funds with a fair market per-unit value of over \$5,000.00, or it is transferred, replaced, or otherwise disposed of. No property or equipment shall be disposed of without prior approval by the NMDPS GMB. Records for property and equipment acquired with Federal funds must be retained for (3) three years after the close of the grant award. Title, use, management (including record keeping, internal control, and maintenance), and disposition of equipment acquired by Subgrantee or its Subgrantee(s) with Subgrant Agreement funds, will be governed by the provisions of NMAC 2.20.1 and 45 CFR 74.34 or 45 CFR 92.32, as applicable.
15. The subgrantee should enforce the federal law that protects federal employees against reprisal for whistleblowing. A whistleblower is an employee of Federal contractor, subcontractor or grantee who discloses information that the individually reasonably believes is evidence of gross mismanagement of a Federal contract or grant; gross waste of Federal funds; abuse of authority relating to Federal contract or grant; substantial and specific danger to public health or safety; or a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a Federal contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract) or grant.

In addition, under the National Defense Authorization Act of 2013 (NDAA), it is illegal for an employee of a Federal contractor, subcontractor, or grantee to be discharged, demoted or otherwise discriminated against for making a protected whistleblower disclosure. Also, under Presidential Policy Directive (PPD-19), an action affecting access to classified information cannot be taken in reprisal for protected whistleblowing.

In the event that a DOJ contractor, subcontractor and grantee report allegations of what they reasonably believe to be wrongdoing, and believe that retaliation has occurred, they may file a complaint under the NDAA with the OIG which will investigate the matter. 16. The subgrantee agrees that funds received under this award will not be used to supplant State or local funds but will be used to increase the amounts of such funds that would, in the absence of Federal funds, be made available

for program activities. The subgrantee understands that the Bureau will not reimburse any portion of salaries paid for existing general fund employees/staff.

SECTION FIVE: SUBGRANTEE COMPENSATION AND PAYMENT

1. Upon approval of the subgrantee's satisfactory completion of all work and services required to be performed under the terms of this Subgrant Agreement, and in compliance with all other Subgrant Agreement terms herein stated, the Bureau shall reimburse the subgrantee a sum up to, and not to exceed **\$16,317.50**.
2. **All payments shall be made on an actual cost reimbursement basis.** The subgrantee shall submit a completed Request for Reimbursement (RFR) form along with all appropriate supporting documentation.
 - A. RFR forms shall be submitted to the Bureau for review and approval no later than fifteen (15) days after the end of each month in which there were grant expenditures.
 - B. A Final RFR must be submitted to the Bureau for review and approval no later than thirty (30) days following the termination date of this Subgrant Agreement. Failure by the subgrantee to timely submit the final RFR, including all supporting backup documentation, may result in an Administrative Closeout by the Bureau. If an Administrative Closeout takes place, any remaining expenditures may not be reimbursed, which may have a negative effect on Subgrantee's ability to obtain funding in the future.
 - C. If there are no expenditures to claim on an RFR, the subgrantee is required to complete the RFR coversheet indicating zero expenditures are being claimed for that month.
 - D. No RFR will be processed if, in the judgment of the Bureau, the subgrantee is in violation of any section of this Subgrant Agreement.
3. The subgrantee understands and acknowledges that Reimbursement of travel expenses, if applicable, will be reimbursed per the New Mexico State Per Diem and Mileage Act (10-8-1 through 10-8-8 NMSA 1978), subgrantee's approved travel policy, or the approved federal rates per GSA. Agencies will provide backup to support travel expenditures including but not limited to itemized receipts and/or invoices.
4. Upon the completion of this Agreement, any portion of subgrantee's unexpended funds revert back to the New Mexico Department of Public Safety.
5. No matching requirement exists for this program.

SECTION SIX: SUBGRANTEE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

It is necessary for the Bureau to evaluate the progress of the Program, therefore, the subgrantee is required to complete and submit programmatic reports.

1. The subgrantee shall submit Quarterly or Semiannual Progress Reports. Progress reports shall be submitted within 15 days after the reporting period ends, for the life of the award to the Bureau for review and approval. The final report will be due no later than fifteen (15) days after expiration of funding. The schedule is as follows:

Quarterly: July 1st – September 30th, Progress Report due October 15th

Quarterly: October 1st – December 31st, Progress Report due by January 15th

Quarterly: January 1st – March 31st, Progress Report due by April 15th

Quarterly: April 1st – June 30th, Progress Report due by July 15th

OR

Semiannual: January 1st – June 30th, Progress Report due July 15th

Semiannual: July 1st – December 31st, Progress Report due January 15th

The Bureau will provide proper guidance for Progress Reports pertaining to this program; and

2. In addition, Monthly Progress Reports must be submitted to the Bureau along with the request for reimbursement. Failure to submit required JAG reports by established deadlines may result in the freezing of grant funds and future high-risk designation.
3. The subgrantee agrees to comply with any additional reporting requirements or information requests imposed by DOJ, NIJ, OJP, OIG, OMB, and the Bureau. The Bureau will notify the subgrantee of any additional reporting requirements as they are imposed.
4. The subgrantee understands and agrees that funds may be withheld (including funds under future awards), or other related requirements may be imposed, if the required information is not submitted on a timely basis;
5. The subgrantee must collect, maintain, and provide to the Bureau data that measures the performance and effectiveness of activities under this award, in the manner, and within the timeframes, specified in the program solicitation, or as otherwise specified by the Bureau. Data collection supports compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) and the GPRA Modernization Act, and other applicable laws.

SECTION SEVEN: FUND SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION AND OTHER SANCTIONS

The Bureau, by written notice to the subgrantee, shall have the right to terminate this agreement if, at any time, in the judgment of the Bureau the provisions of this agreement have been violated or the outlined program activities do not progress satisfactorily. In this event, the Bureau may demand a refund of all or part of the funds dispersed to the subgrantee. The Bureau may suspend funding in whole or in part, terminate funding, or impose other sanctions on subgrantee for the following reasons:

1. Pursuant to 28 C.F.R. Part 18, the Bureau may suspend or terminate funding under this award before the completion of the project funded by this award for the subgrantee's failure to comply with the certifications and conditions or with the project's goals, plans and methodology set forth in the approved application. In the case of suspension, the subgrantee will be unable to draw down funds until the Bureau determines that the Subgrantee is in compliance;
2. Failing to comply substantially with the requirements or statutory objectives of the appropriate state or federal law, program guidelines issues hereunder, or other provisions of state or federal law;
3. Proposing or implementing substantial plan changes to the extent that, if originally submitted, the application would not have been selected for funding;
4. Failing to submit reports required by Section Six; or
5. Filing a false certification with the application, this Subgrant Agreement, or in other reports or documents.
6. The subgrantee acknowledges that failure to submit an acceptable Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (if subgrantee is required to submit one pursuant to 28 C.F.R. Section 42.302) that is approved by the Office for Civil Rights, is a violation of its Certified Assurances and may result in suspension or termination of funding, until such time as the Subgrantee is in compliance.
7. Failing to make satisfactory progress toward the goals, objectives, or strategies set forth in the Subgrantee's Application;

8. Failing to adhere to the requirements in this Subgrant Agreement;
9. This Subgrant Agreement may be terminated by the subgrantee upon written notice delivered to the Bureau at least thirty (30) days in advance. Such termination does not nullify subgrantees obligations already incurred for performance or failure to perform prior to the date of termination. In any event, this subgrant agreement shall be in effect until completed, unless terminated early pursuant to this Subgrant Agreement.

Before imposing sanctions, the Bureau will provide reasonable notice to the subgrantee of its intent to impose sanctions and will attempt to resolve the issue in an expeditious manner.

SECTION EIGHT: SUBGRANTEE CERTIFICATIONS AND CONDITIONS

As a requirement in accepting this award, all Subgrantees must adhere to the following.

1. Compliance with general appropriations-law restrictions on the use of federal funds (FY 2022)

The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable restrictions on the use of federal funds set out in federal appropriations statutes. Pertinent restrictions, including from various "general provisions" in the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2022, are set out at <https://ojp.gov/funding/Explore/FY22AppropriationsRestrictions.htm>, and are incorporated by reference here.

Should a question arise as to whether a particular use of federal funds by a recipient (or a subrecipient) would or might fall within the scope of an appropriations-law restriction, the recipient is to contact the Bureau for guidance, and may not proceed without the express prior written approval of the Bureau.

By signing and accepting this award on behalf of the subgrantee, the authorized recipient official accepts all material requirements of the award, and specifically adopts, as if personally executed by the authorized recipient official, all assurances or certifications submitted by or on behalf of the subgrantee that relate to conduct during the period of performance.

Failure to comply with one or more award requirements -- whether a condition set out in full below, a condition incorporated by reference below, or an assurance or certification related to conduct during the award period -- may result in the Bureau or OJP taking appropriate action with respect to the subgrantee and the award. Among other things, the Bureau or OJP may withhold award funds, disallow costs, or suspend or terminate the award. DOJ, including OJP, also may take other legal action as appropriate.

Any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement to the federal government related to this award (or concealment or omission of a material fact) may be the subject of criminal prosecution (including under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or 1621, and/or 34 U.S.C. 10271-10273), and also may lead to imposition of civil penalties and administrative remedies for false claims or otherwise (including under 31 U.S.C. 3729-3730 and 3801-3812).

Should any provision of a requirement of this award be held to be invalid or unenforceable by its terms, that provision shall first be applied with a limited construction so as to give it the maximum effect permitted by law. Should it be held, instead, that the provision is utterly invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed severable from this award.

D. Rules of construction

1. Staff involved in the hiring process
For purposes of this condition, persons "who are or will be involved in activities under this award" specifically includes (without limitation) any and all subgrantee officials or other staff who are or will be involved in the hiring process with respect to a position that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds.
2. Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify
For purposes of satisfying the requirement of this condition regarding verification of employment eligibility, the subgrantee may choose to participate in, and use, E-Verify (www.e-verify.gov), provided an appropriate person authorized to act on behalf of the subgrantee uses E-Verify (and follows the proper E-Verify procedures, including in the event of a "Tentative Nonconfirmation" or a "Final Nonconfirmation") to confirm employment eligibility for each hiring for a position in the United States that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds.

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the agency making this award, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

A. In accepting this award, the subgrantee—

- i. represents that it neither requires nor has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

20. Reporting potential fraud, waste, and abuse, and similar misconduct

The subgrantee must promptly refer to the DOJ Office of the Inspector General (OIG) any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, subrecipient, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has, in connection with funds under this award-- (1) submitted a claim that violates the False Claims Act; or (2) committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct.

21. Cooperating with OJP Monitoring

The subgrantee agrees to cooperate with the Bureau and OJP monitoring of this award pursuant to OJP's guidelines, protocols, and procedures, and to cooperate with OJP (including the grant manager for this award and the Office of Chief Financial Officer (OCFO)) requests related to such monitoring, including requests related to desk reviews and/or site visits. The subgrantee agrees to provide to the Bureau and OJP all documentation necessary for OJP to complete its monitoring tasks, including documentation related to any subawards made under this award. Further, the subgrantee agrees to abide by reasonable deadlines set by the Bureau and OJP for providing the requested documents. Failure to cooperate with OJP's monitoring activities may result in actions that affect the subgrantee's DOJ awards, including, but not limited to: withholdings and/or other restrictions on the recipient's access to award funds; referral to the DOJ OIG for audit review; designation of the subgrantee as a DOJ High Risk grantee; or termination of an award(s).

22. Use of program income

The subgrantee agrees that all income generated as a direct result of this award shall be deemed program income. Program income earned during the project period shall be utilized, in accordance with Federal awarding agency regulations or the terms and conditions of the award, in one or more of the ways:

- A. Added to funds committed to the project by the grant awarding agency and recipient and used to further eligible project or program objectives.
- B. Used to finance the non-Federal share of the project or program.
- C. Deducted from the total project or program allowable cost in determining the new allowable costs on which the Federal share of costs is based (when an agency authorizes the disposition of program income as in 1 or 2, program income in excess of any limits stipulated shall be used this way).

All program income must be reported on a monthly basis on the Request for Reimbursement forms.

23. Justice Sharing Information

Information sharing projects funded under this award must comply with DOJ's Global Justice Information Sharing Initiative (Global) guidelines. 24. Avoidance of duplication of networks

To avoid duplicating existing networks or IT systems in any initiatives funded by BJA for law enforcement information sharing systems which involve interstate connectivity between jurisdictions, such systems shall employ, to the extent possible, existing networks as the communication backbone to achieve interstate connectivity, unless the recipient can demonstrate to the satisfaction of BJA that this requirement would not be cost effective or would impair the functionality of an existing or proposed IT system.

25. Compliance with 28 C.F.R. Part 23

With respect to any information technology system funded or supported by funds under this award, the subgrantee must comply with 28 C.F.R. Part 23, Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies, if OJP determines this regulation to be applicable. Should OJP determine 28 C.F.R. Part 23 to be applicable, OJP may, at its discretion, perform audits of the system, as per the regulation. Should any violation of 28 C.F.R. Part 23 occur, the recipient may be fined as per 34 U.S.C. 10231(c)-(d). The subgrantee may not satisfy such a fine with federal funds.

26. Protection of human research subjects

The subgrantee must comply with the requirements of 28 C.F.R. Part 46 and all OJP policies and procedures regarding the protection of human research subjects, including obtainment of Institutional Review Board approval, if appropriate, and subject informed consent.

27. Confidentiality of data

The subgrantee must comply with all confidentiality requirements of 34 U.S.C. 10231 and 28 C.F.R. Part 22 that are applicable to collection, use, and revelation of data or information. The recipient further agrees, as a condition of award approval, to submit a Privacy Certificate that is in accord with requirements of 28 C.F.R. Part 22 and, in particular, 28 C.F.R. 22.23.

28. Law enforcement task force- required training

Within 120 days of award acceptance, each current member of a law enforcement task force funded with award funds who is a task force commander, agency executive, task force officer, or other task force member of equivalent rank, must complete required online (internet-based) task force training. Additionally, all future task force members must complete this training once during the period of performance for this award, or once every four years if multiple OJP awards include this requirement.

The required training is available free of charge online through the BJA-funded Center for Task Force Integrity and Leadership (www.ctfli.org). The training addresses task force effectiveness, as well as other key issues including privacy and civil liberties/rights, task force performance measurement, personnel selection, and task force oversight and accountability. If award funds are used to support a task force, the recipient must compile and maintain a task force personnel roster, along with course completion certificates.

29. Justification of consultant rate

Approval of this award does not indicate approval of any consultant rate in excess of \$650 per day. A detailed justification must be submitted to and approved by the OJP program office prior to obligation or expenditure of such funds.

30. Compliance with National Environmental Policy Act and related statutes

Upon request, the subgrantee must assist BJA in complying with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the National Historic Preservation Act, and other related federal environmental impact analyses requirements in the use of these award funds, either directly by the Bureau or by a subgrantee.

Accordingly, the subgrantee agrees to first determine if any of the following activities will be funded by the grant, prior to obligating funds for any of these purposes. If it is determined that any of the following activities will be funded by the award, the subgrantee agrees to contact the Bureau.

The subgrantee understands that this condition applies to new activities as set out below, whether or not they are being specifically funded with these award funds. That is, as long as the activity is being conducted by the subgrantee, a subrecipient, or any third party, and the activity needs to be undertaken in order to use these award funds, this condition must first be met. The activities covered by this condition are:

- A. New construction;
- B. Minor renovation or remodeling of a property located in an environmentally or historically sensitive area, including properties located within a 100-year flood plain, a wetland, or habitat for endangered species, or a property listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places;
- C. A renovation, lease, or any proposed use of a building or facility that will either (a) result in a change in its basic prior use or (b) significantly change its size;
- D. Implementation of a new program involving the use of chemicals other than chemicals that are (a) purchased as an incidental component of a funded activity and (b) traditionally used, for example, in office, household, recreational, or education environments; and
- E. Implementation of a program relating to clandestine methamphetamine laboratory operations, including the identification, seizure, or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories.

The subgrantee understands and agrees that complying with NEPA may require the preparation of an Environmental Assessment and/or an Environmental Impact Statement, as directed by BJA. The subgrantee further understands and agrees to the requirements for implementation of a Mitigation Plan, as detailed at <https://bja.gov/Funding/nepa.html>, for programs relating to methamphetamine laboratory operations.

Application of This Condition to Recipient's Existing Programs or Activities: For any of the subgrantee's or its subrecipients' existing programs or activities that will be funded by these award funds, the subgrantee, upon specific request from the Bureau, agrees to cooperate with the Bureau in any preparation by BJA of a national or program environmental assessment of that funded program or activity.

31. Required data on law enforcement agency training

Any law enforcement agency receiving direct or sub-awarded funding from this JAG award must submit quarterly accountability metrics data related to training that officers have received on the use of force, racial and ethnic bias, de-escalation of conflict, and constructive engagement with the public.

32. Expenditures prohibited without waiver

No funds under this award may be expended on the purchase of items prohibited by the JAG program statute, unless, as set forth at 34 U.S.C. 10152, the Bureau and the BJA Director certifies that extraordinary and exigent circumstances exist, making such expenditures essential to the maintenance of public safety and good order.

33. Use of funds for DNA testing; upload of DNA profiles

If award funds are used for DNA testing of evidentiary materials, any resulting eligible DNA profiles must be uploaded to the Combined DNA Index System ("CODIS," the DNA database operated by the FBI) by a government DNA laboratory with access to CODIS.

No profiles generated under this award may be entered or uploaded into any non-governmental DNA database without prior express written approval from the Bureau in accordance with BJA.

Award funds may not be used for the purchase of DNA equipment and supplies unless the resulting DNA profiles may be accepted for entry into CODIS. Booking agencies should work with their state CODIS agency to ensure all requirements are met for participation in Rapid DNA (see National Rapid DNA Booking Operational Procedures Manual).

34. Utilizing award funds for forensic genealogy testing

Subgrantees utilizing award funds for forensic genealogy testing must adhere to the United States Department of Justice Interim Policy Forensic Genealogical DNA Analysis and Searching (<https://www.justice.gov/olp/page/file/1204386/download>), and must collect and report the metrics identified in Section IX of that document to BJA.

35. Submission of eligible records relevant to the National Instant Background Check System

Consonant with federal statutes that pertain to firearms and background checks -- including 18 U.S.C. 922 and 34 U.S.C. ch. 409 -- if the subgrantee uses this award to fund (in whole or in part) a specific project or program (such as a law enforcement, prosecution, or court program) that results in any court dispositions, information, or other records that are "eligible records" (under federal or State law) relevant to the National Instant Background Check System (NICS), or that has as one of its purposes the establishment or improvement of records systems that contain any court dispositions, information, or other records that are "eligible records" (under federal or State law) relevant to the NICS, the subgrantee must ensure that all such court dispositions, information, or other records that are "eligible records" (under federal or State law) relevant to the NICS are promptly made available to the NICS or to the "State" repository/database that is electronically available to (and accessed by) the NICS, and -- when appropriate -- promptly must update, correct, modify, or remove such NICS-relevant "eligible records".

In the event of minor and transitory non-compliance, the subgrantee may submit evidence to demonstrate diligent monitoring of compliance with this condition (including subgrantee compliance). DOJ will give great weight to any such evidence in any express written determination regarding this condition.

36. Prohibition on use of award funds for match under BVP program

JAG funds may not be used as the 50% match for purposes of the DOJ Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BVP) program.

37. Certification of body armor "mandatory wear" policies, and compliance with NIJ standards

If subgrantee uses funds under this award to purchase body armor, the subgrantee must submit a signed certification that law enforcement agencies receiving body armor purchased with funds from this award have a written "mandatory wear" policy in effect. The Bureau must keep signed certifications on file for any subgrantees planning to utilize funds from this award for ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchases. This policy must be in place for at least all uniformed officers before any funds from this award may be used by an agency for body armor. There are no requirements regarding the nature of the policy other than it be a mandatory wear policy for all uniformed officers while on duty.

Ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchased with JAG award funds may be purchased at any threat level, make or model, from any distributor or manufacturer, as long as the body armor has been tested and found to comply with applicable National Institute of Justice ballistic or stab standards and is

listed on the NIJ Compliant Body Armor Model List (<https://nij.gov/topics/technology/body-armor/Pages/compliant-ballistic-armor.aspx>). In addition, ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchased must be made in the United States and must be uniquely fitted, as set forth in 34 U.S.C. 10202(c)(1)(A). 38. Extreme risk protection programs funded by JAG must include, at a minimum: pre-deprivation and post-deprivation due process rights that prevent any violation or infringement of the Constitution of the United States, including but not limited to the Bill of Rights, and the substantive or procedural due process rights guaranteed under the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States, as applied to the States, and as interpreted by State courts and United States courts (including the Supreme Court of the United States). Such programs must include, at the appropriate phase to prevent any violation of constitutional rights, at minimum, notice, the right to an in-person hearing, an unbiased adjudicator, the right to know opposing evidence, the right to present evidence, and the right to confront adverse witnesses; the right to be represented by counsel at no expense to the government; pre-deprivation and post-deprivation heightened evidentiary standards and proof which mean not less than the protections afforded to a similarly situated litigant in Federal court or promulgated by the State's evidentiary body, and sufficient to ensure the full protections of the Constitution of the United States, including but not limited to the Bill of Rights, and the substantive and procedural due process rights guaranteed under the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States, as applied to the States, and as interpreted by State courts and United States courts (including the Supreme Court of the United States). The heightened evidentiary standards and proof under such programs must, at all appropriate phases to prevent any violation of any constitutional right, at minimum, prevent reliance upon evidence that is unsworn or unaffirmed, irrelevant, based on inadmissible hearsay, unreliable, vague, speculative, and lacking a foundation; and penalties for abuse of the program.
39. The subgrantee agrees that no funds under this grant award (including via subcontract or subaward, at any tier) may be used for unmanned aircraft systems (UAS), which includes unmanned aircraft vehicles (UAV), or for any accompanying accessories to support UAS.
40. In accepting this award, the subgrantee agrees that grant funds cannot be used for Facial Recognition Technology (FRT) unless the subgrantee has policies and procedures in place to ensure that the FRT will be utilized in an appropriate and responsible manner that promotes public safety, and protects privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties and complies with all applicable provisions of the U.S. Constitution, including the Fourth Amendment's protection against unreasonable searches and seizures and the First Amendment's freedom of association and speech, as well as other laws and regulations. Subgrantees utilizing funds for FRT must make such policies and procedures available to DOJ upon request.
41. De-confliction
A subgrantee shall participate in the case and subject de-confliction process through the New Mexico High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)/New Mexico Investigative Support Center (NMISC).
42. All funds awarded under this Subgrant Agreement must be used in accordance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of the Federal award.

43. The subgrantee agrees to comply with any additional requirements that may be imposed during the grant performance period if the Bureau determines that the subgrantee is a high-risk grantee.

SECTION NINE: SUBGRANTEE AUDIT REQUIREMENTS

The subgrantee agrees to comply with the 2 C.F.R. 200 Uniform Guidance Subpart F Audit Requirements.

1. The Bureau will review the most recent Audit report as a part of subgrantee monitoring; and
2. The Bureau may request that a Corrective Action Plan be submitted in response to audit findings and recommendations disclosed in the report which may impact the fiscal and/or programmatic management of this grant.

SECTION TEN: AMENDMENTS, MODIFICATIONS, AND SEVERABILITY

1. The subgrantee agrees to make no change in its Application (attached and incorporated herein as Attachment A of this Sub-Agreement), which includes, but is not limited to, subgrantee's goals and objectives and detailed budget, without complying with the Bureau's amendment procedures provided in this Subgrant Agreement and upon the receipt of the Bureau's approval prior to any changes being made.
2. Amendments may be submitted by the subgrantee to request program changes and/or corrections for any programmatic, administrative, or financial change associated with this Agreement;
 - a. Upon receipt of the extension request, the subgrantee and the Bureau shall review the work accomplished to date and determine whether there is a need or sufficient justification to amend this Subgrant Agreement to provide additional time for completion of the program. The maximum allowable extension for any program shall be twelve (12) months. An extension is contingent upon the Bureau receiving authorization for the extension of the grant award from the NIJ.
3. The Bureau, by written notice to the subgrantee shall have the right to change and/or correct this Agreement, if at any time, in the judgment of the Bureau the provisions of this Agreement require the Bureau to do so; and
4. The Bureau, by written notice, has the right to deny any amendment or budget modification request.
5. If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid, illegal, void, or otherwise unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such provision may be revised by the Parties, insofar as possible, to cure the defect and give maximum effect to their intent in entering into this Agreement. In any event, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect other provisions hereof, and the remainder of the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect; and

SECTION TWELVE: AUTHORIZATION OF EXPENDITURES

No provision of this Agreement creates in the public, or any member thereof, a third-party beneficiary or to authorize anyone not a party to the Agreement to maintain a suit for wrongful death, bodily and/or personal injury to person, damage to property, and/or any other claim(s) whatsoever pursuant to the provision of this Agreement.

SECTION FIFTEEN: LIABILITY AND NEW MEXICO TORT CLAIMS ACT

The subgrantee is responsible for any liability associated with the actions or omissions of it or its own employees, including violations of rights and privileges guaranteed under the Laws and Constitution of the United States and New Mexico. Any liability incurred in connection with this Subgrant Agreement is subject to the immunities and limitations of the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, NMSA 1978, Section 41-4-1 through 41-4-30, as amended. No provision of this Subgrant Agreement establishes any waiver of immunity from liability for alleged tortious

conduct of any employee of the Bureau or the Sub grantee arising from the performance of this Subgrant Agreement apart from that set forth in the New Mexico Tort Claims Act.

SECTION SIXTEEN: SEVERABILITY

If any term or condition of this Subgrant Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected and shall be valid and enforceable.

SECTION SEVENTEEN: INSTRUCTIONS AND FORMS

Instructions and forms necessary to carry out the administration of the grant as outlined in this Agreement are made available by the Bureau. Forms are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement upon completion.

SECTION EIGHTEEN: GRANT CLOSEOUT

1. The subgrantee will close-out the award when it determines that all applicable administrative actions and all required work of the award have been completed. This section specifies the actions the subgrantee must take to complete this process at the end of the period of performance.
 - A. The subgrantee must submit, no later than 30 calendar days after the end date of the grant period, all financial, performance, and other reports as required by the terms and conditions of the Federal award. DPS may approve extensions when requested by the Subgrantee, and its decision regarding approval will be determined on a case by case basis.
 - B. DPS will make prompt payments to the subgrantee for allowable reimbursable costs under the award being closed out.

The number one funding priority of this application is to fund overtime to allow the Community Policing Program (CPP) without reducing regular assignments/coverage. The personnel funding requested in this application will cover hourly overtime wages for each of the supervisors and deputies. The TCSO has budgeted for the regularly scheduled work assignments and benefits of all full-time employees. The department cannot maintain the coverage deputies currently provide on their patrols and implement the CPP. The wage reported in the application is the overtime rate for the different classifications and years of experience of employees. New this year, the new TCSO administration lead by Sheriff David Frazee will have salaried staff participate in the public involvement aspect of the CPP to increase outreach efforts without requiring additional funding. The Torrance County Personnel Ordinance, last updated in 2019, dictates how employees are compensated. Department heads establish work schedules. Overtime is allowed only when approved by a Department Head and is paid at the rate of 1 ½ times regular pay. An exemption is in place for that specifies that all non-exempt sheriff deputies will receive overtime pay for special projects or emergency situations authorized by the TCSO, even if the deputy has not actually worked 40 hours in that work week. Special projects include D.U.I. Checkpoints, Radar Surveys, Traffic Safety Education Training Classes, Bicycle Rodeos, Seat Belt Enforcement, or any other programs that will be reimbursed by a grant or other available resource. Sick leave, vacation leave, and holidays are not counted as hours worked within a work week.

Justification Other Costs:

The TCSO will use confidential funds to identify criminal elements, build cases for successful prosecution, and obtain evidence to justify the issuance of search warrants. The Project Director has requested \$2,400 in confidential funds to complete two (2) operations each month during the funding year. Obtaining confidential funds is the third priority of the TCSO for this funding opportunity. The primary purpose will include the purchase of evidence and/or contraband such as drugs, firearms, and stolen property required to determine the existence of a crime or to establish the identity of a participant in a crime. The TCSO has been conducting investigations since fall of 2007 using the same \$100 of confidential funds. Neither the department nor the County Commission has authorized use of additional confidential funds. This limits the number of concurrent investigations and the scope of investigations. Investigators now only use the funds when there is a guaranteed short-term retrieval of the funds so other investigations can occur. The limited funds also prevent the TCSO from conducting more than one operation at a time. The Program Director said the availability of confidential funds could explode the TCSO's capabilities to identify and prosecute criminals. Although he has set a goal of completing 24 operations with confidential funds in the next funding cycle, he said the opportunity for double that may exist.

01-Applicant Agency Overview	<p>The Torrance County Sheriff's Office was established in 1911. By 1940 the Sheriff's Office was serving roughly 3,355 square miles and 9,731 citizens. Since 1940, our population has almost doubled in size to 15,045 citizens to serve (2020, U.S. Census). As population numbers grew, crime increased within Torrance County. From July 1, 2022 to February 28, 2023, the Torrance County Sheriff's Office responded to the following calls for service: • Calls for Service county wide: 12,456, and • Call for Service handled by TCSO: 5,303. The County is the 19th largest in New Mexico. In contrast, the TCSO is small. A full staff consists of the Sheriff, Undersheriff, 1 Lieutenants, 1 Evidence Officer, 2 Sergeants and 15 Commissioned Deputies. The TCSO is committed to protect the lives, property and rights of all people, to maintain order and to enforce the law. The TCSO strives to accomplish this mission by setting goals and objectives and practicing the core values of the Office. It is our mission to improve and maintain the quality of life we enjoy and to ensure that our County is a safe place to live, work and visit. We are completely dedicated to this mission, to the County we serve and to accept the responsibility of attaining our goal of achieving excellence within our profession.</p>
02-Problem Statement	<p>Torrance County has experienced an increase in property, violent, and drug-related crimes. In one five year period from 2016-2020 the crimes addressed by the Torrance County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) increased 77%. Specifically, property crimes increased 179%, violent crimes 153%, and drug-related crimes 153%. Property crimes range from residential and vehicle burglaries to stolen vehicles. The county also has identified groups working together within the county for the organized distribution of drugs. Gang affiliations have also been identified. Torrance County implemented a Community Policing Program (CPP) utilizing JAG funding which has been in place for almost two funding cycles. Deputies generally cover the entire county, and must react to calls, but under the CPP deputies target identified high-crime areas as well. The CPP has also increased opportunities to converse with area residents to build their trust in the department and identify their concerns. TCSO has found the CPP made possible with JAG funding is a success. From the first year of JAG funding to the second, crime reports in several areas generally decreased. These include: • stolen vehicle reports from 31 to 22, • fraud reports from 27 to 23, • larceny/theft reports from 70 to 51, • criminal damage to property reports from 31 to 17, • breaking & entering reports from 27 to 10. Burglary reports show the only increase from 64 to 76. The 2022 New Mexico HIDTA Drug Threat Assessment reports the major drug threats in the state include fentanyl, methamphetamine, heroin, cocaine, and marijuana. The TCSO JAG Program Director reports the same drugs are also the biggest threat in Torrance County. The HIDTA Report also claims the following for Torrance County: • Torrance County lies within the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area. • Torrance County has a drug overdose rate of 38.4 deaths/100,000 people. • The fentanyl overdose rate in the county equals 10.3/100,000 people. • The methamphetamine overdose rate in the county equals 22.3/100,000 people. Through the CPP, the TCSO has also found successful prosecution is heavily dependent on evidence gathering. Equipment purchased so far with JAG funds has already helped the department build stronger cases. However, the department needs to strengthen its capabilities to document evidence at the scene.</p>
03-Program Description	<p>To address the rise in crime and earn the public's trust, the TCSO implemented a Community Policing Program (CPP) using JAG funding. The department has found the program is building community relationships, allowing more time for investigations, and improving evidence gathering with new equipment. With continued funding, the TCSO will continue the program to develop, foster, and maintain relationships with the community and expand the capability for investigations in three separate districts of the county. TCSO will continue the citizen component which has allowed early identification of criminal activity, crime trends, and community nuisances. By identifying current criminal trends and areas of concern, the TCSO is implementing strategies to target the problem before it grows. During the first year, property and violent crime was cut in half because of early identification of the criminal element and intervention by the TCSO. Equipment purchased with JAG funds and installed in high crime areas allowed deputies to identify offenders which lead to apprehension and filing charges. Within the latest funding cycle, fingerprinting equipment and cameras purchased through the grant are allowing investigators to build stronger cases. During the last quarter of the current grant cycle, the county will improve outreach through distribution of a brochure and tip "hotline" email. In January 2023, a new administration entered the TCSO. Led by Sheriff David Frazee, the administration is excited to play a role in the community outreach portion of the CPP. The sheriff, undersheriff, and the sheriff's executive secretary/administrator, as salaried staff, will participate in community events without adding additional funding requirements. The administrative staff will organize an open house, a school event, and man a TCSO table at community events to share information about the CPP and foster a better relationship with residents. Previously, only deputies attended these events to interact with community members; however, if an emergency happened, they had to leave the event. The administrative staff will maintain a presence at events for the duration of the event. Deputies will still participate, but when they must leave on a call, TCSO will still be available to the public. The Program Director plans two additional events. First, he will identify a community in a high crime area to take the command unit along with several patrol units to set up a remote "open house" to encourage community interaction. Secondly, he will coordinate at least one park and walk where deputies will visit a park during a high use time period to build relationships with residents. Each activity will be spread throughout the county, so the TCSO is interacting with residents from each of the three districts. In addition, the TCSO will participate in at least eight other events partnering with other community organizations. Though the CPP, supervisors and deputies continue to identify concerns and become familiar with the citizens. Criminal issues and traffic concerns are being identified to guide the allocation of resources. During its first year, CPP activities included two Deputies and Dogs events and Trunk or Treat. During the second year, activities included park walk and talks and participation in youth activities. These events build good will between TCSO and the community and afford candid talk about criminal activity in the county. So far in the last year, community involvement has helped officers obtain surveillance video crucial to the prosecution in one case and a significant factor in resolving a burglary case and stolen vehicle case. With continued funding, overtime hours coupled with confidential funds and a scene scanner will expand the capability of investigations with the plan of building strong cases for prosecution. New equipment will further enhance the department's ability to document crime scenes thoroughly. Confidential funds will provide more opportunities to identify criminals and build strong cases and afford multiple investigations throughout the year requiring the use of confidential funds.</p>
04-Project Reporting and Evaluation	<p>Area supervisors will collect data on crime trends identified and the policing strategies utilized including the number of operations conducted and their duration. Supervisors will track the number of property crimes that are solved. Deputies will log overtime hours spent on community policing strategies and community events. The Community Policing Director will analyze data and evaluate the program by comparing time spent on covert and surveillance operations to the reduction in property, violent, and drug crimes committed. Community outreach will be measured through participation at community events and community participation and cooperation in identifying and solving crime and providing evidence for cases. The success of organizational transformation will</p>

continue to be monitored through performance evaluations and successful implementation of shifts and deputy coverage. In addition, creation and use of job descriptions and inclusion of community policing in hiring and evaluating deputies will be considered. The TCSO Administrator will collect data and compile reports for DPS. The biggest impact of the program will be a reduction of burglaries, property theft, and violent/drug crimes.

05-Alternative Plans (If Not Funded)

The primary budgetary concern within any department has been that of staffing and the adjustments of the deputies' schedules. Recently, TCSO implemented twelve (12) hour shifts that provide 24/7 patrols. However, the TCSO still lacks the resources to implement the community policing program (CPP) and maintain current patrols and assignments of deputies. Without funding, the CPP would be hard to fit within existing schedules and therefore reduce the number of surveillance operations and interactions with the public. With sufficient JAG funding, the TCSO could continue to participate in 12 community events each year. Without JAG funding, deputies could possibly participate in 4 events throughout the year. This participation, however, would reduce the time devoted to patrols. The TCSO will continue to budget costs associated with the personal relationship aspect of the community policing program to include educational supplies. Overtime and the purchase of equipment is not funded for the CPP. The TCSO will also be forced to continue to rely on only \$100 of confidential funds limiting the scope of investigations and preventing concurrent investigations to occur. The continued integration of a community policing mindset will continue within the existing budget and will continue as a means to measure organizational transformation.

The Project Director has requested \$2,400 in confidential funds to complete two (2) operations each month during the funding year. The primary purpose will include the purchase of evidence and/or contraband such as drugs, firearms, and stolen property required to determine the existence of a crime or to establish the identity of a participant in a crime. Use of confidential funds are documented in the TCSO's "Investigative Funds" policy dated 4/10/2020. Per the policy, the funds will be used to establish and/or further a criminal investigation. The funds will only be allowed when the particular merits of an investigation warrant the expenditure of these funds. The investigations unit will maintain the funds and ensure that the controls over disbursement of confidential funds are adequate to safeguard against the misuse of these funds. Prior to the use of confidential funds the Program Director will consider the significance to the investigation, the need for the funds to further the investigation, and anticipated expenditures for other investigations. JUSTIFICATION - SALARIES AND WAGES

The number one funding priority of this application is to fund overtime to allow the Community Policing Program (CPP) without reducing regular assignments/coverage. The personnel funding requested in this application will cover hourly overtime wages for each of the supervisors and deputies. The TCSO has budgeted for the regularly scheduled work assignments and benefits of all full-time employees. The department cannot maintain the coverage deputies currently provide on their patrols and implement the CPP. The wage reported in the application is the overtime rate for the different classifications and years of experience of employees. New this year, the new TCSO administration lead by Sheriff David Frazee will have salaried staff participate in the public involvement aspect of the CPP to increase outreach efforts without requiring additional funding. The Torrance County Personnel Ordinance, last updated in 2019, dictates how employees are compensated. Department heads establish work schedules. Overtime is allowed only when approved by a Department Head and is paid at the rate of 1 ½ times regular pay. An exemption is in place for that specifies that all non-exempt sheriff deputies will receive overtime pay for special projects or emergency situations authorized by the TCSO, even if the deputy has not actually worked 40 hours in that work week. Special projects include D.U.I. Checkpoints, Radar Surveys, Traffic Safety Education Training Classes, Bicycle Rodeos, Seat Belt Enforcement, or any other programs that will be reimbursed by a grant or other available resource. Sick leave, vacation leave, and holidays are not counted as hours worked within a work week.

JUSTIFICATION - EQUIPMENT

The efforts of law enforcement to reduce crime (e.g., violent crime, property crime, and drug-related offenses) are a multi-phased process from the first moments at the scene of the crime through the successful prosecution of the offender(s) months or years later. One of the most, if not the most, important phases for any criminal investigation is the collection of evidence and documentation of the scene, both of which are highly perishable or subject to degradation. Reliable documentation of

evidence generally begins at the crime scene. Historically, this documentation has occurred through only a few means: photography, hand-drawn sketches, and two-dimensional diagrams created using surveying equipment and mapping software. For the most part, these are fairly inexpensive, relatively low-tech options that can be time-consuming and typically result in a mediocre presentation to a judge or jury. Three-dimensional laser scanning, a type of geospatial technology, has the potential to become a powerful tool in the crime scene documentation tool kit. While three-dimensional laser scanning can produce beautiful images and take precise measurements, it can be expensive to buy equipment. This fact alone typically relegates the technology to larger agencies, many of which also have dedicated crime scene personnel. This leaves smaller, rural law enforcement agencies at a significant disadvantage. The need for successful scene processing is no less important, however. A smaller agency has to do with less personnel and typically less specialized equipment. Under current conditions, valuable personnel is kept busy for an extended period, essentially making them unavailable for the other important stages of a successful investigation. Three-dimensional laser scanning technology will allow the TCSO to document scenes in far less time and produce a much higher-quality product. Additionally, this would decrease the number of personnel needed to accomplish that task. It should be noted that this technology would also be shared among the multiple municipal law enforcement agencies within the county to assist them in their efforts to achieve the same goal of crime reduction. The TCSO's second funding priority is purchasing a 3-D scanning system. We have researched this area of technology extensively and found two options that would have the greatest positive impact on the efforts of the TCSO to become completely self-sufficient with advanced crime scene processing for both the Sheriff's Office and the multiple municipalities we serve. We know that funding is limited. Keeping this in mind we wanted to provide two different options. Both are viable, however, there are differences. The Faro Focus Core Laser Scanner system is comprised of the hardware (e.g., scanner, batteries, tripod) as well as the requisite software to reconcile the data in a manner where it can be presented in court. The Faro Core Laser Scanner is an extremely high-quality device capable of producing accurate (~3 mm @ 10m, 4 mm @ 25m) high-resolution (~527 MPx) products. This scanner has a 75-meter range meaning that more data can be captured faster (pers scan) than competitors. This equates to less time on the scene which in turn greatly decreases the possibility of degradation while increasing efficiency of limited personnel. The Faro Focus Core Laser Scanner system costs \$37,228.75. The second option is a Leica Geosystems BLK360 G2 Scanner System. Like the Faro option, this includes the hardware and requisite software. Although the BLK360 G2 provides a very good result in a smaller package, there are some differences. The 360BLK G2 has a lower resolution of ~150 MPx and a slightly diminished accuracy of 6mm @ 10m / 8mm @ 20m. The effective range of the BLK360 G2 is around 45 meters, approximately thirty-meter shy of the Faro Focus. The Leica Geosystems BLK360 G2 Scanner system costs \$28,918. While the differences are apparent, either of these two options would have a tremendous impact on law enforcement within Torrance County. This technology would immediately yield benefits to the citizens of the county through increased investigative effectiveness, keeping valuable law enforcement resources out in the community. Within the budget, we have requested the Faro system because of its greater capabilities; however, we are aware that funding limitations exist so provided the Leica system as an alternative.

JUSTIFICATION - OTHER COSTS

The TCSO will use confidential funds to identify criminal elements, build cases for successful prosecution, and obtain evidence to justify the issuance of search warrants. The Project Director has requested \$2,400 in confidential funds to complete two (2) operations each month during the funding year. Obtaining confidential funds is the third priority of the TCSO for this funding opportunity. The primary purpose will include the purchase of evidence and/or contraband such as drugs, firearms, and stolen property required to determine the existence of a crime or to establish the identity of a participant in a crime. The TCSO has been conducting investigations since fall of 2007 using the same \$100 of confidential funds. Neither the department nor the County Commission has authorized use of additional confidential funds. This limits the number of concurrent investigations and the scope of investigations. Investigators now only use the funds when there is a guaranteed short-term retrieval of the funds so other investigations can occur. The limited funds also prevent the TCSO from conducting more than one operation at a time. The Program Director said the availability of confidential funds could explode the TCSO's capabilities to identify and prosecute criminals. Although he has set a goal of completing 24 operations with confidential funds in the next funding cycle, he said the opportunity for double that may exist.

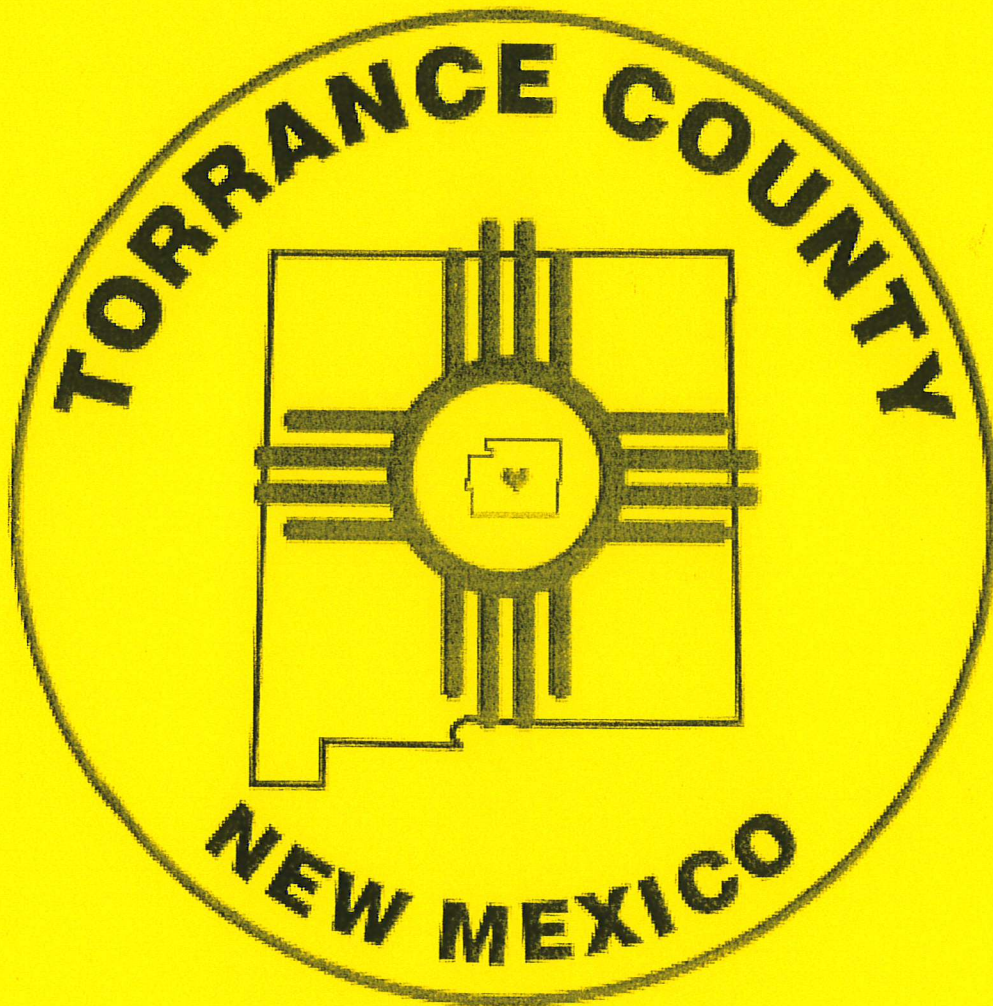

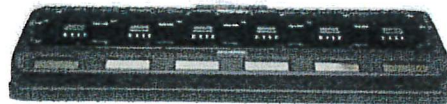

1. **General:** When the State Purchasing Agent or his/her designee issues a purchase document in response to the Vendor's bid, a binding contract is created.
2. **Variation in Quantity:** No variation in the quantity of any item called for by this order will be accepted unless such variation has been caused by conditions of loading, shipping, packing or allowances in manufacturing process and then only to the extent, if any, specified in this order.
3. **Assignment:**
 - a. Neither the order, nor any interest therein, nor any claim thereunder, shall be assigned or transferred by the Vendor, except as set forth in Subparagraph 3b or as expressly authorized in writing by the State Purchasing Agent or his/her designee. No such assignment or transfer shall relieve the Vendor from the obligations and liabilities under this order.
 - b. Vendor agrees that any and all claims for overcharge resulting from antitrust violations which are borne by the State as to goods, services, and materials purchased in connection with this bid are hereby assigned to the State.
4. **State Furnished Property:** State furnished property shall be returned to the State upon request in the same condition as received except for ordinary wear, tear and modifications ordered hereunder.
5. **Discounts:** Prompt payment discounts will not be considered in computing the low bid.
6. **Inspection:** Final inspection and acceptance will be made at the destination. Supplies rejected at the destination for nonconformance with specifications shall be removed at the Vendor's risk and expense, promptly after notice of rejection.

12. Non-Collusion: In signing this bid the Vendor certifies he/she has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with this offer submitted to the State Purchasing Agent or his/her designee.

The records shall be subject to inspection by the Agency, State Purchasing Division, Department of Finance and Administration, and for Information Technology contracts, State Chief Information Officer. The Agency shall have the right to audit billings, both before and after payment. Payment for services under this Price Agreement shall not foreclose the right of the Agency to recover excessive or illegal payments.

22. Subcontracts: The foregoing requirements for Contractor Personnel, Subcontracting, and Audit shall be inserted into all subcontracts from the prime contractor to the subcontractor.

General

This is a Statewide Price Agreement; therefore, there is no guarantee of the minimum quantities of items or services to be purchased.

Offerors submitting bids must be authorized employees of the company they represent who can fulfill all terms and conditions of the resulting Statewide Price Agreement.

Multiple Awards

Pursuant to the Procurement Code, Sections 13-1-153 and 13-1-154 the State reserves the right to issue multiple awards to obtain the items listed. Multiple awards are recommended to insure availability and timely delivery.

Awards will be made to meet the best interests of the State of New Mexico.

Term

The term of this agreement shall be for a two (2) year term from date of award with the option to extend every two (2) years up to a maximum of ten (10) years; by mutual agreement of all parties and approval of the New Mexico State Purchasing Agent at the same price, terms and conditions. This agreement shall not exceed ten (10) years.

D. District Standards. The following standards apply to all land uses within this zone district:

For purposes of determining minimum lot size, the calculation of acreage shall include common easements and private roadways for ingress and egress for adjoining lots. A shared domestic well permitted under Section 72-12-1 NMSA 1978 does not qualify as a "centralized water system."

2. A proposed land use must comply with Section 23, pertaining to water usage.
[REV: Ord. No. 97-7, 6/27/97; Ord. No. 2008-003, 4/23/08]
3. Inoperable vehicles or vehicles which have no current registration or licensing stored on a parcel of land are limited to two (2) on a 1/2 acre lot. Additional inoperable or un-registered vehicles may be allowed at one (1) per additional acre of land but in no case shall exceed five (5) regardless of parcel acreage. Inoperable vehicles stored on a property shall be kept from view behind a wall and have body parts and glazing intact.
[REV: Ord. No. 2008-003, 4/23/08]
4. Raising, breeding, management, and sales of livestock, subject to the following requirements:
 - a. Areas devoted to livestock shall be maintained to discourage the concentration and breeding of insects and rodents which are detrimental to human habitation;
 - b. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of livestock to allow such livestock to run at large on public right-of-way;
 - c. The number of livestock on the parcel shall not exceed an average density of one head per two acres;
[REV: Ord. No. 2001-2, 3/14/01]
 - d. The above described restriction does not apply to animals for non-commercial use as follows:
 - 1) A lot ranging between 1/2 acre and 1 acre in area, may support no more than two (2) horses or two (2) cows or

lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land; however, "subdivider" does not include any duly licensed real estate broker or salesperson acting on another's account

subdivision

Division of a surface area of land, including land within a previously approved subdivision, into two or more parcels for the purpose of sale, lease, or other conveyance; or for building development, whether immediate or future; however, "subdivision" does not include:

- 1) sale, lease, or other conveyance of any parcel that is forty (40) acres (or 1/16 of a section) or larger in size within any twelve (12) month period; provided that the land has been used primarily and continuously for agricultural purposes, in accordance with §7-36-20 NMSA 1978, for the preceding three (3) years; and provided further that any residual parcel or parcels resulting from a land division comply with the minimum lot standards for the appropriate zoning district as established by the Torrance County Zoning Ordinance; [REV: Ord. No. 2008-004, 4/23/08]
- 2) sale or lease of apartments, offices, stores or similar space within a building;
- 3) division of land within the boundaries of a municipality;
- 4) division of land in which only gas, oil, mineral or water rights are severed from the surface ownership of the land;
- 5) division of land created by court order where the order creates no more than one parcel per party;
- 6) division of land for grazing or farming activities, provided the land continues to be used for grazing or farming activities;
- 7) division of land resulting only in the alteration of parcel boundaries where parcels are altered

the statement of record.

6.2.7. Advertising standards. The advertising standards covering the sale, lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land provided in Article Five/Section 4 of these Regulations shall be applicable to summary review plats.

6.2.8. Certifications. Upon approval of the summary review plat, the following certifications shall be made and indicated by signature on the plat map:

- a. land surveyor who prepared the plat;
- b. authorized representatives of relevant public utility companies whose services will be required for the subdivision;
- c. Chairman of the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission;
- d. Torrance County Rural Addressing Department;
- e. Torrance County Assessor; and
- f. Torrance County Treasurer.

ARTICLE 7. SPECIAL PROCEDURES

Section 7.1. Succeeding Subdivisions

7.1.1. Standards. Any proposed subdivision may be combined with a previous subdivision and upgraded for classification purposes by the Board of County Commissioners if the proposed subdivision includes:

- a. A part of a previous subdivision that has been created in the preceding seven (7) year period; or
- b. Any land retained by a subdivider after creating a previous subdivision if the previous subdivision was created in the preceding seven (7) year period.

Section 7.2. Resubdivision

7.2.1. Definition. Resubdivision shall include any change to a lot line, right-of-way line, or utility easement, unless the change is the result of a vacation of plats or a variance granted by action of the Board of County Commissioners.

7.2.2. Procedure. All or a portion of any final plat filed in the office of the County Clerk may be resubdivided by the same procedures



1. Claim of Exemption #13: 5 year Claim of Exemption

Site: Being a portion of the N2, SE4, Section 28, Lands of McKenzie Land and Livestock Company, T.9N., R.14E., NMPM
Zone: Special Use, Pastura Wind LLC

Director Goen explained Action Item 1 was Claim of Exemption 13, Five Year Claim of Exemption. This was a substation for infrastructure for the wind farms. This was within a Special Use and the five-acre parcel was allowed. The Special Use District takes precedence over the A district that this was originally. Everything appeared in order. The plat looked good, easements were included. **Jeremy Turner** was representing the McKenzie Land and Livestock Company. **Director Goen** swore in Mr. Turner. **Mr. Turner** explained he was the Director of New Mexico Project Development for Pattern Energy. This was for a 5 acre substation parcel. This would be in the middle of the wind farm. This was very similar to what the Board acted on previously under the Western Spirit Wind project. At that time, it was on the Clines Corners Wind Farm. This was something the Board had seen before and approved. Mr. Turner explained the Sun Zia transmission line would take all of the wind power from the county to the western market. Pattern had been in the permitting process, as this committee was aware, for a number of years. Pattern had received a final environmental impact statement and record of decision from BLM for that project. This was a 550 mile transmission line. It had been underway since 2006. Pattern had received the record of decision in May and expected to receive the notice to proceed later this month. Pattern had already broken ground on the converter station sites. There was an 80-acre site off of Torrance County Road that has already been graded. Pattern had also done the grading work and was in the process of finalizing that work in Arizona for the western converter station. This would be the largest investment in clean energy in U.S. history and the largest wind farm in the Western Hemisphere. Wind farms associated with it would be about 3500 Mega Watts, located primarily in Torrance and Lincoln County. There was a small portion in San Miguel County. Pattern expected to start site grading and clearing activities, grubbing activities for the wind farm here in July and August, with plans to go ahead and complete financing by October 1. Once financing was complete, it would total about \$10 billion. Pattern expected to start full construction later this fall. From that point construction in Torrance County would begin about October of this year through about April of 2026. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** motioned to approve; **Mrs. Estrada** seconded the motion. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if the 5-acres was a lease agreement. Mr. Turner explained it would be a purchase of those five acres.

2. Conditional Use Permit: Commercial Greenhouse operation

Applicant: Ted Roybal

Agent: Self

Site: Lot 6, being a portion of Tract B-2, Lands of Bennett, Section 29, T.7N., R.8E., NMPM

Zone: AP-5, Agricultural Preservation, 5 acre minimum

Director Goen explained Action Item 2. Item two was a Conditional Use permit for a Commercial Greenhouse operation. The applicant was **Ted Roybal**. They had worked together on this as Mr. Roybal was putting this together for full understanding by both parties of what was being proposed to take place here. This was one of the better applications that **Director Goen** had seen looking at various aspects in regard to location, business plan and water availability. **Director Goen** recommended approval. **Ted Roybal** came forward and was sworn. He explained the application for a Conditional Use permit for a Commercial Greenhouse operation. The plan was five to seven container storage units, for cannabis cultivation. There would be no outside traffic coming through. The operation was strictly for cultivation. Everything else would be packaged and distributed outside of the location. **Chairman Frost** inquired if there was anyone to speak in favor or opposition. There were none. **Chairman Frost** asked where the location was. **Mr. Roybal** explained the location and noted another operation in the area. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** noted there was a residence on the property were there were any other residences close to the site? **Mr. Roybal** explained there were no neighboring properties on the same side of the road and on the opposite side they were a good distance away.

Vice Chairman DuCharme asked about security measures. **Mr. Roybal** explained they would have 24-hour security and a fence that met the requirements of the State. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked what the State fencing requirements were. **Mr. Roybal** explained his understanding was a six-foot fence. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about water rights. **Mr. Roybal** explained he currently had 44.25-acre feet. **Mrs. Estrada** asked how many existing farms were on Howell Road. **Director Goen** asked if she meant other preexisting operations. He believed there were two which were well back off the road. What development that there was in the area was sparse. It was mostly sectionalized parcels with people doing small farming operations or just living out there in the open prairie. **Mrs. Johnston** asked if this would be a storage facility also. **Mr. Roybal** explained it would be cultivation and storage of product. **Mrs. Johnston** motioned to approve; **Vice Chairman DuCharme** seconded the motion. **Chairman Frost** asked for any further discussion. There was none.

Director Goen explained the next four items on the Agenda were Public Hearings. The Director gave a brief explanation.

3. Renewal of Solid Waste District

Applicant:	Special Waste Disposal (Keers Industries)
Agent:	Adrian Montano
Site:	Within the N2 of Section 19 and within the NW4 of Section 20, T.2N., R.8E. NMPM and being addressed as 91 Liberty Valley Road.
Zone:	Solid Waste Management District (SW)

Director Goen explained Action Item # 3. The renewal of the Solid Waste District for the Special Waste Disposal, Keers Industries. Special Waste had been at this site for around 30 years. This was an annual renewal that was required under section 16 of the ordinance, Proper documentation has been provided, including the most recent inspections by the New Mexico State Environmental department. There has been no significant change. Everything was in order. This was basically a routine renewal that's been done many times before. **Mr. Adrian Montano** was sworn. He presented his request to continue business in Torrance County. Special Waste had a good relationship in the area and was located in Mountainair. They were the only facility in the area that accepted asbestos waste. Special Waste had no violations. The interim review was included in the package, which showed they were doing everything as required by the State. **Chairman DuCharme** asked if they were speaking principally about asbestos. **Mr. Montano** explained that was all they were permitted for.

Vice Chairman DuCharme asked the frequency they were inspected. **Mr. Montano** explained no less than once a year. They could come as frequently as they chose. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** inquired if there was danger of air particles where people could breathe them. **Mr. Montano** explained everything accepted was already contained. That means there was no breach, nothing had been exposed to the elements. Once waste was deposited inside the earth, it did not become available for anyone to ingest. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if they ceased operation in high winds. **Mr. Montano** explained it was required. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if they watered down the site. **Mr. Montano** explained all materials were contained. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** thought Special Waste accepted other hazardous waste. **Mr. Montano** explained they had a land farm adjacent to the landfill and that handled hydro-carbonated soils, but that was different altogether. It was not hazardous and was a petroleum product. Uv's abated the product. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked how many more years they thought they could use the property? **Mr. Montano** explained another two and a half decades. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** understood each year Special Waste must supplement a fund for monitoring and closure. **Mr. Montano** explained there was a post closure requirement. **Chairman Frost** commented this had always been very well run. **Mrs. Johnston** asked how many years Special Waste had been there, and how many current employees they had. **Mr. Montano** explained going back to the late 1980s. They had five employees. Four resided in Torrance County. **Chairman Frost** motioned to approve; **Vice Chairman DuCharme** seconded the motion.

4. Summary Review: Create Type 3 Subdivision

Applicant: Investment Company of the Southwest, Inc
Agent: Oden & Associates, Tim Oden
Site: Lot: 21 Block: 1, Woodland Hills Subdivision
Zone: RR, Rural Residential, 1 acre minimum

Director Goen explained Action Item 4. This was a Summary Review to create a Type Three subdivision. The applicant was the Investment company of Southwest. Mr. Tim Oden with Oden and Associates was acting as agent. The application was in order. Under Article 6 of the Subdivision Regulations and under Section 11 of the Ordinance, this was in compliance, and in order. This was an allowable action, even though we're subdividing within this subdivision. **Director Goen** explained it stated in Rural Residential Ordinance that if a parcel was connected to a centralized water system, minimum lot size was one acre. All of these proposed parcels were above that. Items four and five were related to one another. It was the same action but they're not quite adjoining properties. There were a couple of parcels that intervene, but same action for both. **Mr. Oden** and I had discussed, and been in touch with New Mexico Water Service. The Board was familiar with them from previous applications. NM Water Service had provided a letter of intent to provide water service to these parcels when they become developed. **Mr. Tim Oden** was sworn in. Oden and Associates was the agent for Investment Company of the Southwest on items four and five on the agenda today. Both these items were a request to divide existing lots within Woodland Hill subdivision, first being lot 21. Lot 21 was near the middle to the west side of the subdivision. The northwest corner of lot 21 shows on the plat, the easement to the water tank. This was where the water storage tank was located. To give an idea of where this was, lot 21 was originally four acres. **Bob Tinley** of Investment Company of the Southwest has owned this property since the early to mid-80s. It was subdivided and subsequently the subdivision plat was recorded in Torrance County in 1997. A few lots in the subdivision were left as big lots for different reasons. Most of the lots in the subdivision were two acres thereabouts throughout the subdivision. This application today was a request to divide some of these bigger lots into lots that were more commonly expected throughout the subdivision. As **Director Goen** had explained, they had contacted the water company and requested a letter of intent to serve, a will serve letter that they were ready, willing, and able to serve water to these lots when they were developed. than two and a half acre lots.

A letter of confirmation from the water company that these lots can be served had been received, thus making them eligible under RR to be less None of these lots were within the 100-year flood plain. **Chairman Frost** asked for those in favor or against. **Mr. Ed McGee** came forward and was sworn. He owned Pride Real Estate and was the preferred agent for Clayton Homes of Bernalillo. They had developed and placed homes in Woodland Hills. They had no opposition to the lots being divided. The concern they had was Bob Tinley not maintaining the roads inside Woodland Hills, particularly Woodland Hills Road. There were no stop signs, road signs or street signs in the subdivision. He was getting texts and calls from clients, Clayton Homes of Bernalillo, the Clayton Homes team, and CMH Homes. The concern was with parcels divided, and more people added, those roads were just going to continue to deteriorate. This needed to be addressed because these were not public roads at this time. Per the County, these were not public roads, these were private. He believed one of the lots that they were dividing bordered Martinez Road. There was already one house that the driveway outlet was onto Martinez Road. In his opinion there were better outlets for driveways. This was a very blind spot. Martinez was getting busier and busier. He repeated they were not opposed to the lots being divided. Their concern was the infrastructure of the subdivision. Making sure that the infrastructure would support more houses, and currently it would not. **Mr. Oden** asked to cross examine Mr. McGee.

Mr. Oden, "Who do you represent here today?" **Mr. McGee**, "Clayton Homes of Bernalillo." **Mr. Oden**, "Do you have an authorization letter from them to represent them in this hearing?" **Mr. McGee**, "Not with me, I do not." **Mr. Oden**, "Ok, Are you aware of the original disclosure statement for Woodland Hills?" **Mr. McGee**, "Yes." **Mr. Oden**, "And, according to that, who was supposed to maintain the roads in Woodland Hills subdivision." **Mr. McGee**, "The development company. and when it gets to a certain point it's supposed to go to an HOA." **Mr. Oden**, "Has it gotten to that point yet?" **Mr. McGee**, "To my knowledge yes it has gotten to that point but the HOA has not been activated." **Mr. Oden**, "Who activates the HOA?" **Mr. McGee**, "The developer." **Mr. Oden**, "So once Mr. Tinley activates the HOA all of the people out there will be taking care of these roads. Is that correct?" **Mr. McGee**, "That is correct." **Mr. Oden**, "Thank you."

Mr. Oden explained he and Mr. Tinley had discussed the need to activate the HOA. He was aware it was his responsibility to take care of the roads out there until such time as the HOA became activated. The disclosure statement that was submitted contained a statement for maintenance of the subdivision that the HOA will maintain these roads. It was anticipated the HOA would be activated by the end of the year before these lots were developed. Mr. Tinley was also aware of the need to do some repairs and maintenance of the roads before he turned them over to the HOA. It wouldn't be fair to turn them over in the shape they in. However, there really wouldn't be anything to prevent that because the people that are out there had created the damage to the roads, not Mr. Tinley, the developer. The people that lived there created the situation with the roads, and they should be taking care of them. The county did not accept the maintenance of these roads when the subdivision was approved. It was up to the people that lived there to take care of the roads. Mr. Oden was not aware that any of them had made any effort to do anything at this time. They were not organized. He understood Mr. Tinley had received calls from individuals, but not as a group. We were in the process of trying to resolve that. Mr. Tinley still owned a significant amount of lots in the subdivision that he would develop in the future. **Director Goen** explained any driveways access to Martinez would be looked at by Planning and Zoning at the time that the development was applied for. In regard to the internal roads, as had been mentioned here, was that the county did not accept maintenance of those roads. It was an issue that needed to be settled between the developer and the property owners within that subdivision. **Chairman Frost** motioned to approve Action Item 4. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** seconded. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about emergency service distance to the subdivision. **Mr. Oden** noted the Fire Station on Lexco Road and another at Indian Hills. Calls would be routed through Dispatch. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked how many homes were in the subdivision at present. **Mr. Oden** responded he thought about 25, could be 35. There had been robust growth in the last year, but the subdivision was not even half developed yet. **Director Goen** referred to the previous plat and explained there were 136 lots in the subdivision. This was not an indication of how many had been developed.

Mr. Oden explained generally developers did not usually go forward with the HOA until it was about 75 percent sold out. **Mr. Tinley** was aware of the maintenance issues that needed to be addressed. General discussion took place. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** inquired about the community water system, New Mexico Water Service Company. He was concerned there were no restrictions on the maximum amount of water any lot may use. We were all dependent on a closed basin here. In terms of the State Engineer, weren't there limitations on the amount of water that could be used. **Mr. Oden** explained yes, The amount of water the water company could pump was a matter of the State Engineers' limitations. Therefore, the developer does not put any limitations for water use from a third-party water company. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about State Engineers enforcement. **Mr. Oden** explained, say you could pump 50 acre feet. The water company could give it all to one guy or could give to 200 people, that was water company business. After that, they could not pump anymore. If the water company felt they were getting close to the theoretical 50 acre feet they could choose to not except any additional customers until additional water was secured. At any time, your water company could enforce, could initiate water restrictive covenants on a per lot basis. Generally, water companies have a reasonable or low rate for water service for the first, say, 3000 gallons per month, and after that, those rates go up fast to discourage people from using or wasting a lot of water. They use an economic hammer, really, rather than a covenant. **Mrs. Johnston** inquired about the purpose of the action item. **Mr. Oden** responded Item four was taking one four-acre lot and making two, two acre lots. There were some lots left larger when these were divided years ago, he'd like to make them all more uniform. **Mrs. Johnston** asked for confirmation the roads were not County and were privately maintained. **Mr. Oden** confirmed they were private, and it was up to private maintenance to take care of the roads. **Mrs. Johnston** asked for confirmation an HOA was not active. **Mr. Oden** confirmed and explained the formation and responsibilities of an HOA. **Mrs. Johnston** explained the Board's responsibility today was to enforce the Ordinance. If by her vote today she was increasing the availability of lots and a potential buyer came in, there currently was no HOA, no way to maintain roads, would she be acting in the public good. **Mr. Tinley** or Clayton Homes had no obligation to say it was a private road and the County would not maintain it. Coupling that with the questions of water...the only way they would get a road would be if they did something, or **Mr. Tinley** did something. She saw two immovable objects. **Mrs. Johnston** asked County Attorney Mike Garcia, her ethical responsibility, where did it come in and take over the Ordinance? Because according to Planning and Zoning this was something they could do legitimately. **County Attorney Michael Garcia**, "Mr. Chair, Commissioner Johnston, I understand your ethical concern, but I think the main concern is to apply the ordinance as is. I think one partial answer to the question is that the County can only do so much as it concerns relationships between private parties, developers, and homeowners. At some point, it does become the responsibility of those individuals to make things work." **Mrs. Estrada** stated she was along the same lines as **Mrs. Johnston**. There were 130 some odd lots. They weren't being sold. To her these lots would be divided as he was looking at the best interest of himself. **Mrs. Estrada** explained that sometimes ordinances were wrong and needed to be addressed. **Chairman Frost** commented, we have public roads. We're talking about a county road here, and he lived on a county road. He actually lived on a rural street next to it, and had always considered it his driveway. There were two or three other homes behind him. He explained they all shared in the road maintenance. **Mr. Oden** explained no one had ever offered to help with the roads. The roads had always been **Mr. Tinley's** responsibility. The roads had been there since 1997 and were 25 years old. Obviously, someone had been taking care of the roads. **Mr. Tinley** was nowhere near half sold out. The original disclosure statement does not require him to turn it over to an HOA until 75% sold, which was what he was trying to do. It was in his best interest to turn the roads over to the HOA. Until then he had a vested interest in selling more lots, and it was in his best interest to take care of it.

Roll Call:

Vice Chairman DuCharme: No, Mrs. Estrada: Aye, Mrs. Johnston: No, Chairman Frost: Aye. Motion denied, Dead Lock.

There was discussion on procedure when there was a tie vote.

5. Summary Review: Create Type 3 Subdivision

Director Goen explained this was the same as Action Item 4 except it was two lots going to four. General discussion took place. **Chairman Frost** asked for those in favor or opposed. **Mr. McGee** returned to the podium. He explained he had the same concerns as before. He acknowledged Mr. Tinsley had maintained the roads. There was a resident inside of Woodland Hills that was also maintaining the road. Clayton Holmes of Bernalillo had brought in 50 tons of gravel. Clayton Homes had torn up that road and knew that. Mr. Tinley had paid for it to be spread. He was maintaining the roads, but not on a consistent basis. He repeated they were not opposed to the lots being split. They just wanted something to be done with the roads to make it easier to get in. **Chairman Frost** motioned to approve item # 5. **Mrs. Estrada** seconded. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** explained the Ordinances were for the good and this area had been overdeveloped, like a lot of other places in our county, and it was over-subdivided. It would make more of a subdivision out of it if approved. He thought it had to stop here before they could organize themselves and become an HOA.

6. Special Use: RV Park with Gas pumps

Director Goen explained Action Item 6. This was a request to establish a Special Use district for an RV park with gas pumps. The applicants were Donald and Carol Ansley. This was in the Cattle Country subdivision and much of the infrastructure has already been established, power lines being set also the water system. The physical location was south and west of the 203 exit. The plat shows the full northern strip was several 1.79-acre parcels. This area was zoned D-2. There were a couple of parcels that were within the Cattle Country Estates zoned RR. There was a 150,000-gallon storage tank. Through discussion with Carol Ansley, they've already been proactively pursuing the different aspects of this. They had a bid from York Septic systems. York did this in compliance with the State Environmental requirements. Water was already there, power was already nearby, there were some details that weren't included in the packet here in regard to the fuel pump aspect of this, which Dawn Harwell would address. **Mrs. Dawn Harwell** was sworn in, acting as Agent. They were applying for a Special Use at the Longhorn Ranch RV Park. Phase 1 would include 50 RV spaces, the office, laundry, bath, 24-hour credit card fuel pump, fuel storage tanks, a pavilion and a little barbecue area. Phase two would add approximately 30 additional spaces should they ever be needed in the future. All subdivision requirements have been met for this property, the water percolation test, archaeological and cultural resources. The fuel storage tanks would both be above ground. There would be a containment wall or a double wall, whichever was called for, containing 7500-gallon diesel and regular, two tanks.

If everything was approved, then they would go through the regulations on everything there. **Director Goen** explained New Mexico has a Petroleum Storage Tank Bureau. They dealt specifically with this sort of thing. The walls and the double walls and the containment that she's discussing was per their regulations. If you remember, when Alamos Terminal was going in they had contacted the same outfit and the Bureau said the regulations didn't apply. They were too large. In a case like this, they do. **Chairman Frost** asked for any to speak for or against. There were none. **Mrs. Estrada** motioned to approve action item 6. **Mrs. Johnston** seconded the motion. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if the fuel pumps would include diesel? **Mrs. Harwell** responded that they have it regulated for different tanks, diesel and a regular un-leaded. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked what the economic impact may be on Moriarty. **Mrs. Harwell** replied that it would be difficult to have an RV park with no diesel. Noting that most large pick-ups and RVs are diesel. They had talked about putting a truck stop across the street from where they are planning on the RV park. But that's all changed, she did not know what they were doing, but they had spoken about that. She don't know if they were looking at doing a large-scale pump because they wanted to do the 24-hour where they could pay there. She was not sure that they wanted to make it a truck stop where the trucks want to come, but maybe available where they could if they needed to. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about the RV park on the North side of I-40. **Mrs. Harwell** responded that there were twelve spaces and it's limited. They were full constantly. This was why they were in belief of the benefits of the RV Park at this location. **Chairman Frost** inquired further of parking. **Mrs. Harwell** explained that there was parking all along the south side. **Chairman Frost** ask would there be like a convenience store or anything. **Mrs. Harwell** explained there would be an office, laundry, bath. It could be something we look at down the road. It was not something they had talked about currently. They may have a few items. There was no current plan for a convenience store. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if they had a partner developer? **Mrs. Harwell** replied, her parents, and they had access to equipment from previous businesses. They owned equipment where they could do a lot themselves but there would be some subcontracting. They had already spoken to a couple electricians. There was discussion of inclement weather. **Chairman Frost** commented there were 3 truck stops in Moriarty and they were busy. He believed no matter what, they would be busy. **Mrs. Harwell** agreed. **Chairman Frost** called for any further discussion. There was none.

Vice Chairman DuCharme made a motion to exit the Public Hearing. **Mrs. Estrada** seconded.

D. District Standards. The following standards apply to all land uses within this zone district:

 - a. Areas devoted to livestock shall be maintained to discourage the concentration and breeding of insects and rodents which are detrimental to human habitation;
 - b. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of livestock to allow such livestock to run at large on public right-of-way;
 - c. The number of livestock on the parcel shall not exceed an average density of one head per two acres;
[REV: Ord. No. 2001-2, 3/14/01]
 - d. The above described restriction does not apply to animals for non-commercial use as follows:
 - 1) A lot ranging between 1/2 acre and 1 acre in area, may support no more than two (2) horses or two (2) cows or

lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land; however, "subdivider" does not include any duly licensed real estate broker or salesperson acting on another's account

subdivision

Division of a surface area of land, including land within a previously approved subdivision, into two or more parcels for the purpose of sale, lease, or other conveyance; or for building development, whether immediate or future; however, "subdivision" does not include:

- 1) sale, lease, or other conveyance of any parcel that is forty (40) acres (or 1/16 of a section) or larger in size within any twelve (12) month period; provided that the land has been used primarily and continuously for agricultural purposes, in accordance with §7-36-20 NMSA 1978, for the preceding three (3) years; and provided further that any residual parcel or parcels resulting from a land division comply with the minimum lot standards for the appropriate zoning district as established by the Torrance County Zoning Ordinance; [REV: Ord. No. 2008-004, 4/23/08]
- 2) sale or lease of apartments, offices, stores or similar space within a building;
- 3) division of land within the boundaries of a municipality;
- 4) division of land in which only gas, oil, mineral or water rights are severed from the surface ownership of the land;
- 5) division of land created by court order where the order creates no more than one parcel per party;
- 6) division of land for grazing or farming activities, provided the land continues to be used for grazing or farming activities;
- 7) division of land resulting only in the alteration of parcel boundaries where parcels are altered

the statement of record.

6.2.7. Advertising standards. The advertising standards covering the sale, lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land provided in Article Five/Section 4 of these Regulations shall be applicable to summary review plats.

6.2.8. Certifications. Upon approval of the summary review plat, the following certifications shall be made and indicated by signature on the plat map:

- a. land surveyor who prepared the plat;
- b. authorized representatives of relevant public utility companies whose services will be required for the subdivision;
- c. Chairman of the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission;
- d. Torrance County Rural Addressing Department;
- e. Torrance County Assessor; and
- f. Torrance County Treasurer.

ARTICLE 7. SPECIAL PROCEDURES

Section 7.1. Succeeding Subdivisions

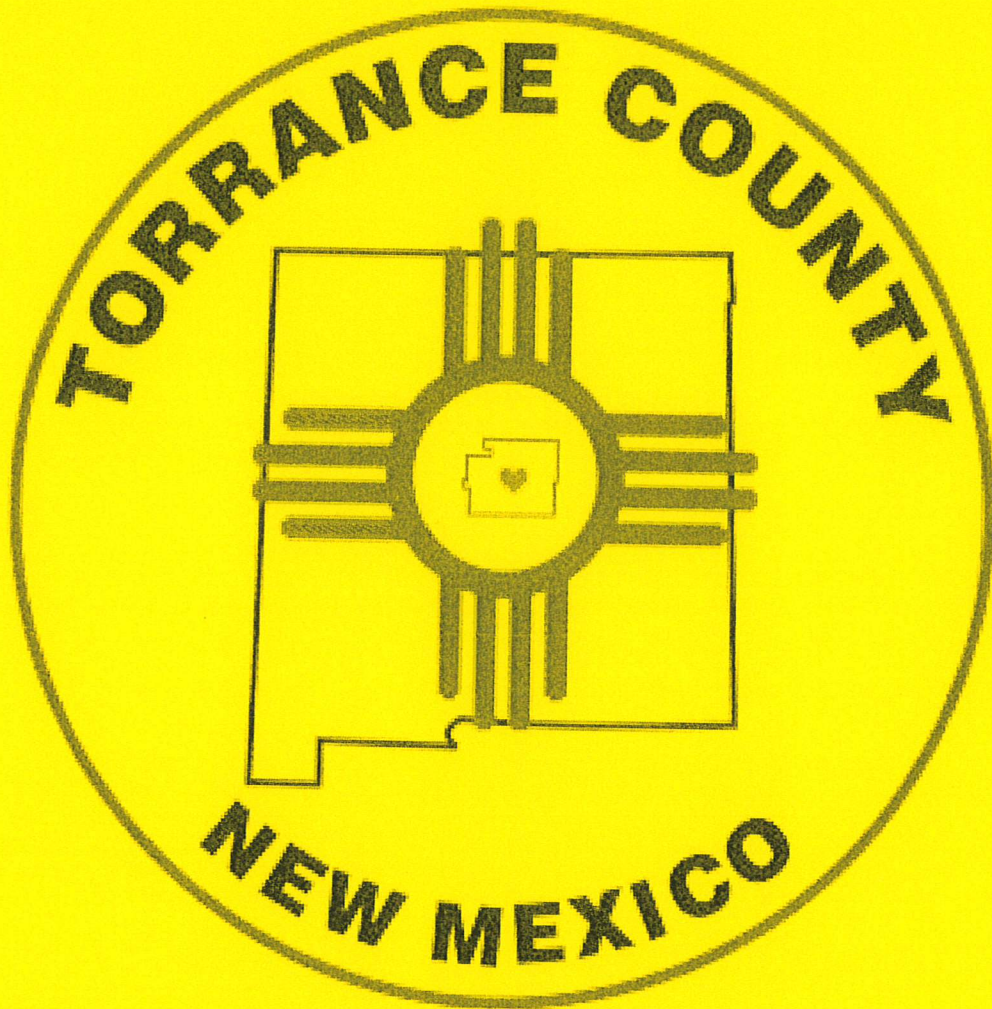
7.1.1. Standards. Any proposed subdivision may be combined with a previous subdivision and upgraded for classification purposes by the Board of County Commissioners if the proposed subdivision includes:

- a. A part of a previous subdivision that has been created in the preceding seven (7) year period; or
- b. Any land retained by a subdivider after creating a previous subdivision if the previous subdivision was created in the preceding seven (7) year period.

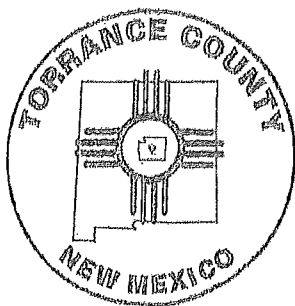
Section 7.2. Resubdivision

7.2.1. Definition. Resubdivision shall include any change to a lot line, right-of-way line, or utility easement, unless the change is the result of a vacation of plats or a variance granted by action of the Board of County Commissioners.

7.2.2. Procedure. All or a portion of any final plat filed in the office of the County Clerk may be resubdivided by the same procedures

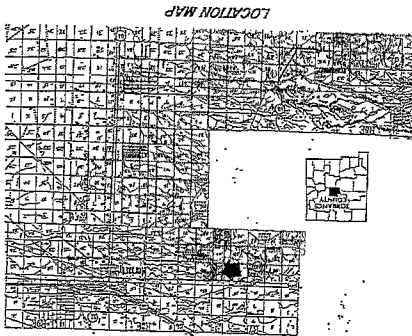

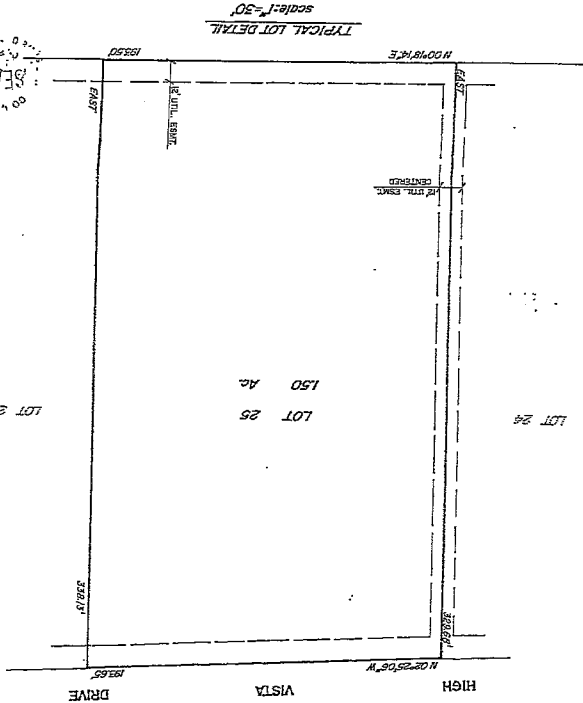

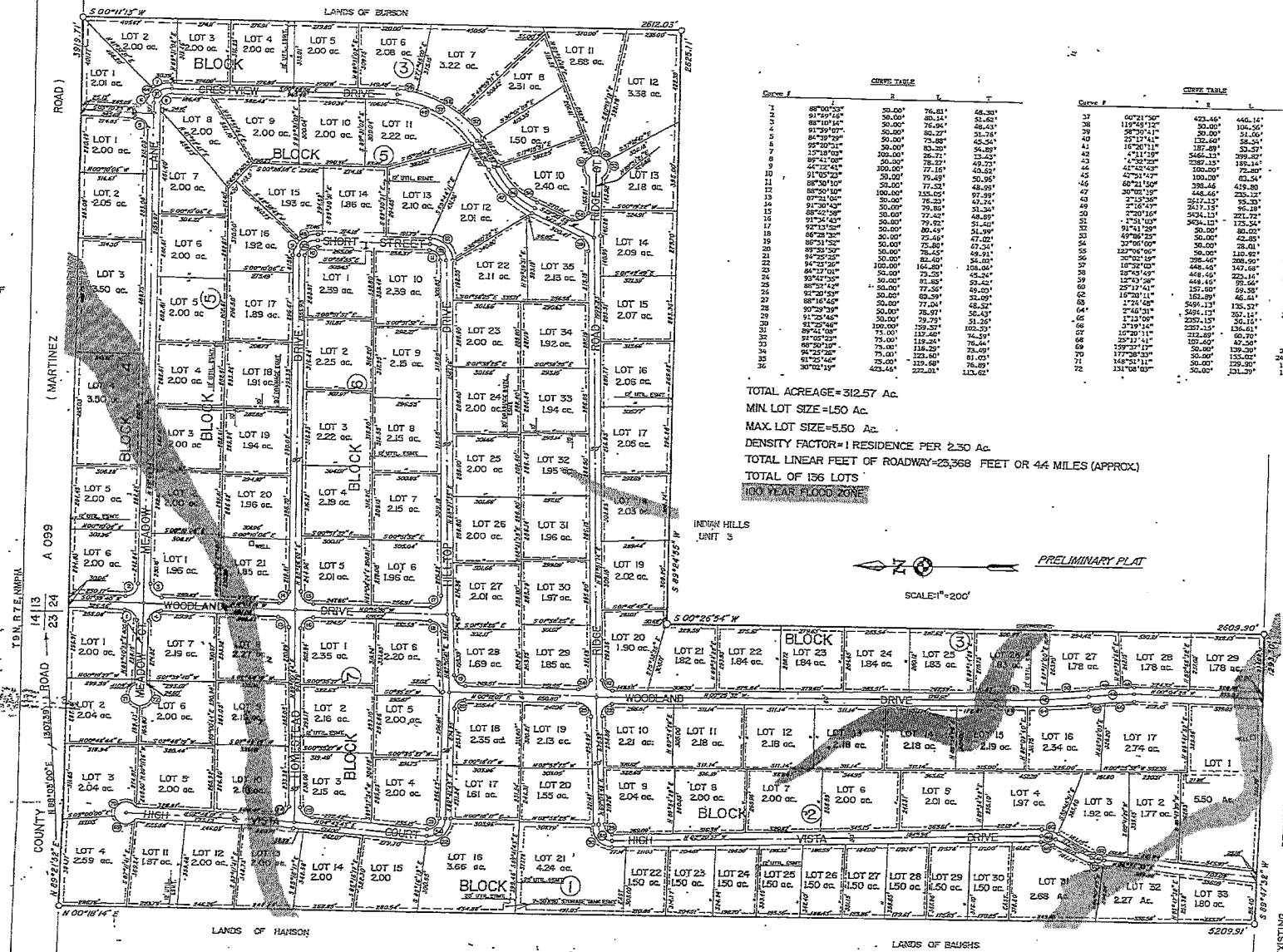

D. District Standards. The following standards apply to all land uses within this zone district:

Inoperable vehicles stored on a property shall be kept from view behind a wall and have body parts and glazing intact.

4. Raising, breeding, management, and sales of livestock, subject to the following requirements:

6.2.7. Advertising standards. The advertising standards covering the sale, lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land provided in Article Five/Section 4 of these Regulations shall be applicable to summary review plats.

6.2.8. Certifications. Upon approval of the summary review plat, the following certifications shall be made and indicated by signature on the plat map:

- a. land surveyor who prepared the plat;
- b. authorized representatives of relevant public utility companies whose services will be required for the subdivision;
- c. Chairman of the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission;
- d. Torrance County Rural Addressing Department;
- e. Torrance County Assessor; and
- f. Torrance County Treasurer.

ARTICLE 7. SPECIAL PROCEDURES

Section 7.1. Succeeding Subdivisions

7.1.1. Standards. Any proposed subdivision may be combined with a previous subdivision and upgraded for classification purposes by the Board of County Commissioners if the proposed subdivision includes:

- a. A part of a previous subdivision that has been created in the preceding seven (7) year period; or
- b. Any land retained by a subdivider after creating a previous subdivision if the previous subdivision was created in the preceding seven (7) year period.

Section 7.2. Resubdivision

7.2.1. Definition. Resubdivision shall include any change to a lot line, right-of-way line, or utility easement, unless the change is the result of a vacation of plats or a variance granted by action of the Board of County Commissioners.

7.2.2. Procedure. All or a portion of any final plat filed in the office of the County Clerk may be resubdivided by the same procedures

Site: Being a portion of the N2, SE4, Section 28, Lands of McKenzie Land and Livestock Company, T.9N., R.14E., NMPM
Zone: Special Use, Pastura Wind LLC

Director Goen explained Action Item 1 was Claim of Exemption 13, Five Year Claim of Exemption. This was a substation for infrastructure for the wind farms. This was within a Special Use and the five-acre parcel was allowed. The Special Use District takes precedence over the A district that this was originally. Everything appeared in order. The plat looked good, easements were included. **Jeremy Turner** was representing the McKenzie Land and Livestock Company. **Director Goen** swore in Mr. Turner. **Mr. Turner** explained he was the Director of New Mexico Project Development for Pattern Energy. This was for a 5 acre substation parcel. This would be in the middle of the wind farm. This was very similar to what the Board acted on previously under the Western Spirit Wind project. At that time, it was on the Clines Corners Wind Farm. This was something the Board had seen before and approved. Mr. Turner explained the Sun Zia transmission line would take all of the wind power from the county to the western market. Pattern had been in the permitting process, as this committee was aware, for a number of years. Pattern had received a final environmental impact statement and record of decision from BLM for that project. This was a 550 mile transmission line. It had been underway since 2006. Pattern had received the record of decision in May and expected to receive the notice to proceed later this month. Pattern had already broken ground on the converter station sites. There was an 80-acre site off of Torrance County Road that has already been graded. Pattern had also done the grading work and was in the process of finalizing that work in Arizona for the western converter station. This would be the largest investment in clean energy in U.S. history and the largest wind farm in the Western Hemisphere. Wind farms associated with it would be about 3500 Mega Watts, located primarily in Torrance and Lincoln County. There was a small portion in San Miguel County. Pattern expected to start site grading and clearing activities, grubbing activities for the wind farm here in July and August, with plans to go ahead and complete financing by October 1. Once financing was complete, it would total about \$10 billion. Pattern expected to start full construction later this fall. From that point construction in Torrance County would begin about October of this year through about April of 2026. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** motioned to approve; **Mrs. Estrada** seconded the motion. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if the 5-acres was a lease agreement. Mr. Turner explained it would be a purchase of those five acres.

2. Conditional Use Permit: Commercial Greenhouse operation

Applicant: Ted Roybal
Agent: Self
Site: Lot 6, being a portion of Tract B-2, Lands of Bennett, Section 29, T.7N., R.8E., NMPM
Zone: AP-5, Agricultural Preservation, 5 acre minimum

Director Goen explained Action Item 2. Item two was a Conditional Use permit for a Commercial Greenhouse operation. The applicant was **Ted Roybal**. They had worked together on this as Mr. Roybal was putting this together for full understanding by both parties of what was being proposed to take place here. This was one of the better applications that **Director Goen** had seen looking at various aspects in regard to location, business plan and water availability. **Director Goen** recommended approval. **Ted Roybal** came forward and was sworn. He explained the application for a Conditional Use permit for a Commercial Greenhouse operation. The plan was five to seven container storage units, for cannabis cultivation. There would be no outside traffic coming through. The operation was strictly for cultivation. Everything else would be packaged and distributed outside of the location. **Chairman Frost** inquired if there was anyone to speak in favor or opposition. There were none. **Chairman Frost** asked where the location was. **Mr. Roybal** explained the location and noted another operation in the area. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** noted there was a residence on the property were there were any other residences close to the site? **Mr. Roybal** explained there were no neighboring properties on the same side of the road and on the opposite side they were a good distance away.

Vice Chairman DuCharme asked about security measures. **Mr. Roybal** explained they would have 24-hour security and a fence that met the requirements of the State. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked what the State fencing requirements were. **Mr. Roybal** explained his understanding was a six-foot fence. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about water rights. **Mr. Roybal** explained he currently had 44.25-acre feet. **Mrs. Estrada** asked how many existing farms were on Howell Road. **Director Goen** asked if she meant other preexisting operations. He believed there were two which were well back off the road. What development that there was in the area was sparse. It was mostly sectionalized parcels with people doing small farming operations or just living out there in the open prairie. **Mrs. Johnston** asked if this would be a storage facility also. **Mr. Roybal** explained it would be cultivation and storage of product. **Mrs. Johnston** motioned to approve; **Vice Chairman DuCharme** seconded the motion. **Chairman Frost** asked for any further discussion. There was none.

Director Goen explained the next four items on the Agenda were Public Hearings. The Director gave a brief explanation.

3. Renewal of Solid Waste District

Applicant: Special Waste Disposal (Keers Industries)
Agent: Adrian Montano
Site: Within the N2 of Section 19 and within the NW4 of Section 20, T.2N., R.8E. NMPM and being addressed as 91 Liberty Valley Road.
Zone: Solid Waste Management District (SW)

Director Goen explained Action Item # 3. The renewal of the Solid Waste District for the Special Waste Disposal, Keers Industries. Special Waste had been at this site for around 30 years. This was an annual renewal that was required under section 16 of the ordinance, Proper documentation has been provided, including the most recent inspections by the New Mexico State Environmental department. There has been no significant change. Everything was in order. This was basically a routine renewal that's been done many times before. **Mr. Adrian Montano** was sworn. He presented his request to continue business in Torrance County. Special Waste had a good relationship in the area and was located in Mountainair. They were the only facility in the area that accepted asbestos waste. Special Waste had no violations. The interim review was included in the package, which showed they were doing everything as required by the State. **Chairman DuCharme** asked if they were speaking principally about asbestos. **Mr. Montano** explained that was all they were permitted for.

Vice Chairman DuCharme asked the frequency they were inspected. **Mr. Montano** explained no less than once a year. They could come as frequently as they chose. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** inquired if there was danger of air particles where people could breathe them. **Mr. Montano** explained everything accepted was already contained. That means there was no breach, nothing had been exposed to the elements. Once waste was deposited inside the earth, it did not become available for anyone to ingest. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if they ceased operation in high winds. **Mr. Montano** explained it was required. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if they watered down the site. **Mr. Montano** explained all materials were contained. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** thought Special Waste accepted other hazardous waste. **Mr. Montano** explained they had a land farm adjacent to the landfill and that handled hydro-carbonated soils, but that was different altogether. It was not hazardous and was a petroleum product. Uv's abated the product. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked how many more years they thought they could use the property? **Mr. Montano** explained another two and a half decades. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** understood each year Special Waste must supplement a fund for monitoring and closure. **Mr. Montano** explained there was a post closure requirement. **Chairman Frost** commented this had always been very well run. **Mrs. Johnston** asked how many years Special Waste had been there, and how many current employees they had. **Mr. Montano** explained going back to the late 1980s. They had five employees. Four resided in Torrance County. **Chairman Frost** motioned to approve; **Vice Chairman DuCharme** seconded the motion.

4. Summary Review: Create Type 3 Subdivision

Applicant: Investment Company of the Southwest, Inc
Agent: Oden & Associates, Tim Oden
Site: Lot: 21 Block: 1, Woodland Hills Subdivision
Zone: RR, Rural Residential, 1 acre minimum

Director Goen explained Action Item 4. This was a Summary Review to create a Type Three subdivision. The applicant was the Investment company of Southwest. Mr. Tim Oden with Oden and Associates was acting as agent. The application was in order. Under Article 6 of the Subdivision Regulations and under Section 11 of the Ordinance, this was in compliance, and in order. This was an allowable action, even though we're subdividing within this subdivision. **Director Goen** explained it stated in Rural Residential Ordinance that if a parcel was connected to a centralized water system, minimum lot size was one acre. All of these proposed parcels were above that. Items four and five were related to one another. It was the same action but they're not quite adjoining properties. There were a couple of parcels that intervene, but same action for both. Mr. Oden and I had discussed, and been in touch with New Mexico Water Service. The Board was familiar with them from previous applications. NM Water Service had provided a letter of intent to provide water service to these parcels when they become developed. **Mr. Tim Oden** was sworn in. Oden and Associates was the agent for Investment Company of the Southwest on items four and five on the agenda today. Both these items were a request to divide existing lots within Woodland Hill subdivision, first being lot 21. Lot 21 was near the middle to the west side of the subdivision. The northwest corner of lot 21 shows on the plat, the easement to the water tank. This was where the water storage tank was located. To give an idea of where this was, lot 21 was originally four acres. Bob Tinley of Investment Company of the Southwest has owned this property since the early to mid-80s. It was subdivided and subsequently the subdivision plat was recorded in Torrance County in 1997. A few lots in the subdivision were left as big lots for different reasons. Most of the lots in the subdivision were two acres thereabouts throughout the subdivision. This application today was a request to divide some of these bigger lots into lots that were more commonly expected throughout the subdivision. As **Director Goen** had explained, they had contacted the water company and requested a letter of intent to serve, a will serve letter that they were ready, willing, and able to serve water to these lots when they were developed. than two and a half acre lots.

A letter of confirmation from the water company that these lots can be served had been received, thus making them eligible under RR to be less None of these lots were within the 100-year flood plain. **Chairman Frost** asked for those in favor or against. **Mr. Ed McGee** came forward and was sworn. He owned Pride Real Estate and was the preferred agent for Clayton Homes of Bernalillo. They had developed and placed homes in Woodland Hills. They had no opposition to the lots being divided. The concern they had was Bob Tinley not maintaining the roads inside Woodland Hills, particularly Woodland Hills Road. There were no stop signs, road signs or street signs in the subdivision. He was getting texts and calls from clients, Clayton Homes of Bernalillo, the Clayton Homes team, and CMH Homes. The concern was with parcels divided, and more people added, those roads were just going to continue to deteriorate. This needed to be addressed because these were not public roads at this time. Per the County, these were not public roads, these were private. He believed one of the lots that they were dividing bordered Martinez Road. There was already one house that the driveway outlet was onto Martinez Road. In his opinion there were better outlets for driveways. This was a very blind spot. Martinez was getting busier and busier. He repeated they were not opposed to the lots being divided. Their concern was the infrastructure of the subdivision. Making sure that the infrastructure would support more houses, and currently it would not. **Mr. Oden** asked to cross examine Mr. McGee.

Mr. Oden, "Who do you represent here today?" **Mr. McGee**, "Clayton Homes of Bernalillo." **Mr. Oden**, "Do you have an authorization letter from them to represent them in this hearing?" **Mr. McGee**, "Not with me, I do not." **Mr. Oden**, "Ok, Are you aware of the original disclosure statement for Woodland Hills?" **Mr. McGee**, "Yes." **Mr. Oden**, "And, according to that, who was supposed to maintain the roads in Woodland Hills subdivision?" **Mr. McGee**, "The development company. and when it gets to a certain point it's supposed to go to an HOA." **Mr. Oden**, "Has it gotten to that point yet?" **Mr. McGee**, "To my knowledge yes it has gotten to that point but the HOA has not been activated." **Mr. Oden**, "Who activates the HOA?" **Mr. McGee**, "The developer." **Mr. Oden**, "So once Mr. Tinley activates the HOA all of the people out there will be taking care of these roads. Is that correct?" **Mr. McGee**, "That is correct." **Mr. Oden**, "Thank you."

Mr. Oden explained he and Mr. Tinley had discussed the need to activate the HOA. He was aware it was his responsibility to take care of the roads out there until such time as the HOA became activated. The disclosure statement that was submitted contained a statement for maintenance of the subdivision that the HOA will maintain these roads. It was anticipated the HOA would be activated by the end of the year before these lots were developed. Mr. Tinley was also aware of the need to do some repairs and maintenance of the roads before he turned them over to the HOA. It wouldn't be fair to turn them over in the shape they in. However, there really wouldn't be anything to prevent that because the people that are out there had created the damage to the roads, not Mr. Tinley, the developer. The people that lived there created the situation with the roads, and they should be taking care of them. The county did not accept the maintenance of these roads when the subdivision was approved. It was up to the people that lived there to take care of the roads. Mr. Oden was not aware that any of them had made any effort to do anything at this time. They were not organized. He understood Mr. Tinley had received calls from individuals, but not as a group. We were in the process of trying to resolve that. Mr. Tinley still owned a significant amount of lots in the subdivision that he would develop in the future. **Director Goen** explained any driveways access to Martinez would be looked at by Planning and Zoning at the time that the development was applied for. In regard to the internal roads, as had been mentioned here, was that the county did not accept maintenance of those roads. It was an issue that needed to be settled between the developer and the property owners within that subdivision. **Chairman Frost motioned** to approve Action Item 4. **Vice Chairman DuCharme seconded**. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about emergency service distance to the subdivision. **Mr. Oden** noted the Fire Station on Lexco Road and another at Indian Hills. Calls would be routed through Dispatch. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked how many homes were in the subdivision at present. **Mr. Oden** responded he thought about 25, could be 35. There had been robust growth in the last year, but the subdivision was not even half developed yet. **Director Goen** referred to the previous plat and explained there were 136 lots in the subdivision. This was not an indication of how many had been developed.

Mr. Oden explained generally developers did not usually go forward with the HOA until it was about 75 percent sold out. **Mr. Tinley** was aware of the maintenance issues that needed to be addressed. General discussion took place. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** inquired about the community water system, New Mexico Water Service Company. He was concerned there were no restrictions on the maximum amount of water any lot may use. We were all dependent on a closed basin here. In terms of the State Engineer, weren't there limitations on the amount of water that could be used. **Mr. Oden** explained yes, The amount of water the water company could pump was a matter of the State Engineers' limitations. Therefore, the developer does not put any limitations for water use from a third-party water company. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about State Engineers enforcement. **Mr. Oden** explained, say you could pump 50 acre feet. The water company could give it all to one guy or could give to 200 people, that was water company business. After that, they could not pump anymore. If the water company felt they were getting close to the theoretical 50 acre feet they could choose to not except any additional customers until additional water was secured. At any time, your water company could enforce, could initiate water restrictive covenants on a per lot basis. Generally, water companies have a reasonable or low rate for water service for the first, say, 3000 gallons per month, and after that, those rates go up fast to discourage people from using or wasting a lot of water. They use an economic hammer, really, rather than a covenant. **Mrs. Johnston** inquired about the purpose of the action item. **Mr. Oden** responded Item four was taking one four-acre lot and making two, two acre lots. There were some lots left larger when these were divided years ago, he'd like to make them all more uniform. **Mrs. Johnston** asked for confirmation the roads were not County and were privately maintained. **Mr. Oden** confirmed they were private, and it was up to private maintenance to take care of the roads. **Mrs. Johnston** asked for confirmation an HOA was not active. **Mr. Oden** confirmed and explained the formation and responsibilities of an HOA. **Mrs. Johnston** explained the Board's responsibility today was to enforce the Ordinance. If by her vote today she was increasing the availability of lots and a potential buyer came in, there currently was no HOA, no way to maintain roads, would she be acting in the public good. **Mr. Tinley** or Clayton Homes had no obligation to say it was a private road and the County would not maintain it. Coupling that with the questions of water...the only way they would get a road would be if they did something, or **Mr. Tinley** did something. She saw two immovable objects. **Mrs. Johnston** asked County Attorney Mike Garcia, her ethical responsibility, where did it come in and take over the Ordinance? Because according to Planning and Zoning this was something they could do legitimately. **County Attorney Michael Garcia**, "Mr. Chair, Commissioner Johnston, I understand your ethical concern, but I think the main concern is to apply the ordinance as is. I think one partial answer to the question is that the County can only do so much as it concerns relationships between private parties, developers, and homeowners. At some point, it does become the responsibility of those individuals to make things work." **Mrs. Estrada** stated she was along the same lines as **Mrs. Johnston**. There were 130 some odd lots. They weren't being sold. To her these lots would be divided as he was looking at the best interest of himself. **Mrs. Estrada** explained that sometimes ordinances were wrong and needed to be addressed. **Chairman Frost** commented, we have public roads. We're talking about a county road here, and he lived on a county road. He actually lived on a rural street next to it, and had always considered it his driveway. There were two or three other homes behind him. He explained they all shared in the road maintenance. **Mr. Oden** explained no one had ever offered to help with the roads. The roads had always been **Mr. Tinley's** responsibility. The roads had been there since 1997 and were 25 years old. Obviously, someone had been taking care of the roads. **Mr. Tinley** was nowhere near half sold out. The original disclosure statement does not require him to turn it over to an HOA until 75% sold, which was what he was trying to do. It was in his best interest to turn the roads over to the HOA. Until then he had a vested interest in selling more lots, and it was in his best interest to take care of it.

Roll Call:

Vice Chairman DuCharme: No, Mrs. Estrada: Aye, Mrs. Johnston: No, Chairman Frost: Aye. Motion denied, Dead Lock.

There was discussion on procedure when there was a tie vote.

5. Summary Review: Create Type 3 Subdivision

Director Goen explained this was the same as Action Item 4 except it was two lots going to four. General discussion took place. **Chairman Frost** asked for those in favor or opposed. **Mr. McGee** returned to the podium. He explained he had the same concerns as before. He acknowledged Mr. Tinsley had maintained the roads. There was a resident inside of Woodland Hills that was also maintaining the road. Clayton Holmes of Bernalillo had brought in 50 tons of gravel. Clayton Homes had torn up that road and knew that Mr. Tinley had paid for it to be spread. He was maintaining the roads, but not on a consistent basis. He repeated they were not opposed to the lots being split. They just wanted something to be done with the roads to make it easier to get in. **Chairman Frost** motioned to approve item # 5. **Mrs. Estrada** seconded. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** explained the Ordinances were for the good and this area had been overdeveloped, like a lot of other places in our county, and it was over-subdivided. It would make more of a subdivision out of it if approved. He thought it had to stop here before they could organize themselves and become an HOA.

Vice Chairman DuCharme: No, Mrs. Estrada: Aye, Mrs. Johnston: No, Chairman Frost: Aye. Motion denied, Dead Lock.

6. Special Use: RV Park with Gas pumps

Applicant: Donald & Carol Ansley
 Agent: Self
 Site: Lots 14 & 15 Block 1, Lots 14 & 15 Block 2, Cattle Country Subdivision
 Zone: D-2, Major Development District, RR, Rural

Director Goen explained Action Item 6. This was a request to establish a Special Use district for an RV park with gas pumps. The applicants were Donald and Carol Ansley. This was in the Cattle Country subdivision and much of the infrastructure has already been established, power lines being set also the water system. The physical location was south and west of the 203 exit. The plat shows the full northern strip was several 1.79-acre parcels. This area was zoned D-2. There were a couple of parcels that were within the Cattle Country Estates zoned RR. There was a 150,000-gallon storage tank. Through discussion with Carol Ansley, they've already been proactively pursuing the different aspects of this. They had a bid from York Septic systems. York did this in compliance with the State Environmental requirements. Water was already there, power was already nearby, there were some details that weren't included in the packet here in regard to the fuel pump aspect of this, which Dawn Harwell would address. **Mrs. Dawn Harwell** was sworn in, acting as Agent. They were applying for a Special Use at the Longhorn Ranch RV Park. Phase 1 would include 50 RV spaces, the office, laundry, bath, 24-hour credit card fuel pump, fuel storage tanks, a pavilion and a little barbecue area. Phase two would add approximately 30 additional spaces should they ever be needed in the future. All subdivision requirements have been met for this property, the water percolation test, archaeological and cultural resources. The fuel storage tanks would both be above ground. There would be a containment wall or a double wall, whichever was called for, containing 7500-gallon diesel and regular, two tanks.

If everything was approved, then they would go through the regulations on everything there. **Director Goen** explained New Mexico has a Petroleum Storage Tank Bureau. They dealt specifically with this sort of thing. The walls and the double walls and the containment that she's discussing was per their regulations. If you remember, when Alamos Terminal was going in they had contacted the same outfit and the Bureau said the regulations didn't apply. They were too large. In a case like this, they do. **Chairman Frost** asked for any to speak for or against. There were none. **Mrs. Estrada** motioned to approve action item 6. **Mrs. Johnston** seconded the motion. **Chairman Frost** asked for discussion. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if the fuel pumps would include diesel? **Mrs. Harwell** responded that they have it regulated for different tanks, diesel and a regular un-leaded. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked what the economic impact may be on Moriarty. **Mrs. Harwell** replied that it would be difficult to have an RV park with no diesel. Noting that most large pick-ups and RVs are diesel. They had talked about putting a truck stop across the street from where they are planning on the RV park. But that's all changed, she did not know what they were doing, but they had spoken about that. She don't know if they were looking at doing a large-scale pump because they wanted to do the 24-hour where they could pay there. She was not sure that they wanted to make it a truck stop where the trucks want to come, but maybe available where they could if they needed to. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked about the RV park on the North side of I-40. **Mrs. Harwell** responded that there were twelve spaces and it's limited. They were full constantly. This was why they were in belief of the benefits of the RV Park at this location. **Chairman Frost** inquired further of parking. **Mrs. Harwell** explained that there was parking all along the south side. **Chairman Frost** ask would there be like a convenience store or anything. **Mrs. Harwell** explained there would be an office, laundry, bath. It could be something we look at down the road. It was not something they had talked about currently. They may have a few items. There was no current plan for a convenience store. **Vice Chairman DuCharme** asked if they had a partner developer? **Mrs. Harwell** replied, her parents, and they had access to equipment from previous businesses. They owned equipment where they could do a lot themselves but there would be some subcontracting. They had already spoken to a couple electricians. There was discussion of inclement weather. **Chairman Frost** commented there were 3 truck stops in Moriarty and they were busy. He believed no matter what, they would be busy. **Mrs. Harwell** agreed. **Chairman Frost** called for any further discussion. There was none.

Roll Call: **Mrs. Johnston: Aye, Mrs. Estrada: Aye, Vice Chairman DuCharme: Aye, Chairman Frost: Aye. Motion carried.**

Vice Chairman DuCharme made a motion to exit the Public Hearing. **Mrs. Estrada** seconded.

D. District Standards. The following standards apply to all land uses within this zone district:

1. Minimum lot size shall be two and one-half acres for dwelling units served by individual private wells, and one acre for dwelling units with connections to a centralized water system. For purposes of determining minimum lot size, the calculation of acreage shall include common easements and private roadways for ingress and egress for adjoining lots. A shared domestic well permitted under Section 72-12-1 NMSA 1978 does not qualify as a "centralized water system."
[REV: Ord. No. 2001-2, 3/14/01; Ord. No. 2008-003, 4/23/08]
2. A proposed land use must comply with Section 23, pertaining to water usage.
[REV: Ord. No. 97-7, 6/27/97; Ord. No. 2008-003, 4/23/08]
3. Inoperable vehicles or vehicles which have no current registration or licensing stored on a parcel of land are limited to two (2) on a 1/2 acre lot. Additional inoperable or un-registered vehicles may be allowed at one (1) per additional acre of land but in no case shall exceed five (5) regardless of parcel acreage. Inoperable vehicles stored on a property shall be kept from view behind a wall and have body parts and glazing intact.
[REV: Ord. No. 2008-003, 4/23/08]
4. Raising, breeding, management, and sales of livestock, subject to the following requirements:
 - a. Areas devoted to livestock shall be maintained to discourage the concentration and breeding of insects and rodents which are detrimental to human habitation;
 - b. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of livestock to allow such livestock to run at large on public right-of-way;
 - c. The number of livestock on the parcel shall not exceed an average density of one head per two acres;
[REV: Ord. No. 2001-2, 3/14/01]
 - d. The above described restriction does not apply to animals for non-commercial use as follows:
 - 1) A lot ranging between 1/2 acre and 1 acre in area, may support no more than two (2) horses or two (2) cows or

lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land; however, "subdivider" does not include any duly licensed real estate broker or salesperson acting on another's account

Division of a surface area of land, including land within a previously approved subdivision, into two or more parcels for the purpose of sale, lease, or other conveyance; or for building development, whether immediate or future; however, "subdivision" does not include:

- 1) sale, lease, or other conveyance of any parcel that is forty (40) acres (or 1/16 of a section) or larger in size within any twelve (12) month period; provided that the land has been used primarily and continuously for agricultural purposes, in accordance with §7-36-20 NMSA 1978, for the preceding three (3) years; and provided further that any residual parcel or parcels resulting from a land division comply with the minimum lot standards for the appropriate zoning district as established by the Torrance County Zoning Ordinance; [REV: Ord. No. 2008-004, 4/23/08]
- 2) sale or lease of apartments, offices, stores or similar space within a building;
- 3) division of land within the boundaries of a municipality;
- 4) division of land in which only gas, oil, mineral or water rights are severed from the surface ownership of the land;
- 5) division of land created by court order where the order creates no more than one parcel per party;
- 6) division of land for grazing or farming activities, provided the land continues to be used for grazing or farming activities;
- 7) division of land resulting only in the alteration of parcel boundaries where parcels are altered

the statement of record.

6.2.7. Advertising standards. The advertising standards covering the sale, lease, or other conveyance of subdivided land provided in Article Five/Section 4 of these Regulations shall be applicable to summary review plats.

6.2.8. Certifications. Upon approval of the summary review plat, the following certifications shall be made and indicated by signature on the plat map:

- a. land surveyor who prepared the plat;
- b. authorized representatives of relevant public utility companies whose services will be required for the subdivision;
- c. Chairman of the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission;
- d. Torrance County Rural Addressing Department;
- e. Torrance County Assessor; and
- f. Torrance County Treasurer.

ARTICLE 7. SPECIAL PROCEDURES

Section 7.1. Succeeding Subdivisions

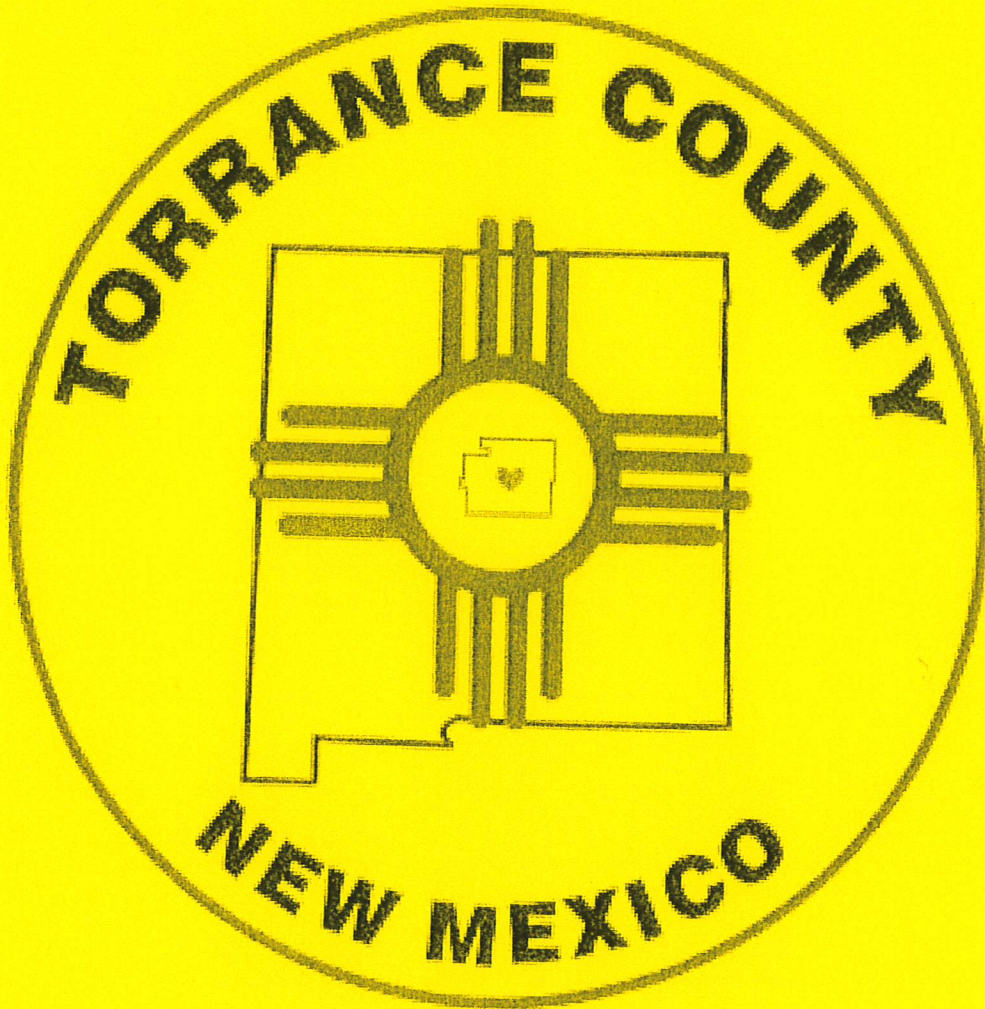
7.1.1. Standards. Any proposed subdivision may be combined with a previous subdivision and upgraded for classification purposes by the Board of County Commissioners if the proposed subdivision includes:

- a. A part of a previous subdivision that has been created in the preceding seven (7) year period; or
- b. Any land retained by a subdivider after creating a previous subdivision if the previous subdivision was created in the preceding seven (7) year period.

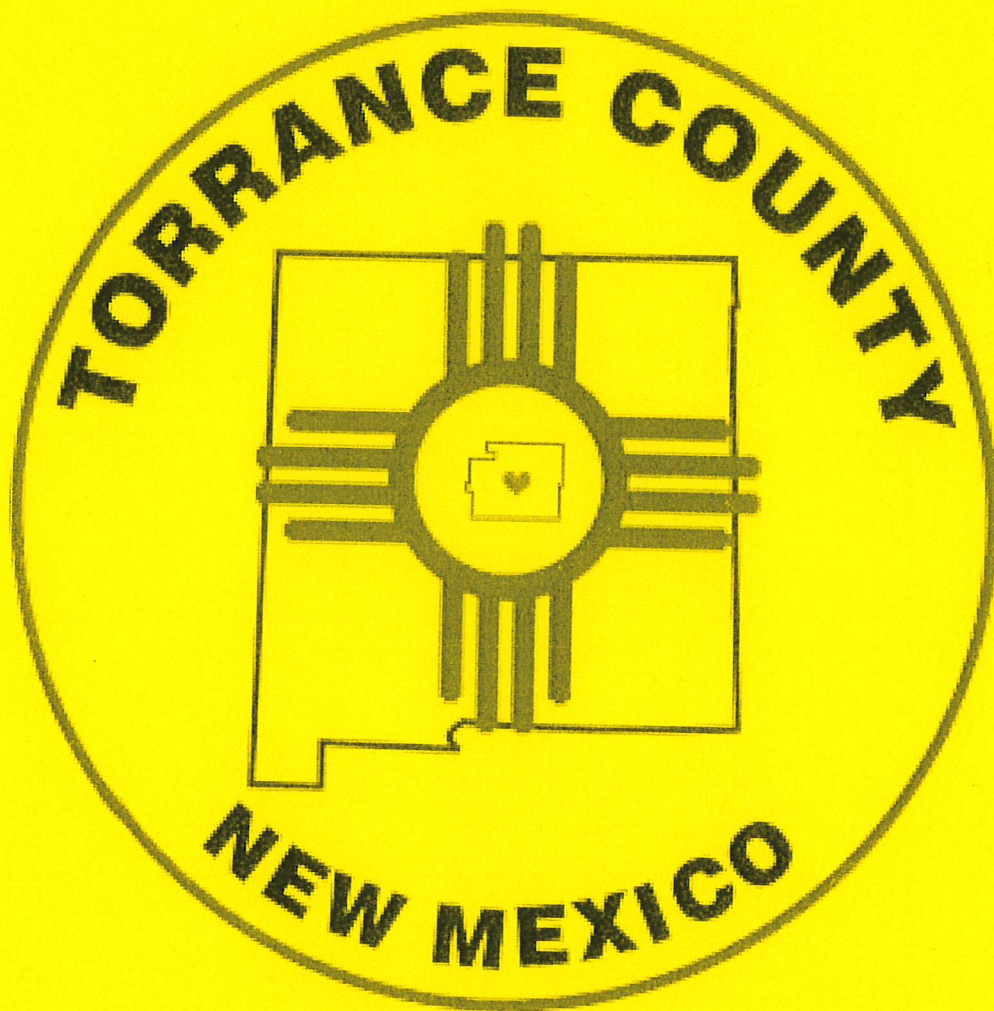
Section 7.2. Resubdivision

7.2.1. Definition. Resubdivision shall include any change to a lot line, right-of-way line, or utility easement, unless the change is the result of a vacation of plats or a variance granted by action of the Board of County Commissioners.

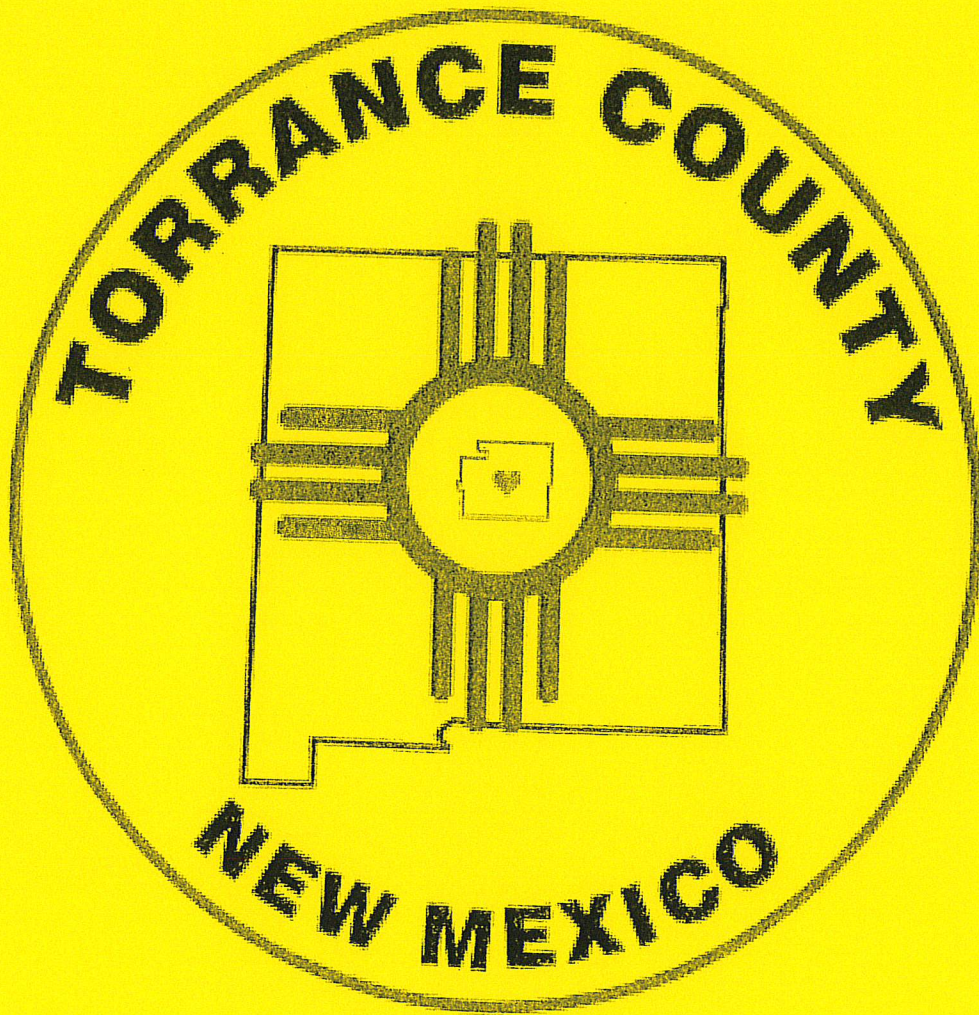
7.2.2. Procedure. All or a portion of any final plat filed in the office of the County Clerk may be resubdivided by the same procedures



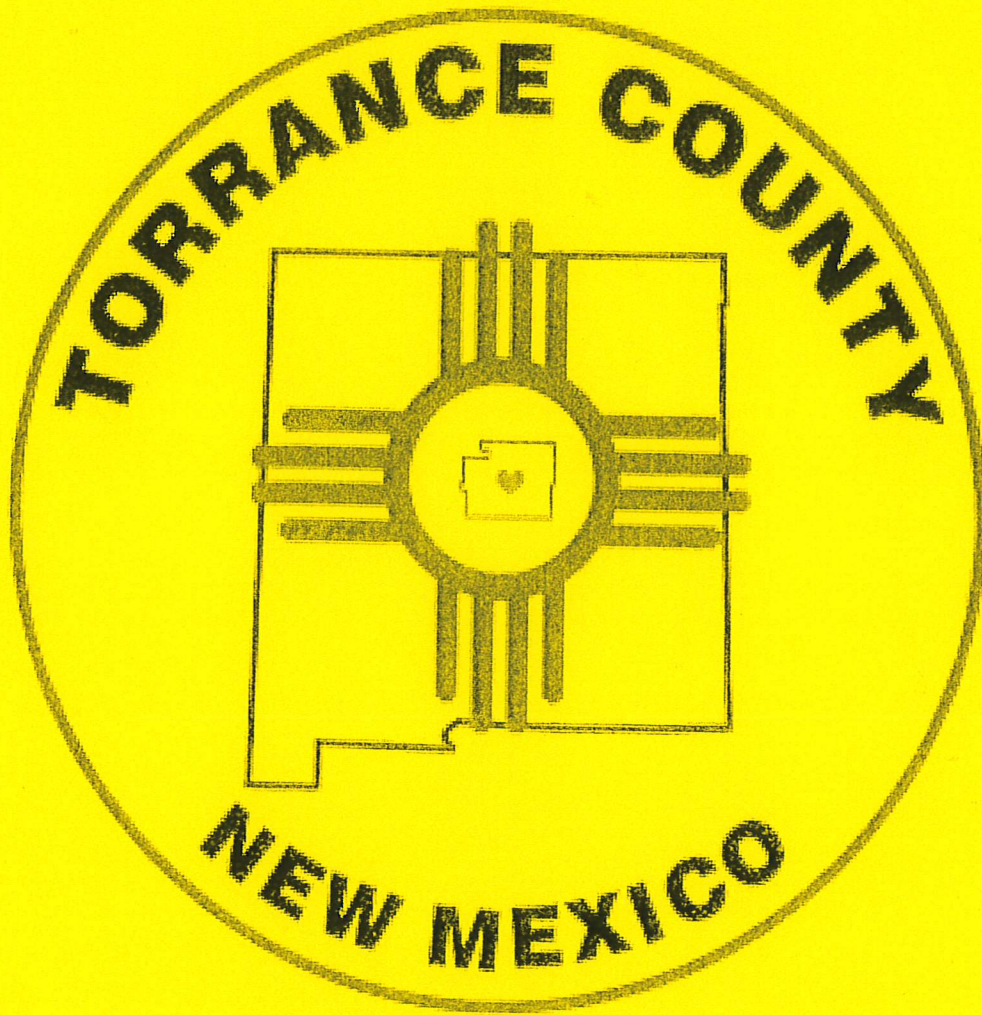
