Call Meeting to Order:

Chairman Sanchez calls the meeting to order at 2:05 pm and calls for a Commission Roll Call. Commission District 1- Present, Commission District 2- Present, Commission District 3- Present. Mr. Nick Sedillo, Risk Manager, leads us in the pledge and Ms. Annette Ortiz, Interim County Manager, gives the invocation.

Approval of the Meeting Agenda:

Chairman Sanchez asks for a motion to approve today's Meeting Agenda. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve today's meeting agenda. Chairman Sanchez seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Executive Session begins at 3:15 PM

RECONVENE FROM EXECUTIVE SESSION

ACTION TAKEN: Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to reconvene from Executive session, where the Commission discussed limited personnel matters regarding the hiring of a County Manager. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Regular Session reconvened at 1:30 pm.

1. Road Policy Workshop Ms. Annette Ortiz, Interim County Manager speaks. The Commission had requested this meeting with the Road Department to review the Road Policy, specifically because Chairman Sanchez was not on the Commission when the current Road Policy was adopted. Each Commissioner has been presented with a copy of the current Road Policy. (A copy of the policy is included in the file for this meeting.)

Chairman Sanchez asks if it is possible to go into Closed Session to discuss this. Mr. Wallin states that he does not see a basis to go into Closed Session.

Chairman Sanchez asks for input from the Road Department about what might improve their ability and capacity to do their job. Mr. Leonard Lujan, Road Department Superintendent, speaks. He states that he finally has a full crew and both of his crews are out working. His construction crew is out doing FEMA projects and his blade guys are out blading in teams.

Mr. Lujan states that the one thing that would really help them out would be going back to using 9 machines. He states that he wants to go with 6 machines having pneumatic rollers in the back and 3 machines without. One guy would pull ditches, back slopes, and the other guys would be working just the tops of roads. With the rollers behind the machines, they would roll every single road that they worked on. They would not have to depend on traffic to help compact the roads. Mr. Lujan further comments that a zipper would also make a big difference. They could crush the material in their pit down to a regular size. They could re-fix their chip seal roads better with the zipper too. Chairman Sanchez asks if the acquisition of this equipment would require more personnel. Mr. Lujan states no, it would not.

Mr. Lujan states that the Road Department should be getting to all of their roads quarterly. Some roads need to be maintained more often. He states that now that he finally has a full crew (15 workers), things are getting better.

In terms of hauling material, Mr. Lujan states that the Department has 4 new rigs and they have been running non-stop. They are currently working on their FEMA projects in Encino.

Mr. Lujan states that he is currently working on his equipment leases. There is a new contract that they can go through that will allow for a 9 year lease instead of the current 5 year which will help a lot. Commissioner Frost asks if the Road Department does most of the maintenance on the blades themselves. Mr. Lujan replies that Josh, our mechanic, does the oil changes. Otherwise, we have a machine warranty for 5 years, and now we will have an extended warranty for the remaining 4 years. He states that after one year, we can return any piece of equipment that we don't need without any penalty.

Mr. Lujan clarifies that he will have to go out for bid for a zipper and is planning on purchasing a 6 foot zipper, which will cost approximately \$180,000.00, or \$38,000.00 per year. He also comments that leasing 9 machines with rollers will cost approximately \$200,000.00 per year.

Chairman Sanchez asks what Mr. Lujan needs facility-wise. Mr. Lujan replies that, in addition to needing equipment, they need a bigger yard, bigger shop; basically more room. Mr. Lujan states that if the Road Department were to be moved to the property near CCA that the County already owns, it would cost approximately \$450,000.00 to build a complete new shop with an office. The County could pose a new GO Bond question for funds for this move in two years. Mr. Lujan comments that he still has approximately \$542,000.00 currently in his budget. He

states that he just went out for bid on rocks and oil, because he plans to re-lift Lexco and Hwy 27; 12 miles of road.

Mr. Lujan states that if he is able to go back to using 9 machines, he plans to break the County up into 3 sections. He will then run 3 graders with rollers in each section.

Chairman Sanchez ask about training. Mr. Lujan comments that he will be holding a grader training session in May. He has sent his guys to all of their CDL trainings. They have been through backhoe training, loader training, flagmen training, etc.

Ms. Ortiz, Interim County Manager, comments that she has spoken with Mr. Lujan about requests for maintenance from the public. Mr. Lujan has requested a period of 8 business days to respond to any public requests. In this way, persons making requests will know when to expect a response and this will give Mr. Lujan time to go and inspect the road and decide on a course of action.

Chairman Sanchez states that some other counties have a spreadsheet on their website that shows what roads in their county are scheduled for maintenance. He presents Mr. Lujan and his fellow Commissioners with a sample spreadsheet, a portion of which is attached below:

Chairman Sanchez asks Mr. Lujan if he thinks that something like this would be a useful tool for us and our residents. We could use this to list our projects and/or our regular scheduled road maintenance. Mr. Lujan will look at this. Chairman Sanchez clarifies that this document could supplement our Road Policy and give our constituents a better idea of what will be done, then there would be no question about the intentions of the County. The spreadsheet could also include a map for easy reference.

Mr. Lujan states that dividing the County into sections would also help our residents know where the graders will be working. Residents would start to see that the graders are coming back to their roads about every three weeks.

Mr. Lujan states that his Department has been discussing putting their mileage list on the website so everyone would know exactly which roads are County maintained. He agrees that this could be a good tool.

There is discussion about how to prioritize roads. Traffic counts are an important tool, but cannot be the only tool. There are many factors that must be considered: traffic counts, bus routes, emergency services, residents who are elderly and/or wheelchair bound, etc.

What role does a Commissioner play in this? Madam Commissioner DuCharme states that she thinks there should be a uniform system applied to all the Commission Districts; one Commissioner's approach should not be different from another's. She thinks the Commission should look at how other counties prioritize their roads. She states that Santa Fe County has software that they use to evaluate their roads, make decisions, and schedule maintenance. We need to research what other counties are doing and decide what would work best for us.

Mr. Lujan states that if he can get the equipment that he is requesting, he can break up the County into three sections and get a section done every 4 weeks, and the whole County done every 12 weeks. Mr. Lujan states that he is working on his leases and trying to get everything in place so he can start working the roads like he wants to in July, at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Chairman Sanchez states that if the Road Department requires a strengthening of their arsenal in order to meet the needs of the constituents, leave better roads, and get across the County faster, he is willing to arm them the best that we can. If we can manage this fiscally, then we should do it. Chairman Sanchez asks Ms. Ortiz to look into how we can fit this into our budget. If we can get the equipment needed

and the Road Department can carry out the schedule that Mr. Lujan has described and we can put a spreadsheet of our projects and maintained miles on the website, this would be real progress.

If done right, regular maintenance will not need to be prioritized. The next question is how do we prioritize new projects? There is discussion about this. Mr. Lujan states that some counties have a Public Hearing at the beginning of every fiscal year where constituents can come and advocate for their road. If we did this, the Commission would have the Public Hearing, listen to and gather the requests, and then make final decisions with the Road Department. Chairman Sanchez suggests creating an advisory board that would assist the Commission in identifying new projects that could be then be relayed to the Road Department. There is discussion about this idea and who would be on this advisory board. Mr. Lujan expresses concerns about the idea of an advisory board. He states that the people on an advisory board like this might just push for improvements in their area and not objectively look at the needs of the whole County. He states that if we have a public hearing, the final decisions would rest with the Commission and the Road Department. He comments that the Commission is the COUNTY Commission, not the District Commission; each Commissioner must look at the needs of the whole County. Madam Commissioner DuCharme states that an advisory board could be a helpful tool if, for example, there were two representatives from each Commission district who could do an evaluation of the roads in their districts and then report a back to the Commission. Chairman Sanchez suggests a board that is qualified more by professional affiliation. For example, it would include members from the school districts, the Road Department, and a Commissioner. He agrees that there are positives and negatives to the idea of an advisory board. There is discussion about these pros and cons. In any scenario, the Road Department would play a pivotal role; they are the experts that actually carry out the maintenance. In summary, Chairman Sanchez states that he believes that we need to collectivize the expertise that we have and try to build a road policy and road plans for new projects that really takes into account all the different aspects involved. There will be more discussion about these ideas at another time.

Chairman Sanchez states that right now, a great starting off point would be the acquisition of the requested equipment and the creation of a simple document that could be put on the website.

Commissioner Frost agrees with Chairman Sanchez and tells Mr. Lujan to keep up the good work.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme suggests that we put a form on our website that people can fill out and submit if they want a road considered for repair or maintenance. A form where they could list the name of the road, the condition of the road and the requested action. These requests could also help with prioritization. She stresses that the form needs to be easy to fill out and submit. Ms. Ortiz states that this can be done. Madam Commissioner DuCharme states that a form like this could be done for signs also. Mr. Lujan states that they are working on this. Mr. Lujan states that he can also put the miles maintained on the website.

Michael Godey, resident, suggests proceeding slowly with these suggestions. He also states that the County should limit the number of boards a person can be on. If the same people are on all the boards you can end up with a "good ole boys" situation.

Ms. Belinda Garland, resident, suggests having a ranking system instead of an advisory board for prioritizing roads. She suggests a ranking system like the federal government uses for property improvements, for example. Then there are no personal emotions or political contacts that could play into it.

Michelle Jones, resident, (myself) speaks. She states that this is an exciting time to be here in the County; there are a lot of new and exciting ideas being proposed. She agrees with funding the needs of the Road Department and states that she is in favor of holding public hearings, either once or twice a year, when constituents could advocate for their roads. Then, have a group comprised of the Commission, the Road Department, a representative from the school districts and possibly EVEDA, who could get together and evaluate that roads that are brought up at the public hearing and make final decisions.

Linda Jaramillo, Clerk, states that she has heard Mr. Lujan speak to the Commission about the roads many times; he is an expert. All he needs is the right equipment and employees. She states that Mr. Lujan should be the advisory board to the Commission. He is very knowledgeable about his work and about the whole County.

Mr. Lujan, Road Superintendent, reminds the Commission to email either himself or Ms. Ortiz about any road complaints and they will do their best to take care of them.

Chairman Sanchez calls the meeting to order at 2:07 pm and calls for a Commission Roll Call. Commission District 1- Present, Commission District 2- Present, Commission District 3- Present. Mr. Max Cabber, resident, leads us in the pledge and Mr. Bill Williams, resident, gives the invocation.

Approval of the Meeting Agenda:

Chairman Sanchez asks for a motion to approve today's Meeting Agenda. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve today's meeting agenda. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Action Items Items to Be Considered and Acted Upon

*Department Requests/Reports:

1. Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority Contract Discussion Ms. Annette Ortiz, Interim County Manager, speaks. In the last couple of Commission meetings, Ms. Ortiz has requested that the Commission set aside funds in order to

pay for the County's tipping fees that are currently past due to the EVSWA. These tipping fees were not figured into the County's budget. She states that Mr. Andy Miller, EVSWA Manager, has emailed a lot of information and he is available to answer any questions about this matter. Chairman Sanchez requested today's meeting with the EVSWA to have a discussion about the contract and the tipping fees. Representatives from the EVSWA are present at today's meeting to participate in this workshop/discussion.

Chairman Sanchez states that at the last Commission meeting, the question came up about whether the County was responsible for tipping fees. He states that the Commission did not see anything in our current contract with the EVSWA that specifically addressed this issue, so we decided to have a meeting in order to identify what verbiage enjoins the County to be responsible for these fees.

Chairman Sanchez asks Mr. Miller to expound on the information that he will present to the Commission today.

Mr. Miller introduces himself, along with Ms. Danette Cabber, EVSWA Office Manager; Ms. Anastasia Stevens, Legal Counsel; and Mr. Bill Williams, Chairman, EVSWA Board of Directors. He thanks the Commission for allowing him to present information. Mr. Miller presents the Commission with a handout that is included in the file for this meeting. He reads the following portion:

1. A misunderstanding of the contract between Torrance County and EVSWA: the first part of the attachment is an excerpt from the April 27, 2016 County Commissioners Meeting Minutes. There is a discussion on contract clarifications regarding payment of tipping fees. Page 17 and 18 of the minutes make it clear that the County is responsible for tipping fees.

He then reads the portion of the minutes that he is referring to, which is attached below:

...Mr. Wallin clarifies that the County was already responsible for the tipping fees; this change in wording does not change that. This was a mistake that was caught by the EVSWA attorney. The statement in the contract is basically stating that the tipping fees are the responsibility of the County and are not being dealt with in this contract. We are not assuming a responsibility that we do not already have.

Mr. Miller now refers to the following statement in the current contract:

V. Costs for disposal or recycling of solid waste generated by the waste management system are the responsibility of the County and are not covered in this agreement.

Mr. Miller states that there may be some confusion between the County contract and collections vs disposal at the landfill. The County contract covers collections but does not address disposal at the landfill, which involves the tipping fees. Mr. Miller clarifies that there are basically two business units that the EVSWA operates: collections – wastes are collected and brought together in 8 separate locations throughout the County, and disposal at the landfill. The cost of collections per the contract is \$800,000.00 per year. Mr. Miller now explains disposal at the landfill. He states that everything that goes into the landfill drives over the scale and a record is created- a tip ticket. The tip ticket contains information about the source of the waste, the type of waste, and who generated the waste, and additional billing information. For example, County waste is billed at a rate of \$31.00 per ton for municipal solid waste and \$25.00 per ton for construction and demolition debris. He reiterates that disposal at the landfill is a separate business from collections and separate from the County contract.

Chairman Sanchez states that he does not believe that the County has ever paid its tipping fees to the EVSWA. Mr. Miller explains that the County has never paid a separate check for tipping fees before, but in the past the tipping fees were included in the contract and paid as part of the contract the County had with the EVSWA.

Chairman Sanchez states that the whole reason for the new contract must be because the EVSWA needed to get more money from the County in order to make up some kind of a shortfall. Mr. Miller states that the way he views it is that the new contract makes it more fair to all of the entities that use the services if the EVSWA. He states that everyone that uses the landfill pays their tipping fees based on what they generate at the landfill. He states that under the old contract, the County was not paying their fair share of their own tipping fees; there was an approximate \$70,000.00 a year shortfall.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme states that in 2014 there was a raise to the County customers. In 2015, the County added discounts to their customers. The County received the first invoice for tipping fees in July of 2016. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks why there is no agreement between Torrance and the EVSWA for tipping fees. Mr. Miller states that we do have an agreement. He states that he has written agreements for tipping fees with entities outside the JPA. The ones within the JPA are controlled by the JPA. The JPA is the agreement that states that, as a member, you are charged \$31.00 per ton for municipal solid waste and \$25.00 per ton for construction and demolition debris; he believes that this verbiage is contained within the JPA. Customers outside of the JPA pay more.

Chairman Sanchez asks Mr. Wallin if the County's commitment to paying tipping fees is clear. Mr. Wallin reiterates that the current contract was not meant to cover the tipping fees; the tipping fees are covered by the JPA and Board action. He reiterates that it has never been a question that the County owes tipping fees; that every member owes fees for how much garbage they put into the landfill. This came up a few years ago when there were complaints from some of the other JPA members that the EVSWA was subsidizing the County in the County's tipping fees and it was causing an issue. There was a public meeting held in order to try and get the JPA amended and bring some other entities in and to clarify some of these things. What complicated matters further was the discussion that the EVSWA might be willing to either forgive or defer the tipping fee payments if the County would help the EVSWA acquire CDBG funds to develop a new cell. Mr. Wallin states that we were pursuing this and had a meeting in September about it and talked about creating an MOU to paper it. Mr. Wallin states that he prepared the MOU and sent it to the County Manager's office. He states that he thinks the County was operating under the assumption that we could work on the CDBG grant and get at least that amount forgiven. He states that he was told last fall by the Manager's office that they didn't have anyone at that time that could work on the grant and they missed the deadline so the MOU was put on hold. Mr. Wallin states that, in his view, there has never been any question that the members of the JPA owe tipping fees, we just weren't always charged for them or they may have been charged in a different fashion. He reiterates that he remembers that the issue was that the other JPA member entities were upset that the County's tipping fees were being subsidized.

There is further discussion about the separation of the fees. Chairman Sanchez states that the benefit to the County has not changed, what has changed is the addition of a new bill. Mr. Miller states that what has changed is that the County is now being asked to pay their fair share.

Chairman Sanchez asks Mr. Miller how it came to be that the County was allowed to pay less than their fair share. Ms. Danette Cabber explains that the tipping fee was incorporated into the County contract and the EVSWA subsidized the fee. No one present knows exactly how this came to be. The County did provide CDBG funds in the past which could have something to do with it, but no one knows for sure. Ms. Michelle Jones (myself) suggests going back and researching the minutes from past meetings to find out what happened.

There is discussion that the landfill is currently making a profit. Mr. Miller states that they are banking the profit in anticipation of paying for a new landfill cell and new equipment.

Chairman Sanchez refers to page 2, Section 5 of the current contract:

V. Costs for disposal or recycling of solid waste generated by the waste management system are the responsibility of the County and are not covered by this agreement.

Chairman Sanchez asks what constitutes the "waste management system". Mr. Miller replies it is the 8 collection stations, manning the stations, transportation of the waste, and administrative duties including billing. Ms. Cabber states that they have created a 'scope of work' for their administrative duties that she can provide to the Commission.

Chairman Sanchez asks why the County has not made one payment for the tipping fees since July 2016, when the new contract went into effect. Ms. Cabber states that the EVSWA has been invoicing the County for the tipping fees every month since July; the invoices were being sent to the County Manager. Mr. Wallin states that the County Manager's office was operating under the belief that we were going to assist the EVSWA with a CDBG grant. At the end of 2016, then County Manager, Joy Ansley, tendered her resignation and things did not progress. Commissioner Frost states that we can still move forward with applying for a CDBG grant, but in the meantime we owe the EVSWA. Commissioner Frost suggests that the County pay the bill and move forward.

There is discussion about the fees that different residents pay and who does the billing: persons within the municipalities, persons outside the municipalities, persons with a private hauler, etc. There is discussion about how the County came to have a solid waste management system and the rules and regulations associated with it. Commissioner Frost asks about the repercussions of not following these rules and regulations. Mr. Miller states that he is currently working with a town that did not follow the regulations and they were hit with an approximately \$250,000.00 fine, plus a consent order to close out their old landfill; their unpermitted, unlined landfill. The cost estimate for closing out this landfill is approximately \$350,000.00. Mr. Wallin states that we have had several dumps here in Torrance County in the past. There was one in between Moriarty and Edgewood. When the Federal Drinking Water Act and the Clean Air Act, etc. went into place, many of those dumps had to go through the close out procedures. He states that

these are very complicated issues. He states that the County has already dealt with the Attorney General about our fees. Mr. Wallin states that he submitted a legal opinion to the Commission back in 2016 concerning our fees; Madam Commissioner DuCharme and Commissioner Frost received a copy of this opinion. He states that Mr. Romero, resident, asked the Attorney General for an opinion and the Attorney General adopted his (Mr. Wallin's) opinion and said this is the law. Mr. Wallin offers to provide a copy of his opinion again. He states that, in his opinion, what really needs to happen now is we need to get on board to get the new cell done, we need to apply for CDBG funds, and we need to help the EVSWA get that done and the benefit to the County could be that we get some abatement or forgiveness of some of these tipping fees.

Getting back to the subject being discussed today, Mr. Miller states that yes, the EVSWA would consider entering into an MOU with the County. He states that the way he views the MOU is that the County would apply for CDBG funds for the landfill. He states that the application would have to be made, the funding would have to be awarded, those funds spent on the landfill, and then going forward, the EVSWA would start to credit the County their tipping fees. He states that there are a number of steps here that have not yet been taken, and we don't know what the actual amount of CDBG funding we would ultimately receive. Mr. Miller informs the Commission that he has made the same CDBG offer to his other member entities, because they are also eligible for CDBG funds; this is not an exclusive offer to Torrance County.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme comments that the Attorney General's Office addressed different kinds of fees, not tipping fees. She asks Mr. Wallin if this is correct. Mr. Wallin replies that the discussion was about fees in general under the Solid Waste provisions of New Mexico Statutes.

Mr. Wallin states that Ms. Ortiz reminded him that part of the issue of going forward with the original MOU that he had provided to the Manager's office was an issue with the billing. At that time, then County Manager Ansley was looking into the option of the County taking over the solid waste billing process.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme questions why the invoices from the EVSWA were addressed to Ms. Ortiz. Mr. Miller explains that he requested copies of these invoices to present to the Commission today and because their software is fairly simple and Ms. Ortiz is listed as the contact person today, all the invoices came in her name. At the time of the actual billing, the invoices were going to Ms. Joy Ansley.

There is discussion again about why the County had not budgeted for or paid the tipping fees that they were being billed for. It is reiterated again that the assumption is that there was an understanding that the County was going to apply for a CDBG grant to obtain funds for a new cell and that these funds would either abate, forgive, or pay the tipping fees.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme reminds the Commission that at the time that the new contract with the EVSWA was signed, a committee to help write an RFP was formed. That committee fulfilled its obligations and our Procurement Officer has the copy of the proposed RFP draft. She states that she thinks that the formation of that committee shows the feelings or uncertainty of the previous committee about this new contract with the EVSWA. She states that she wants to remind the Commission that we have another option; to go for an RFP. Mr. Wallin reminds all that this proposed RFP draft is for collection service and has nothing to do with the landfill or tipping fees.

Commissioner Frost talks about how things were in the County before the EVSWA. He states that he is so happy to see how clean our County is now and he knows that it is a testimony to what the EVSWA has done.

Chairman Sanchez asks how we are going to make these payments sustainable. Ms. Sedillo, County Treasurer, states that it is not available in the General Fund currently. She states that the County would have to either raise taxes somehow or charge County customers more. She states that she does not believe that the County could use capital outlay or infrastructure taxes to pay for something like this. Ms. Sedillo states that the County has funds in the Wind PILT, but that won't be available forever.

Chairman Sanchez states that he thinks that the County needs to identify strategies that will enable the County to make these payments sustainable. Commissioner Frost states that he agrees, but in the meantime, we need to pay our bill. Commissioner Frost makes a motion to pay what we currently owe to the EVSWA and if it has to come from the Wind PILT, then we have to do it and every single person in the County will benefit from it. Mr. Wallin states that he appreciates the motion, but we put this item on the agenda as a discussion item only. This item will be placed on the next regular Commission meeting agenda for action.

Chairman Sanchez asks the Manager's Office to facilitate the scheduling of a meeting early next week so we can figure out how to move forward with this in terms of budgeting.

Mr. Miller extends an invitation to any member of the Commission and the County to come and see him with any questions they may have.

The Commission will have a Special Meeting on Monday, March 20, 2017 @ 2:00 pm. Chairman Sanchez requests the attendance of the Manager's Office and the Treasurer's Office and states that they will probably go into closed session for a portion of the meeting.

*Adjourn

ACTION TAKEN: Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to adjourn the March 13, 2017 Commission Meeting. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Call Meeting to Order:

Chairman Sanchez calls the meeting to order at 3:34 pm and calls for a Commission Roll Call. Commission District 1- Present, Commission District 2- Present, Commission District 3- Present. Mr. Andy Miller, EVSWA Manager, leads us in the pledge and Ms. Annette Ortiz, Interim County Manager, gives the invocation.

Approval of the Meeting Agenda:

Chairman Sanchez asks for a motion to approve today's Meeting Agenda. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve today's meeting agenda. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Action Items Items to Be Considered and Acted Upon

1. Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority Contract Chairman Sanchez speaks. He states that this meeting was requested in order to try to make a determination on how we could budget for the expenditure of the County's EVSWA tipping fees.

Ms. Annette Ortiz, Interim County Manager, presents copies of the EVSWA JPA to the Commission. (A copy of the JPA is included in the file for this meeting). She states that she had a meeting with Ms. Tracy Sedillo, County Treasurer and Ms. Amanda Tenorio, Finance Director, to discuss this issue. She states that they were looking at the immediate need to pay the overdue tipping fees and a long term funding source solution. She states that, as it stands right now, the Wind PILT is the immediate option to pay the overdue tipping fees. She states that a long term funding option could include the three Hold Harmless taxes that the County could look at enacting. We could also look into raising the EVSWA fees for County customers, and/or we could look into cutting our expenditures to cover the tipping fee amounts.

Ms. Ortiz states that the Hold Harmless taxes can be enacted by County ordinance; there does not have to be an election. It would need to be published and then the ordinance would need to be adopted. 30 days after the ordinance is adopted, the taxes can be enacted; New Mexico Tax and Rev need 90 days for it to take effect. If the Commission were to decide to go forward with the Hold Harmless taxes, it would not come to fruition until January of 2018.

Ms. Ortiz reminds all that the County currently has a contract in place with the EVSWA for a yearly cost of \$800,000.00, which does not include our tipping fees. She explains that we could look at accessing our infrastructure tax to pay these tipping fees, but that would completely wipe out that fund. She does not recommend tapping into this infrastructure fund. She further states that cutting back on expenditures could be an option, but neither she, nor Ms. Tenorio or Ms. Sedillo, could say where any cuts could come from. Chairman Sanchez confirms with Ms. Ortiz that the only option for paying the overdue tipping fee amount that is currently owed is to take it from the Wind PILT fund. Chairman Sanchez continues and states that, moving forward, it appears that the only option is for the County to adopt an ordinance that would allow us to enact the Hold Harmless taxes taxes. Ms. Ortiz explains that the Commission could enact the Hold Harmless taxes and, at each budget cycle, decide how it will be spent; the Hold Harmless taxes would not have to go towards the tipping fees exclusively. It could go towards Fire Fighter stipends, the Sheriff's Department, roads, etc.

Ms. Sedillo, County Treasurer, states that each of the Hold Harmless tax increments is a 1/8th increment and, together, would generate approximately \$750,000.00 per year for the County. It would be a gross receipts tax and it would be collected countywide; in and out of the municipalities; anywhere that business is transacted, and it can be used for general purposes. Chairman Sanchez asks how

this would affect consumers. Ms. Sedillo explains that it would not affect purchases of food or prescriptions or gasoline; it would be a 3/8th incremental gross receipts tax on all other goods and services within the County. Ms. Sedillo states that the County would be able to spend these funds whoever they see fit, as long as it is within the scope of the ordinance.

The tipping fees for the County will be approximately \$120,000.00-\$130,000.00 per year.

The next Wind PILT payment we will receive will come in November 2017 from High Lonesome and will be approximately \$140,000.00. Ms. Sedillo is not sure when our next El Cabo Wind payment will come. We currently have \$646,000.00 in the Wind PILT fund.

Mr. Miller, EVSWA Manager, states that the tipping fees for the County were estimated at approximately \$12,000.00 per month, but have actually been approximately \$10,000.00 per month. Ms. Ortiz asks if the Dog Head Fire impacted these numbers. Mr. Miller replies no.

Commissioner Frost advocates for paying the immediate overdue tipping fees balance to the EVSWA from the Wind PILT fund. He also advocates for enacting the Hold Harmless taxes.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks Mr. Miller to point out where in the JPA it states that the County must pay tipping fees. Mr. Miller refers to page 3 of the

AMENDED JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT REORGANIZING THE ESTANCIA VALLEY SOLID WASTE AUTHORITY:

- **3. POWERS AND DUTIES DELEGATED TO THE EVSWA.** The Parties hereby delegate to the EVSWA the powers and duties necessary to fulfill its purpose, including but not limited to the following:
- **k**. To adopt a policy regarding fees, and to set rates and charges for use of the said system and found necessary for the adequate financial operation of the Authority;

Mr. Miller now refers to page 7 of the same document:

- **8. FINANCES AND CONTRIBUTIONS**. For the duration of this agreement, each party shall contribute its respective Environmental Services Gross Receipts Tax ("ESGRT") revenue to the Authority for the development and operation of the solid waste system.
- e. Each Party's respective contributions specified herein shall defray the costs of each

Party's use of the Authority's services and facilities, thereby entitling each Party and its residents to reduced fees for said use.

Mr. Miller states that this means that each member of the JPA contributes to the operations of the solid waste system. Because Torrance County is a member of the JPA, it is entitled to the discount, which Torrance County is receiving, of \$31.00 per ton. The non-member full rate is \$47.00 per ton.

Mr. Miller states that, per the JPA, the EVSWA sets the fees. On May 19, 2011, the fees were set for municipal solid waste, for member entities such as Torrance County, and for non-member entities.

There are currently 7 JPA member entities. All are current on their tipping fees except for Torrance County. Chairman Sanchez asks what the other members pay per month in tipping fees. Ms. Danette Cabber, EVSWA Office Manager, replies that Torrance County pays the highest at approximately \$9,000.00 per month; the City of Moriarty pays approximately \$5,000.00-\$6,000.00 per month; Estancia and Mountainair pay approximately \$2,000.00-\$3,000.00; and the villages pay approximately \$200.00-\$400.00.

Chairman Sanchez asks how the municipalities budget for this. Mayor of Estancia, Ms. Sylvia Chavez, replies that the town budgets for this debt each year. The funds to pay this come from the residents; the residents in the town are billed for their water, sewer, and solid waste each month. Mr. Miller states that all of the JPA members have also agreed to give their environmental services GRT to the EVSWA.

There are approximately 4,100 County EVSWA customers. There is discussion about the different categories of County customers the EVSWA has. For example, regular quarterly, low income, vacant land, age 65 and older, private hauler and the discounts that might apply to each category.

Chairman Sanchez surmises that in order for the County to use the same strategies as the municipalities, we would have to raise our rates by \$3.00 per month for each customer, across the board; this would constitute a 5% increase. Mr. Miller interjects that there are approximately 1000 County customers that do not pay. Chairman Sanchez asks if the municipalities have this same problem with customers refusing to pay. Mayor Chavez replies that her residents pay their solid waste bill as part of their total utility bill; a municipal customer cannot say that they are only going to pay their sewer or water and not their solid waste.

On the topic of budgeting to pay these fees, Mr. Miller states that, at the beginning of every fiscal year, the County of Bernalillo gives him a purchase order for \$140,000.00. Throughout the year, Mr. Miller stays in contact with Bernalillo about how much they are paying monthly. As the end of the fiscal year approaches, if Bernalillo is out of money, they don't bring a truck.

There is discussion about why County customers may or may not pay their EVSWA bill.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme states that the EVSWA received \$550,000.00 through the County for the development of a new cell. The County also gave the EVSWA \$48,000.00 at one time and another \$16,000.00 at another time. The EVSWA also receives \$800,000.00 per year from the County per their contract. She states that the idea that the County doesn't pay its fair share when the County pays many, many times more than any municipality is very inaccurate to her and very irritating and troubling. Mr. Miller replies that the \$550,000.00 was grant money and he cannot speak to the other payments. He reminds the Commission that, as a major contributor to the EVSWA, the County has three voting members on the board. He states that Bernalillo County has put in as much or more money and they are no longer a member of the JPA. He states that it appears that the County has contributed a lot of money, but those dollars were Federal dollars that did not come from the County's budget. Ms. Ortiz asks why it matters if the dollars come from the Federal Government or from the County budget, as long as the EVSWA is getting those dollars. Mr. Miller replies that it doesn't matter; we need the money to operate; we need the money to keep the landfill open.

Chairman Sanchez asks Ms. Sedillo, Treasurer, to discuss what the County has paid to the EVSWA over the years. Ms. Sedillo states that when the solid waste authority was formed, the County ran it as part of the Road Department. We had some transfer stations and we had the landfill. All of those items were given over to the EVSWA at the time it was formed, along with the Environmental GRT. There was a revenue bond at that time that was refinanced and the EVSWA took that because some of the equipment that we had was financed into that bond. Some of the transfer stations were deeded over and some we retained. That was our buyin. Ms. Sedillo states that the Environmental GRT paid to the EVSWA from the County to-date for this fiscal year has been \$111,236.96. Mr. Miller reiterates that paying this GRT to the EVSWA is part of being in the JPA and in return, the County gets votes on the EVSWA Board. There is discussion about whether Torrance County actually owned the landfill before it became part of the EVSWA.

Mr. Miller states that in the late 1980s, the types of landfills that were in Torrance County were outlawed. Those types of landfills were unlined, unregulated, and uncontrolled. Those landfills went away along with open burning. Every municipality had to find a different way to get rid of their trash, and that way was a lined landfill. Torrance County had to do the same thing.

Ms. Ortiz asks Mr. Miller about the fees for Bernalillo County when they left the JPA. Mr. Miller replied that the rates went up slightly when they left the JPA. Bernalillo County's rates are currently \$33.00 per ton for municipal solid waste and \$30.00 per ton for construction and demolition.

Mr. Nick Sedillo, Estancia resident, states that he pays monthly for curbside pickup, and when he has to take larger pieces of trash to a collection station, he has to pay a tipping fee. He doesn't understand why he is having to pay twice. Ms. Cabber states that the collection stations are primarily for the rural County customers, not the municipal customers. Mr. Miller states that Mr. Sedillo's tipping fee at the collection station would go to the landfill.

There is discussion about the possible incidents of items incurring tipping fees twice. The example discussed was a couch that, if dropped off at a collection station by a municipal resident, would incur a tipping fee at the collection station and then again at the landfill. Mr. Miller states that this is a shortcoming of their system and it just came to his attention a week ago, and it's a minor amount of material that the landfill gets the revenue for and also the County gets charged for. He states that over the next few months he is going to get this figured out. He states that they have records of it all.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks Mr. Miller to read the following portion of the JPA into the record:

- 8. FINANCES AND CONTRIBUTIONS. For the duration of this agreement, each Party shall contribute its respective Environmental Services Gross Receipts Tax ("ESGRT") revenue to the Authority for the development and operation of the solid waste system.
 - a. The Parties may authorize and execute intercept agreements for their respective ESGRT revenues with third parties, such as the New Mexico Finance Authority ("NMFA"), provided the purpose of said intercept agreements is to finance loans for the benefit of the Authority. Such ESGRT intercept agreements shall be deemed to satisfy a Party's contribution as required under Section 8 above. Upon the termination of any such ESGRT existing intercept agreement, unless another intercept agreement is executed for the benefit of the Authority, a Party shall contribute its respective ESGRT revenue directly to the Authority.

- b. The Town of Vaughn, not previously being a Party to a joint powers agreement for the Authority and not having previously contributed to the development or operation of the Authority's solid waste management system, shall, in addition to its recurring ESGRT contribution, make an initial one-time contribution of its Caterpillar 826 Compactor ("Caterpillar") to the Authority. The Town of Vaughn shall transfer good and clear title of the Caterpillar to the Authority and make delivery of the Caterpillar to the Authority within 5 days of the effective date of this Agreement.
- c. The Authority shall provide for and be responsible for any debts incurred for capital improvements with no additional recourse to the respective Parties other than as specified in this Agreement. It shall be the duty of the Authority to ensure that the equipment, facilities and capital improvements reasonably necessary for the normal and businesslike operation of the Authority are provided in a timely manner.
- d. The Authority may generate funds generated by revenue bonds, loans, collection and tipping fees and such other revenues as may, from time to time, be identified

by the Authority, except that the authority shall have no independent authority to levy and collect taxes separate and apart from the authority existing within the Parties.

- e. Each Party's respective contributions specified herein shall defray the costs of each Party's use of the Authority's services and facilities, thereby entitling each Party and its residents to reduced fees for said use.
- f. The Authority is hereby designated as the operational manager of the solid waste management system and shall be responsible for any deficits incurred in the operation of the solid waste system in compliance with the law and sound fiscal practices. The Authority shall have the right of control over its own operational budget, subject to policy direction from the Board.
- g. The Parties shall not be obligated or incur any liability for payment of deficits incurred by the Authority. Anticipated deficits shall be identified and included in the annual budget and necessary corrective action identified and implemented so as to make up any anticipated deficits in the same year in which they are incurred.
- h. It is the intent of the Parties that the Authority become self-sufficient and that no Party be required to contribute funds from its respective budget or taxing authority other than its respective ESGRT or as otherwise specified herein.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme refers to subsection d. The Authority may generate funds generated by revenue bonds, loans, collection and tipping fees and such other revenues as may, from time to time, be identified by the Authority, etc.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks where the tipping fees are 'identified by the Authority'. Mr. Miller replies that they are identified in the meeting minutes from their Board of Directors, which have the authority to set tipping fees for the landfill. He clarifies that the EVSWA Board does not have the authority to set the fees that the County charges County residents. He states that the fees that County

residents pay is covered in the County ordinance. The tipping fees are the responsibility of the EVSWA Board of Directors.

Ms. Ortiz refers to subsection h. It is the intent of the parties that the Authority become self-sufficient, etc.

Ms. Ortiz asks if Mr. Miller believes that the Authority is self-sufficient and, if so, how. Mr. Miller replies yes, they are self-sufficient. He states that he has only looked at their budget for the last few years but they have always had a positive cash flow and their reserve accounts and their capital improvement accounts increase and, obviously, decrease when they purchase a capital asset. He summarizes that yes, the Authority is existing on the fees that it charges its customers.

Ms. Ortiz refers to the rest of subsection h. ...and that no Party be required to contribute funds from its respective budget or taxing authority other than its respective ESGRT or as otherwise specified herein.

She asks Mr. Miller what steps they are taking to become more self-sufficient in the future. Mr. Miller replies that they will build a new landfill cell so they can continue their operation. He states that it is going to cost \$1.5 million dollars to build the new cell and remain in operation.

Ms. Ortiz asks Mr. Miller to explain to the Commission about what happens when other entities want to join the JPA. Mr. Miller explains that in 2014-2015, the City of Las Vegas, Santa Rosa and Guadalupe County wanted to become members of the JPA. In so doing, they would have contributed their ESGRT and would have given some sort of a buy-in to the EVSWA, somewhere in the area of \$300,000.00. They would have been given the member discount of \$31.00 per ton for municipal solid waste. For a new member to be added, there must be a unanimous vote of approval from the existing members; there was not. But, the landfill still wanted the trash and they still wanted to bring it. So, the EVSWA Board of Directors gave these three entities a discounted rate of \$33.00 per ton for municipal waste.

Chairman Sanchez calls the meeting to order at 9:04 am and calls for a Commission Roll Call. Commission District 1- Present, Commission District 2- Present, Commission District 3- Present. Ms. Belinda Garland, resident and incoming County Manager, leads us in the pledge and Ms. Nicole Maxwell, reporter for the Mountain View Telegraph, gives the invocation.

Approval of the Meeting Minutes:

Chairman Sanchez asks for a motion to approve the March 8, 2017 Regular Commission Meeting minutes. **ACTION TAKEN:** Madam Commissioner DuCharme makes a motion to approve the March 8, 2017 Regular Commission Meeting Minutes. Commissioner Frost seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Approval of the Meeting Agenda:

Chairman Sanchez asks for a motion to approve today's Meeting Agenda. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve today's meeting agenda. Chairman Sanchez seconds the motion. Madam Commissioner DuCharme has a question about today's agenda item #9. Request Funding to

Action Items Items to Be Considered and Acted Upon

*Department Requests/Reports:

(Public Comment, each item: At the Discretion of the Commission Chair. Comments are limited to one (1) minute per person.)

1. Updates

Linda Jaramillo, County Clerk, informs the Commission that the Board of Registration has completed the purge process. We purged 359 voters. Ms. Jaramillo states that she has the list of purged voters on her County Clerk website. If anyone is on there who wishes to be reinstated as a voter, all they need to do is come in to the Clerk's office and re-register to vote. Ms. Jaramillo states that this purge should help candidates who request voter lists as it will eliminate excess information that is obsolete.

Ms. Jaramillo presents the Commission with a report showing an updated count of Torrance County registered voters by party and precinct. (A copy of this report is included in the file for this meeting). She gives the Commission the following recap of Torrance County voters by political party:

Hanna Sanchez, Fire Department Admin., informs the Commission that they have completed 36 hours of wildland training; they had 14 students pass the class. The only thing they have left to do is to get their red card, at which time they could actually be deployed if they chose to do so.

Ms. Sanchez informs the Commission that the Mountainair Fire Department has extended an offer to the Torrance County Fire Department to take an EMT basic

hoping to bring her knowledge and some good things to the County. She states that she is going to welcome comments, feedback, and ideas and is going to try and set up some kind of mechanisms for that.

- 2. Contract Annual Renewal between Torrance County and Waste Management- Danette Mead, Animal Services Ms. Mead speaks. This is their annual contract renewal with Waste Management. It's a self-renewing contract, however this year there was a price increase so she needed to bring it to the Commission for renewal approval. The contract price is going from \$60.00 to \$78.38 per month. ACTION TAKEN: Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to approve contract annual renewal between Torrance County and Waste Management. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. The effective date of the agreement is 3/1/2017 and is listed on the first page of the agreement. This new price will be locked in for the term of one year. The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. MOTION CARRIED.
- 3. Request Funding to Bring the Santa Fe Spay & Neuter Van to Torrance County- Cindi Sullivan, Animal Services Ms. Sullivan speaks. She states that this has been a hot topic for them for about ten years now. She explains that the Santa Fe Humane Society has a spay/neuter van that is completely self-contained and it goes to different areas of New Mexico.

Ms. Sullivan explains that there is an organization, the Friends of Estancia Valley Animals, that was created by Debra and Mike Hoy, which helps with sterilizations in this area. They reside out of Edgewood and typically charge the public \$60.00 for the sterilization of a dog and \$30.00 for the sterilization of a cat. They recently talked to Mr. Chris Acosta, the Animal Control officer for the City of Moriarty and said that they wanted to bring the spay/neuter van to Moriarty. Mr. Acosta wanted the County to have an opportunity to be involved in this too. There was a meeting with the Friends of Estancia Valley Animals, Ms. Sullivan, and Mr. Acosta and they came up with an idea. The Santa Fe Humane Society likes to take the van to locations for at least two days. Mr. Acosta is going to approach the City of Moriarty and ask them to fund reserving the van for one day, at a cost of \$2,350.00 per day, and Ms. Sullivan is here today asking for assistance for the second day from the County. They did some research and decided that the Moriarty Civic Center would be the best location for the van for the two day event.

Linda Jaramillo, Estancia resident and County Clerk, also advocates for funding of this event. She states that she recently adopted a stray cat and her daughter has a lot of pets that also need to be fixed and she would take advantage of an event like this.

Assuming this event is successful, Chairman Sanchez encourages Ms. Sullivan to look for other strategies and funding sources to pay for more events like this in the future. He also asks her to consider holding future events like this in other part of the County such as Estancia, Willard, and Mountainair.

The Commissioners vote; all in favor, none opposed. MOTION CARRIED.

Commissioner Frost encourages Ms. Sullivan to consider advertising this event on our local radio station and in our local newspaper and also asking the public for donations to help defray the cost. He states that if she does this, he will donate the first \$50.00.

- 4. Contract Renewal between Torrance County and Western Trails Animal Hospital- Cindi Sullivan, Animal Services Ms. Sullivan speaks. She states that the County Animal Shelter has two contracts with Western Trails Animal Hospital that need renewal: one for professional services and one for veterinary services. Nothing has changed in these contracts since they were renewed last year.
 - a. Professional Services- All documentation hereto attached. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve the renewal of the Professional Services agreement between Torrance County and Western Trails Animal Hospital. Chairman Sanchez seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commission votes; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED**
 - b. Veterinary Services All documentation hereto attached. **ACTION TAKEN:** Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to approve the renewal of the Veterinary Services agreement between Torrance County and Western Trails Animal Hospital. Commissioner Frost seconds the motion. No further discussion. The Commission votes; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED**
- 5. Contract Renewal Between Torrance County and Kathleen West for Professional Services- Cindi Sullivan, Animal Services Ms. Sullivan speaks. This is for a contract that they renew with Ms. West every year for professional

County needs to get the word out that we are looking for suggestions or offers of property from the public with regards to this agenda item. Chairman Sanchez states that he was hoping that the Commission could look at their options today. Ms. Ortiz states that we need to know what we are asking for; how much property, equipment, infrastructure, roads, etc. Mr. Lujan, Road Superintendent, comments that he is waiting to get a quote on what it would cost to move the fence from the existing transfer station to a new location. He states that he was already told that the fence poles that are there cannot be moved or re-used; they would be cut down. He does not know anything yet about the actual fencing. He states that since the discussion of moving or closing this transfer station in Tajique began, his Road Crew employees have seen a significant increase in illegal dumping in the area. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks who owns the fence. Mr. Wallin comments that, in this instance, the fence is most likely part of the property and is the property of the Land Grant. It is clarified that Chairman Sanchez had asked Mr. Lujan to look into the cost of moving the fence.

Mr. Andrew Gutierrez, a representative of the Tajique Land Grant, comments that it is very disappointing that this item is being tabled again; they have been working on this item since August of 2016. No further discussion. The Commission votes; all in favor, none opposed. **ITEM TABLED**

9. Request Funding to Cover Unbudgeted Tipping Fees Ms. Ortiz speaks. She reminds all that the Commission held a Special Meeting on Monday, March 20th, to discuss this issue. She states that the County Manager's Office needs direction on how the Commission wants to move forward on this; where do they want the payment of these fees to come from, etc. She states that the County is currently being billed for these fees and we are 8 months behind. She states that we have not been charged any late fees yet. All documentation hereto attached. ACTION TAKEN: Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to pay the outstanding amount of tipping fees to the EVSWA. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. Commissioner Frost asks if this will include paying the monthly fees going forward. Chairman Sanchez states that this motion is specific to one thing- paying the outstanding amount. Ms. Ortiz asks what fund the Commission wants this payment to come from. Chairman Sanchez states that he believes that the Commission only has one option- the Wind PILT fund.

Chairman Sanchez adds that this situation is very disappointing. He states that he personally resents having to use the PILT money for this purpose. However, the present Commission is bound to meet its obligations under the agreement that was

that the Commission approve payment of any late fees. Mr. Wallin states that he will research the legality of the imposing of these late fees; he states that they may very well be unconstitutional.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks for clarification of the exact amount of the overdue tipping fees. Mr. Miller states that the overdue tipping fee amount, without the late fee, is \$73,175.97. **ACTION TAKEN:** Chairman Sanchez amends his motion to state that he moves that the Commission pay the past due EVSWA tipping fees in the amount of \$73,175.97 from the PILT fund. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion.

Michael Godey, resident, states that he supports the Commission paying the overdue tipping fees, but not the late fees and he suggests that the Commission consider renegotiation of the JPA.

No further discussion. The Commission votes; all in favor, none opposed. **MOTION CARRIED**

At this time, Chairman Sanchez states that, in light of what has transpired and the agreement that is in place, he is in favor of re-evaluating the County's relationship with the EVSWA: the JPA, the agreement that was signed in July of 2016, and any further agreements that would identify and delineate fees owed by the County, to be paid by the County, to the EVSWA. He states that he thinks a general re-evaluation of the relationship would be beneficial. Chairman Sanchez directs the County Manager's office to convene a meeting to start looking at what the County's interests in this matter are; what are the specific points that we would like to address and what are the nuances that we are going to have to look at in order to get a re-evaluation that is meaningful. He suggests that this meeting be conducted as soon as possible.

10. Mid-Region Council of Government Appointment(s) Ms. Ortiz speaks. She states that she reached out to Mr. Cave at MRCOG regarding their Executive Board. She reads his response into the record:

Annette.

Torrance County has two members on the MRCOG Full Board of Directors. One of those members will also serve on the Executive Board. The County usually tells MRCOG Board which of the two members they wish to serve on the Executive Board and it has typically been the Commission Chair, but doesn't have to be. The member name submitted for the Executive Board by all of the member governments will then be approved by the MRCOG Full Board.

some documentation about this, and part of that delineates the process we would follow if we were to pay for this through a CDBG planning grant. He reads the following guidelines:

- 1. County submits planning grant application to DFA Local Government Division
- 2. LGD sends letter of award to the County
- 3. Fiscal Agent MOU reviewed by the LGD, signed by the County and MRCOG
- 4. Financial Responsibility-County
- 5. Financial Responsibility- MRCOG
- 6. LGD sends grant agreement to County, County sends signed copy back to LGD
- 7. County can contract with MRCOG or other firm for professional services
- 8. If MRCOG is chosen, a scope of work will be developed with the budget and timeline
- 9. 18-months to complete and adopt the Comprehensive Plan and close out the account

Chairman Sanchez asks where we are on this timeline. Ms. Ortiz replies that she will have to look into this. Ms. Gaiser from the MRCOG was here in November of 2015 and it is Ms. Ortiz's understanding that she was in the process of getting a committee together to work on this at that time. The Commission directs the Manager's Office to look into where we are at in this planning process and where we need to go to get this plan completed. Chairman Sanchez asks the Manager's Office to provide the Commission with a plan of action on how they can proceed with this by the next Commission meeting.

13. EMT Update from Manager's Office Chairman Sanchez speaks. He states that an issue was brought up to the Commission- the need for an EMT in the Southern part of the County. He states that he would like to resolve this issue. Is it possible? And if it's not possible immediately, can we develop strategies for a long term solution? Ms. Ortiz comments that we did receive some great news today from Ms. Hanna Sanchez, who informed the Commission that there are 4 people in that area who are looking to take the EMT classes. This could mean a shorter response time, which will help with the immediate need for EMT services. Getting a paramedic in the area is still a challenge. We have heard from Superior Ambulance about approximately how much it would cost to house a paramedic in

Ms. Hanna Sanchez states that she just spoke to Fire Marshall Trumbull and he said a paramedic would cost approximately \$50,000.00 - \$60,000.00 a year. He also told Ms. Sanchez that he has been in contact with Estancia Fire Chief Gary and Chief Gary said that they would be more than willing to clear out a bay in their station and do some renovations in order to make it a housing unit and possibly move one of our Superior Units from the Moriarty area up here to Estancia. He said that this would ultimately save the County money and decrease the response time by about 30 minutes. Ms. Ortiz asks who would be responsible for paying for the renovation of the bay and would Superior be willing to move a unit. Ms. Sanchez states that she is not sure, but this could be discussed at a meeting with Estancia and Superior.

Chairman Sanchez asks for feedback about the item. Commissioner Frost comments that possibly funds generated by the 'Hold Harmless' tax could help to pay for a paramedic.

Nick Sedillo, Risk Management, comments that we need to start somewhere; we have got to say we are going to do it and let's do it. He states that we would be ignorant not to impose the 'Hold Harmless' tax. It would give us a starting point.

There is discussion about the price of a 12-hour paramedic, a 24-hour paramedic, an ambulance, housing a paramedic, etc.

Michelle Jones, resident (myself), comments that the 'Hold Harmless' tax can be enacted by ordinance and she suggests putting the ordinance on the next Commission agenda and getting this process moving forward. She also suggests putting the creation of the research committee on the next agenda. She comments about the outstanding job that Ms. Hanna Sanchez is doing and suggests that she be on this new committee.

Mr. Frank Luna, resident and concerned citizen, states that this has taken a long time, but he thinks he sees the cogs moving. He thanks the County for looking into this and trying to get it going. He thanks Ms. Sanchez and Mr. Sedillo for their information. He is in favor of a research committee and looking into the 'Hold Harmless' tax.

Nick Sedillo, Risk Management, clarifies that the 'Hold Harmless' tax is not a tax that would be imposed on property. It is a tax imposed on businesses that come in to the County, that impact the County. He explains that years ago when the Governor removed the tax on food, the 'Hold Harmless' tax was created so

can do, businesses that we want to bring in. He states that he envisions the County being the facilitator; organizing meetings, perhaps bringing in a contractor, if required, to create this plan. He also thinks that the municipalities need to come in and partner and identify for themselves what level of development they want in their communities; what infrastructure they feel they need. He envisions this as a large collaborative effort.

Chairman Sanchez states that we could inject this into the comprehensive plan, or create it as a stand-alone document; He leans towards the latter. He wants to create a document that really focuses on economic development specifically. He wants to focus on business creation and job creation. He states that we can accomplish this a few different ways. We could leverage the MRCOG and find out what they would charge and what our membership would allow us. There is also an RDG grant, (Rural Development Grant) that is offered through the USDA. This grant specifically deals with planning efforts and plans that have to do with business and job creation. He believes that the County would have a strong chance of getting this grant because we have never received it before. The USDA can provide us with some assistance in filling out the application. The other option would be the County just doing it themselves. He suggests creating a committee that might assist with developing the plan. Chairman Sanchez asks the Manager's Office to look into what kind of planning assistance we could receive from the MRCOG and the USDA. Commissioner Frost is in agreement with this.

Michelle Jones, resident (myself) suggests involving EVEDA.

Ms. Tracy Sedillo, Treasurer, comments that she believes that in the County news that EVEDA sends out, there was information about a USDA grant and she believes that the application deadline is March 31st.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme states that she is in full support of these idea. She states that she remembers when we received the CDBG grant to update the comprehensive plan, we assembled a 7 or 9 person committee to assist the MRCOG with that process. Perhaps we can involve the members of that committee. Chairman Sanchez agrees with this, but also likes the idea of spearheading this effort ourselves.

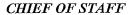

5. Protest Deadline

- 5. **Proof of Insurance.** Torrance County requires that a minimum of \$1,000,000.00 General Liability Insurance be provided. It shall be the responsibility of the successful offeror(s) submitting their proposal to include Torrance County as an additional insured.
- 6. **Necessary Licensure and Certification.** Torrance County will require the person conducting the repairs to be license as an emergency vehicle technician and be ASE certified. CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION DISCLOSURE FORM

Pursuant to NMSA 1978, 13-1-191.1 (2006), any person seeking to enter into a contract with any state agency or local public body for professional services, a design and build project delivery system, or the design and installation of measures the primary purpose of which is to conserve natural resources must file this form with that state agency or local public body. "Campaign Contribution" means a gift, subscription, loan, advance or deposit of money or other thing of value, including the estimated value of an in-kind contribution, this is made to or received by an applicable public official or any person authorized to raise, collect or expend contributions on that official's behalf for the purpose of electing the official to either statewide or local office. "Campaign Contribution" included the payment of a debt incurred in an election campaign, but does not include the value of services provided without compensation or un-reimbursed travel or other personal expenses of individuals who volunteer a portion or all of their time on behalf of a candidate or political committee, nor does it include the administrative or solicitation expenses of a political committee that are paid by an organization that sponsors the committee.

"Family member" means spouse, father, mother, child, father-in-law, mother-in-law, daughter-in-law or son-in-law.

"Pendency of the procurement process" means the time period commencing with the public notice of the request for proposals and ending with the award of the contract or the cancellation of the request for proposals.

"Person" means any corporation, partnership, individual, joint venture, association or any other private legal entity.

"Prospective contractor" means a person who is subject to the competitive sealed proposal process set forth in the Procurement Code or is not required to submit a competitive sealed proposal because that person qualifies for a sole source or a small purchase contract.

"Representative of a prospective contractor" means an officer or director of a corporation, a member or manager of a limited liability corporation, a partner of a partnership or a trustee of a trust of the prospective contractor.

RESOLUTION NO. 2017-12

RESOLUTION FINDING A DECEDENT TO BE INDIGENT OR UNCLAIMED AND AUTHORIZING PAYMENT FOR THE BURIAL OR CREMATION OF AN INDIGENT PERSON, AS DEFIND IN SECTION 24-13-2 NMSA 1978, OR OF AN UNCLAIMED DECEDNT, AS DEFIND IN SECTION 24-12-1 NMSA 1978.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 24-13-5 NMSA 1978, the Torrance County Board of Commissioners may authorize payment for the burial or cremation of an indigent person, as defined in Section 24-13-2 NMSA 1978 or of an unclaimed decedent, as defined in Section 24-13-1 NMSA 1978; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 24-13-3 NMSA 1078, the burial or cremation expenses may be paid by the County out of the general fund or the county indigent hospital claims fund in an amount up to six hundred dollars (\$600) for the burial or cremation of any adult or minor; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 24-13-1 NMSA 1978, a dead person whose body has not been claimed by a friend, relative or other interested person assuming the responsibility for and expense of disposition shall be considered an unclaimed decedent; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 24-13-5 NMSA 1978, in the County pays expenses for burial or cremation, all available assets of the decedent shall be used to reimburse the County and/or, if the decedent left an estate, the decedent's estate shall reimburse the County: and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 24-13-2 NMSA 1978, a deceased person shall be considered to be an indigent for purposes of this resolution if his estate is insufficient to cover the cost of burial or cremation; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 24-13-1 and 24-13-3 NMSA 1978, it is the duty of the Torrance County Board of County Commissioners to cause to be decently interred or cremated the body of any unclaimed decedent or indigent person known to have been a resident of Torrance County; and,

WHEREAS, Harris Hanlon Mortuary has informed Torrance County that is deceased, her body is at UNM Office of the Medical Investigator, and she is a qualified indigent person; and,

WHEREAS. is known to have been a resident of Torrance County.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Torrance County Board of Commissioners hereby:

1. FINDS:

a. That the decedent was a resident of Torrance County; and

- b. That if the decedent's estate is insufficient to cover the cost of burial or cremation, then she is an indigent decedent; and,
- c. The decedent is unclaimed.

2. AUTHORIZES:

- a. The payment, in an amount not to exceed six hundred dollars (\$600), or the burial or cremation of the body; and
- b. The Torrance County Manager to seek reimbursement from the estate for reimbursement for the burial or cremation expenses, unless the estate is insufficient to cover the cost of burial or cremation.
