Call to Order:

Chairman Sanchez calls the meeting to order at 9:08am, Felipe Lovato leads the Pledge of Allegiance and Mayor Sylvia Chavez (myself), gave the Invocation.

Approval of Minutes:

Chairman Sanchez asks for a motion to approve the minutes from the September 13th meeting. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve the September 13 2017 Regular Commission Meeting Minutes. Chairman Sanchez seconds the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Approval of Meeting Agenda:

Chairman Sanchez asks for approval of the meeting agenda. **ACTION TAKEN:**Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to approve the meeting agenda. Madam
Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Approval of Consent Agenda:

Chairman Sanchez asks for approval of the consent agenda. **ACTION TAKEN:**Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve the consent agenda. Chairman Sanchez seconds the motion. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks if there are

any indigent claims, Ms. Ortiz states that there is and the amount is \$2000.00. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

* Presentation(s):

1. 2018 NMAC Legislative Priorities

a. Resolution 2017- 043 a Resolution Supporting the 2018 Legislative Priorities of the New Mexico Assoc. of Counties

Ms. Betty Cabber presents the Commission with Resolution 2017-043, which goes over the NM Association of Counties Legislative Priorities for the 2018 Legislative Session. All 33 Counties will be presented with the same resolution, the NMAC feels that with all 33 Counties behind these priorities they have a better chance on becoming law. Ms. Cabber encourages all present to attend the legislative session to have their voices heard whether you're in support of a bill or opposed. Chairman Sanchez asks for the background on the forfeiture act, Ms. Cabberstated that this was introduced at the last legislative session but was not passed. The forfeiture act is to ensure that property of anyone being arrested is not sold or kept by any agency until the individual has been convicted. Documentation hereto attached. ACTION TAKEN: Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to approve Resolution 2017-043 Supporting the 2018 Legislative Priorities of the NM Assoc. of Counties, Commissioner Frost seconds the motion. Madam Commissioner DuCharme wants clarification on the details of the priorities, she verifies that each county will vote on this resolution. She would have liked to have seen more details on the priorities, Ms. Cabber lets Madam Commissioner DuCharme know that if she has any questions or needs more information she can always call Steve Copelman with the Assoc. of Counties or contact her for more information. Madam Commissioner DuCharme also states that she would like to have these priorities on separate resolutions, she may want to support one but not all of them. Ms. Cabber mentions that she has a board of Directors meeting on October 13th and she will let the board know of Madam Commissioner DuCharme's concerns.

<u>Michael Godey</u> states that as a Commission you have the right to vote on these as you see fit, so if you wanted to vote on them all together or individually you can. <u>Dan DeCosta</u> would like to know what the intent of the bill is, is it to change the law or support forfeiture without convictions.

<u>Linda Jaramillo</u> gives a brief description of the election law act, this act would combine all elections, Municipal, School, Conservation Districts and all into one

election on the odd years. Ms. Jaramillo voted against this at the Clerk's affiliate meeting. She is thinking for constituents it may be too confusing and would prefer that they stay as is.

No further discussion, Commission votes, 2 in favor Madam Commissioner DuCharme opposed. **MOTION CARRIED.**

2. Document Solutions-Marcos Chavez

a. Lease between Torrance County Sheriff's Department and Document Solutions

a. Department Updates:

<u>Tracey Master, DWI Coordinator</u>- has received a fully executed copy of the grant agreement from DFA. She has been working with local elementary schools, will be helping with Estancia's red ribbon week. She will be having training on Saturday's for mental health training. The class is limited to 10 spaces and the cost of the training is \$10.00 per person. The 6th annual dance under the stars was a great success, largest turn out they have had.

<u>Dan DeCosta-Code, Enforcement-</u> Planning and Zoning has received grant funding for Tire amnesty and illegal dumping, which the MOU's are on the agenda for approval by the Commission.

Lester Gary, Torrance County Fire Chief- has completed the tour of all the fire departments in the County with County Manager Garland. Everything went well. There are 2 departments that have issues. There needs to be a new well at district 5 and there is a bat problem at the Duran Fire station. Chief Gary is working on the reorganization of the fire departments. Has had meetings with the local municipalities' fire departments. The fire department vehicles have been stripped and he is working with HR on job descriptions. He is also looking into updated MOU's with the municipalities. Has had 2 chiefs meeting since coming on

as the County Fire Chief. Commissioner Frost thanks Chief Gary for a great update, Madam Commissioner DuCharme also thanks Chief Gary for a very eloquent update. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks Chief Gary about purchasing washers & dryers for the departments. Chief Gary mentions that the machines they will purchase are called "extractors" and he will be buying a set for the north part of the county as well as a set for the south part of the County but for now they have the solvent to wash their uniforms.

Martin Lucero, Emergency Manager- will be planning on doing a Winter Storm exercise soon. He was able to do a flooding exercise in August that covered the Estancia area, everything went well with that exercise. Mr. Lucero is looking into getting grant funding to put fences around the Sheriff's office as well as at Dispatch for security measures. A representative from Homeland Security came down and inspected our building for vulnerability, so Mr. Lucero should be getting those results soon and will share them with the Commission.

d. Commission Update:

<u>District #1:</u> Commissioner Frost would like to thank the Road Department for all of their hard work on the road repairs in district 1 & 2. He has gotten a lot of calls about the repairs and the people are happy with the roads. So thank you road department.

<u>District #2:</u> Madam Commissioner DuCharme reads a thank you card she received from CoreCivic/CCA. She would like to thank them for being good neighbors for 27 years. Madam Commissioner DuCharme is helpful that the facility will be used in the future.

6. Review by Commission Petition to Permit the Location of Polling Place Outside Precinct Boundaries & Review of Order to Permit the

Location of Polling Place Outside Precinct Boundaries-Linda Jaramillo, County Clerk

Ms. Linda Jaramillo presents the Commission with the petition and information on the order going to District Court. The Court will be petitioned to have a precinct moved outside of its boundaries, precinct 10 which was at the Mountainair High School Gymnasium will be moving into precinct 9's boundaries. Ms. Jaramillo will also be moving the Catholic Center polling place to the Dr. Saul Community building. This is within precinct 9 so it does not need a petition or court order. Ms. Jaramillo feels that having both precincts in the same location will be more convenient for the voters in the Mountainair precincts. The Town of Mountainair has installed a handicap ramp, the hand rails will be installed soon so that the facility will be ready for next year's primary election in June. Documentation hereto attached. ACTION TAKEN: Commissioner Frost makes a motion to support the petition to move precinct 10 out of its boundaries and moved into precinct 9's boundaries at the Dr. Saul Community Center. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks if there will be notification for voters about the move, Ms. Jaramillo states that she will inform. the voters of the change before the election and will have signs at the old polling places on Election Day. No further discussion, all in favor. MOTION CARRIED.

13. Partial Closure of Marty Road-Felipe Lovato, Resident

. 10 th.

Mr. Felipe Lovato resident of Abo comes before the Commission today to request partial closure of Marty Rd. Mr. Lovato gives a brief history of the property along Marty Rd, the land is either owned by Mr. Chilton, the Lovato's or is state owned. Mr. Lovato leases the land from the state for his cattle and the cow trail that is on the property is not a public easement. He has been told by the state that it is up to Mr. Lovato to keep trespassers out of the land. There has been people on the road that have thrown their trash along the road and have broken into properties off of Marty Rd. Mr. Lovato states that on Labor Day weekend there was a vehicle abandoned on private property. Mr. Lovato is here today to ask the Commission to close that portion of Mary Rd that is a county road. Commissioner Frost states that there is a process in which this needs to be done, there will be a committee that will need to be appointed and thinks that it can get done at the next meeting if that is what the Commission decides. Ms. Annette Ortiz said that they can put this on the next meeting agenda. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks how many residents live on this 7/10ths of a mile off of Marty Rd. Mr. Lovato states

that he is the only one that lives on that portion of the road. His brother (who passed away last year) has a house past his residents but no one lives there. Madam Commissioner DuCharme mentions that there has been some concerns about some of the gates that have been put up on the 2 miles that have been vacated by the Commission previously on Marty Rd. Mr. Lovato said that everyone that had signed the petition to close that portion of Marty Rd were all ok with the road being closed. Mr. Leonard Lujan comes to the podium to state that this is the reason why the road closure policy was put into place, so that everyone in the area will be notified and aware of the closure. County Manager Garland asks if the residence of Mr. Lovato's brother is sold can or will they be land locked and the answer was no. **ACTION TAKEN:** Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to start the process on the partial closure of Mary Rd. Commissioner Frost seconds the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

7. Memorandum of Understanding between Torrance County & EVSWA for Illegal Dumping Clean-up Service & Dumpster Rental-Dan DeCosta, Code Enforcement Officer

Mr. DeCosta presents the Commission with an MOU with EVSWA for Illegal Dumping Clean-up. There are a few changes from the MOU we had in place. Documentation hereto attached. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve the MOU for Illegal Dumping Clean-up & Dumpster Rental. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

8. Memorandum of Understanding between Torrance County & EVSWA for Tire Amnesty Services & Fees-Dan DeCosta, Code Enforcement Officer

Mr. DeCosta presents another MOU with EVSWA for Tire Amnesty, this is for the whole County to include municipalities as well. This MOU does have a change in the amount of tires allowed, only 9 tires can be brought in a load. Documentation hereto attached. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve the MOU with EVSWA for Tire Amnesty. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

9. Resolution 2017-048 Directing Torrance County Employees to Obtain National Incident Management System (NIMS Incident Command System) (ICS) Training-Martin Lucero, Emergency Manager Mr. Martin Lucero presents the Commission with Resolution 2017-048. This resolution will ensure that all County employees train in NIMS. This will help personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management. Documentation hereto attached. ACTION TAKEN: Chairman Sanchez makes a motion to approve Resolution 2017-048 Directing Torrance County Employees to Obtain National Incident Management

System. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks who in the County needs to receive the training, Mr. Lucero stated that all employees need to do the training, elected officials do not have to but it is recommended that they do the training as well. This training will help the County compete and receive funding from Homeland Security. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Mr. Leonard Lujan is asking the Commission to approve the letters of extension for the state projects. No further discussion, all in favor. **MOTION CARRIED.**

11. Architect Contract for Counter Remodel Project-Tracy Sedillo, Treasurer

Ms. Tracy Sedillo informs the Commission that the cost for the Architect for the counters came in higher than anticipated, it's within the allotted amount allocated by the Commission but the amount puts it over the amount per the procurement process, so we will have to go out for bid. Ms. Sedillo would like to use the design done by the Architect for the bid process. Documentation hereto attached. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to approve the

Architect contract for the counter remodel project. Madam Commissioner DuCharme seconds the motion. Chairman Sanchez recommends that we wait for this project to be done until we find out what happens with CoreCivic. Ms. Sedillo mentions that the money allocated for this project was from infrastructure monies and that money cannot be used for anything else. This project will also help our offices become ADA compliant.

Ms. Linda Jaramillo states that in the 20 years she has been in office there have been few instances that we have had to deal with few irate customers but with things the way they are nowdays it would be in the County's best interest to protect all of their employees. No further discussion, Commission Votes, 2 in favor Chairman Sanchez against. MOTION CARRIED.

County Manager Garland presents this ratification for internet upgrade at the PMS medical center in Mountainair. They are needing this upgrade to help with their medical billing and patient reporting. Madam Commissioner DuCharme asks if the County owns the building, County Manager Garland responded yes the County owns the building. Documentation hereto attached. **ACTION TAKEN:** Madam Commissioner DuCharme makes a motion to approve the Ratification of Building Agreement for PMS, Internet Upgrade with Century Link. Commissioner Frost seconds the motion.

<u>Hank Van Es, resident</u>-he has had issues with Century Link and asks if there is another provider the County can use or look into. No further discussion, all in favor. **ACTION TAKEN.**

16. Review & Approval of First Amendment to Contract Between Torrance County & CoreCivic

County Manager Garland asks the Commission table this item. **ACTION TAKEN:** Commissioner Frost makes a motion to table the First Amendment to Contract Between Torrance County & CoreCivic. Chairman Sanchez seconds the motion. No further discussion, all in favor. **ITEM TABLED.**

County Manager reads her report:

She has toured the County Fire Departments with Fire Chief Gary, met with the New Fire Chief of Moriarty as well. Attended a meeting at Magistrate Court for Justice Partners. Spoke with our new auditing firm Hinkle and Landers. Finance Director Amanda Tenorio & Kathryn Hernandez attended training with Triadic which is the financial software program the County uses. Attended hearing on pending litigation. Is continuing to work with Department heads on any issues and is still learning the day to day operational procedures for the County. 14. Review Proposed Revision & Amendment to Ordinance 94-12 Section 13.E 7 Resolution 2016-18A

a. Amendment Wording Change

Mr. Steve Guetschow, Planning and Zoning director gives a recap from the last Commission meeting. Mr. Dan DeCosta has been verifying vacant land exemptions for the EVSWA (Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority). With some of

the comments from people who were protesting the charge on vacant land exemptions due to them only living on the property part time, we need a true definition of "vacant land". In order for our code enforcement officer to enforce our ordinance with the current provisions and for those provisions be upheld in court we need that definition. The vacant land exemptions are checked biannually and that is a lot of man hours in the field for Dan. Steve reads Ordinance 94-12 Solid Waste Ordinance Section 13.E for the record. Mr. Guetschow has prepared two (2) different draft proposals to amend the ordinance, Section 13.E. One of the drafts would eliminate the vacant land exemption and the other outlines what Resolution 2016-18A details for vacant land exemptions. Drafts hereto attached

Since the fall of 2016 Dan has verified 152 vacant land exemptions up until the Commission asked him to suspend the inspection of these exemptions. Steve does a quick calculation of lost revenues, which the monthly fee is \$19.21 a month, for a year. The loss in revenue is \$35,039.04. Mr. Guetschow asks if the Commission has any questions for him regarding the proposed amendments.

<u>Chairman Sanchez</u> goes over the proposed amendments for clarification and the recommendation from Planning and Zoning which is to eliminate the vacant land exemption. Mr. Guetschow states that not having the exemption is what Code Enforcement prefers due to the difficulty proving the vacant exemption. If EVSWA would have a time limit on the exemption forms they may be a little helpful for Dan to do the exceptions, this way he would have all the names and addresses to inspect and have time to work on them instead of getting them on a monthly basis.

<u>Dan DeCosta, Code Enforcement Officer</u> informs the Commission that he gets anywhere from 10-12 exempt files to inspect on a monthly basis. He believes there are 300-400 exempt accounts.

<u>Danette Cabber-EVSWA</u> tells the Commission that there are 489 vacant exempt accounts on file, which is a loss of \$118,000.00 annually. There are over 4000 accounts with EVSWA and 75% of those accounts are paid.

Art DuCharme-resident explains that he has a vacant land that he has paid on before this exemption and now he pays nothing. He had asked the authority

before why he was being charged and the response he got from them was that it was due to account maintenance fee. In the past customers were asked to sign an affidavit attesting to the vacancy by Mr. Ellis who was the manager of EVSWA why is Code Enforcement involved with this now. People are being threatened of going to court if Code enforcement is not allowed on their property.

Ron DeLashmutt is a Bernalillo County resident but has recently purchased two properties in Torrance County off of foreclosure. He has filed a vacant exemption because there is no waste being created at this residences. If he produces any waste he takes it with him to Bernalillo County and disposes of it there.

Mike (last name not audible and did not sign in) is confused on the vacancy price, he asks if the County is the one that sets the price for the fee. The Commission answers, yes. He believes that the County is helping generate funding for the Authority and feels that the Authority should place a salary cap on their Administration. He feels that closing on Sunday may help the Authority save money because it seems to him that the bottom line here is money. He suggests that EVSWA should get a list of property owners from the County and use that system to check to see who has vacant land and who doesn't. Mike feels that this process should be done just like when getting propane, only get billed when you need it. He hopes that the Commission recognizes what is being said here today and makes the right decision for the County and their residents.

<u>Hank Van Es</u> from the legal perspective Ordinance 94-12 states actual state statues allowing Counties to charge for waste services. In section 3 E & F, it states that only the users of the service can and will be charged. He believes the elected officials here are in breach of their oath of office. Nothing trumps a state statue, the Commission has power over county owned property but nothing else, not over private property. Therefore Planning and Zoning has no authority on private property.

<u>Madam Commissioner DuCharme</u> states that the amended ordinance charges a fee to those people who use a private hauler.

Michael Godey this whole hearing came about when a resident came forward for a fee being charged and the deliverance of that charge.

Charlene Guffey explains that prior to the amendment the charge was \$10.00 a quarter for vacant land. Ms. Guffey asks Dan of all the exemptions he inspected how many were actually not vacant. Dan answered that there were about 5 or 6 out of the 152. Ms. Guffey expresses the need for no exemptions at all, the users of the service should not be responsible or pick up the slack for everyone else.

<u>Clement Austin</u> asks what the management salaries are at EVSWA, someone from the audience stated \$75,000.00, Mr. Austin did some research and the average salary for Torrance County is \$35,000.00 he believes that EVSWA could save money by cutting salaries from management.

John Lindsey of Little John's Towing feels that the Authority should make adjustments for those who are abusing the system and hold them accountable, not everyone else. Mr. Lindsey informs the Commission that he was turned away at one of the stations because they were full, so he wonders if he will get charged more the next time he goes because his load will be bigger. Mr. Lindsey believes the Commission has a hard decision to make but it must be done.

Michael Godey reminds the Commission that this public hearing today is to define what vacant means.

Madam Commissioner DuCharme reads a portion from the ordinance, she asks Dan what part of the ordinance gives him permission to go onto private property and asks Dan why he is doing more than his job description. Madam Commissioner asks Dan to do his job and follow what the ordinance says but she also mentions that she does not agree with some of the wording in the ordinance.

<u>Dan DeCosta</u> explains that there is another section in the ordinance that gives him the authority to check properties and reminds the Commission that inspecting property has always been done. EVSWA used to do this before and they asked for code enforcements help. Mr. DeCosta explains that he is only enforcing the County's ordinance, he never went on private property he was viewing the property from the road. Mr. DeCosta states that the ordinance defines what vacant is but someone needs to determine the definition of vacant. Mr. DeCosta

explains that there are times that he has to use his judgement on some of these exemptions and if residents feel that he is wrong, then the resident has the opportunity to challenge his decision.

<u>Dennis Wallin</u> explains to the Commission that anything Mr. DeCosta views from the road that is suspicious or as probable cause gives him the authority to go on private property. Mr. DeCosta can either get permission from the land owner or get a court order to go on private property. He reminds the Commission that if they do not like this Ordinance, they have the authority to change it.

<u>County Manager Garland</u> asks the Commission how do we verify vacant land exemptions. Ms. Garland reads the definition of vacant from the Webster dictionary online.

Commissioner Frost has heard from the public and would like to give his opinion. He feels that he is to blame for the discounts, he spoke with a lot of residents and heard what they had to say and that is why he asked for the fee to be removed on vacancy properties. Commissioner Frost feels that you should be able to tell when a house is vacant, people may have furniture in the house even have electricity but you can tell if no one lives on the property. If there is trash or waste on the property then you know that someone is living on the property.

<u>Betty Cabber</u> tells the Commission to keep it simple and judgement must be used on these decisions.

<u>Steve Guetschow</u> explains that someone has to define what utility and furnishing means to the ordinance.

<u>Chairman Sanchez</u> said we have to decide what vacant means, there are a lot of questions in the middle of the definition which can muddle the definition. He would like to see Commissioner Frost's thoughts in writing. Chairman Sanchez believes this has become more difficult than perceived which may move the Commission to eliminate the vacant exemption. Madam Commissioner DuCharme would like to help Commissioner Frost with the definition.

<u>Brent Myrick</u> feels that Mr. DeCosta has enough to do with his county job, why is he doing the inspections for EVSWA. Madam Commissioner DuCharme answered that Mr. DeCosta is enforcing the County's ordinance.

Chairman Sanchez states that there is some more work that needs to be done on the definitions and would like to see Commissioner Frost's and Madam Commissioner DuCharme thoughts and definitions in writing and discuss the definition at another meeting.

Adjourn

Meeting adjourned at 3:55 pm

GRANT AGREEMENT

This grant agreement is between the New Mexico Department of Transportation (**Department**) and County of Torrance (**Grantee**), collectively referred to as "the Parties." The Department and the Grantee agree as follows:

- 1. Award. The Department hereby awards the Grantee funding for the following projects:
- a. Buckle Up ("BKLUP")/Click It or Ticket ("CIOT"), Project No. 18-OP-RF-103, \$1,475.00;
 - b. Selective Traffic Enforcement Program ("STEP")/100 Days and Nights of Summer ("DNOS"), Project No. 18-ST-RF-103, \$2,675.00;
 - c. Total Funding awarded per this agreement \$4,150.00.
- **2. Scope of Work.** The Grantee shall perform the professional services stated in the following exhibits: **Exhibit B** BKLUP/CIOT and **Exhibit C** STEP/DNOS.
- 3. Payment. To be reimbursed for eligible expenses, the Grantee must submit timely, properly prepared reimbursement requests as provided in the Department's Traffic Safety Bureau Financial Management Manual June 22, 2016. The Grantee acknowledges that the Department will not pay for any expenses incurred prior to both Parties signing the agreement, after termination of the agreement, or in excess of the amount of the award noted in section 1. The Grantee must submit its final reimbursement request no later than thirty days after termination of this agreement, unless otherwise approved by the Department.
- 4. Records and Audit. The Grantee shall strictly account for all receipts and disbursements related to this agreement. The Grantee shall record costs incurred, services rendered and payment received, and shall maintain these financial records during the agreement and for three years from the date of submission of the final reimbursement request. On request, the Grantee shall provide the financial records to the Department and the state auditor, and shall allow the Department and the state auditor to inspect or audit these financial records during business hours at the Grantee's principal office during the term of this agreement and for three years from the date of submission of the final reimbursement request. If the financial records provided by the Grantee are insufficient to support an audit by customary accounting practices, the Grantee shall reimburse the Department for any expense incurred related to the insufficient documentation within thirty days of written

notice from the Department. If an audit or inspection reveals that funds were used for expenses not directly related to the project, or otherwise used inappropriately, or that payments were excessive or otherwise erroneous, the Grantee shall reimburse the Department for those funds or payments within thirty days of written notice.

- **5. Officials Not to Benefit.** The Parties intend that no member of the New Mexico legislature or the United States Congress, or any public official, public employee or tribal council member, in that person's individual capacity, will benefit from this agreement.
- **6. Termination.** The Department may terminate this agreement for any reason, by giving the Grantee thirty days written notice. The Grantee may only terminate this agreement based on the Department's uncured, material breach of the agreement. On receipt of a "Notice of Cancellation," the Grantee shall suspend work unless otherwise directed by the Department in writing. The Parties acknowledge that termination will not nullify obligations incurred prior to termination.
- **7. Appropriations.** The Grantee acknowledges that:
 - a. this agreement is contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorizations being made by the Congress of the United States or the New Mexico state legislature;
 - b. if sufficient appropriations and authorizations are not made, this agreement will terminate upon written notice by the Department to the Grantee; and
 - c. the Department will not expend any funds until they are approved for expenditure, and the Department's determination as to whether approval has been granted will be final.
- **8. Compliance with Law.** The Grantee, its employees, agents and contractors, shall comply with the following:
 - a. Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, the Environmental Justice Act of 1994, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, and 49 C.F.R. Section 21;
 - b. all federal and state laws, rules, and regulations, and executive orders of the Governor of the state of New Mexico pertaining to equal employment opportunity, including the Human Rights Act, NMSA 1978, Sections 28-1-1 through 28-1-15 (In accordance with such, the Grantee states that no person, on the grounds of race, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, spousal affiliation, serious medical condition, age or handicap, will be excluded from employment with or participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to, discrimination in any activity performed under this agreement. If the Grantee it is found to be in violation of any of these requirements, the Grantee shall take prompt and appropriate steps to correct such violation);
 - c. state laws applicable to workers compensation benefits for the Grantee's employees, including the Workers' Compensation Act, NMSA 1978, Sections 52-1-1 through

52-1-70, and related regulations; and

- d. 2 C.F.R. 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, Sections 200.500 200.521.
- e. those sections in **Exhibit D** labeled "applies to subrecipients as well as states."
- **9. Notices.** For a notice under this agreement to be valid, it must be in writing; be delivered by hand, registered or certified mail return receipt requested and postage prepaid, fax or e-mail; and be addressed as follows:

- **10. Severability.** The Parties intend that if any provision of this agreement is held to be unenforceable, the rest of the agreement will remain in effect as written.
- 11. Tort Claims. The Parties intend that (1) immunity from liability for tortious conduct under NMSA 1978, Section 41-4-4(A) will apply to all conduct relating to this agreement, (2) only the waivers of immunity from liability under NMSA 1978, Sections 41-4-4 through 41-4-12 will apply, and (3) this agreement does not waive immunity from liability for tortious conduct relating to this agreement of any employee of the Department or the Grantee.
- 12. Jurisdiction and Venue. The Grantee acknowledges the jurisdiction of the courts of the state of New Mexico for any adversarial proceeding arising out of this agreement, and that venue for any such proceeding will be in the First Judicial District Court for the county of Santa Fe, New Mexico.
- **13. Project Responsibility.** The Grantee acknowledges that it bears sole responsibility for performing the services referred to in section 2.
- **14. Term.** This agreement takes effect October 1, 2017 or upon signature of all Parties, whichever is later. If the Grantee does not deliver the signed agreement to the Department within sixty days of the Department's signature, the agreement will be voidable by the Department. The agreement terminates at midnight on September 30, 2018, unless earlier terminated as provided in section 6 or section 7.

The recipient's DBE program, as required by CFR Part 26 and as approved by USDOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. SCOPE OF WORK, TRAINING, REIMBURSEMENT AND REPORTING

BUCKLE UP (BKLUP) and CLICK IT OR TICKET ("CIOT") Project Number: 18-OP-RF-103

- 2. Scope of Work. The Grantee shall conduct occupant protection directed enforcement patrols (ODEPs) in high crash locations identified in data compiled by local, state or federal government agencies and the Grantee's Operational Plan. The Department encourages the Grantee to accompany the ODEPs with public information, media and educational activities. ODEPs must deploy officers in high crash locations consistent with the enforcement plan for occupant protection issues. If for any reason, the ODEPs were conducted in areas not consistent with the enforcement plan, the Grantee must submit a justification with the invoice for these services. The Department may choose to deny the invoice for ODEPs based on the justification. NONDISCRIMINATION

(applies to subrecipients as well as States)

The State highway safety agency will comply with all Federal statutes and implementing regulations relating to nondiscrimination ("Federal Nondiscrimination Authorities"). These include but are not limited to:

- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d et seq., 78 stat. 252), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin) and 49 CFR part 21;
- The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, (42 U.S.C. 4601), (prohibits unfair treatment of persons displaced or whose property has been acquired because of Federal or Federal-aid programs and projects);
- Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1973, (23 U.S.C. 324 et seq.), and Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended (20 U.S.C. 1681-1683 and 1685-1686) (prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex);
- Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, (29 U.S.C. 794 et seq.), as amended, (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability) and 49 CFR part 27;
- The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, (42 U.S.C. 6101 et seq.), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of age);
- The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, (Pub. L. 100-209), (broadens scope, coverage and applicability of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, The Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, by expanding the definition of the terms "programs or activities" to include all of the programs or activities of the Federal aid recipients, sub-recipients and contractors, whether such programs or activities are Federally-funded or not);
- Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12131-12189) (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in the operation of public entities, public and private transportation systems, places of public accommodation, and certain

- testing) and 49 CFR parts 37 and 38;
- Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions To Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations (prevents discrimination against minority populations by discouraging programs, policies, and activities with disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on minority and low-income populations); and
- Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency (guards against Title VI national origin discrimination/discrimination because of limited English proficiency (LEP) by ensuring that funding recipients take reasonable steps to ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to programs (70 FR 74087-74100).

The State highway safety agency—

- Will take all measures necessary to ensure that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, disability, sex, age, limited English proficiency, or membership in any other class protected by Federal Nondiscrimination Authorities, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any of its programs or activities, so long as any portion of the program is Federally-assisted.
- Will administer the program in a manner that reasonably ensures that any of its subrecipients, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants receiving Federal financial assistance under this program will comply with all requirements of the Non-Discrimination Authorities identified in this Assurance;

- Insert in all contracts and funding agreements with other State or private entities the following clause:

 - a. To comply with all Federal nondiscrimination laws and regulations, as may be amended from time to time;
 - b. Not to participate directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by any Federal non-discrimination law or regulation, as set forth in appendix B of 49

- c. To permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as required by the State highway safety office, US DOT or NHTSA;
- d. That, in event a contractor/funding recipient fails to comply with any nondiscrimination provisions in this contract/funding agreement, the State highway safety agency will have the right to impose such contract/agreement sanctions as it or NHTSA determine are appropriate, including but not limited to withholding payments to the contractor/funding recipient under the contract/agreement until the contractor/funding recipient complies; and/or cancelling, terminating, or suspending a contract or funding agreement, in whole or in part; and
- e. To insert this clause, including paragraphs a through e, in every subcontract and subagreement and in every solicitation for a subcontract or sub-agreement, that receives Federal funds under this program.

THE DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE ACT OF 1988 (41 U.S.C. 8103)

 - O Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse

assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency.

f. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of all of the paragraphs above.

POLITICAL ACTIVITY (HATCH ACT)

(applies to subrecipients as well as States)

The State will comply with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. 1501-1508), which limits the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

POLICY ON BANNING TEXT MESSAGING WHILE DRIVING

In accordance with Executive Order 13513, Federal Leadership On Reducing Text Messaging While Driving, and DOT Order 3902.10, Text Messaging While Driving, States are encouraged to adopt and enforce workplace safety policies to decrease crashed caused by distracted driving, including policies to ban text messaging while driving company-owned or -rented vehicles, Government-owned, leased or rented vehicles, or privately-owned when on official Government business or when performing any work on or behalf of the Government. States are also encouraged to conduct workplace safety initiatives in a manner commensurate with the size of the business, such as establishment of new rules and programs or re-evaluation of existing programs to prohibit text messaging while driving, and education, awareness, and other outreach to employees about the safety risks associated with texting while driving.

SECTION 402 REQUIREMENTS

- 1. To the best of my personal knowledge, the information submitted in the Highway Safety Plan in support of the State's application for a grant under 23 U.S.C. 402 is accurate and complete.
- 2. The Governor is the responsible official for the administration of the State highway safety program, by appointing a Governor's Representative for Highway Safety who shall be responsible for a State highway safety agency that has adequate powers and is suitably
 - equipped and organized (as evidenced by appropriate oversight procedures governing such areas as procurement, financial administration, and the use, management, and disposition of equipment) to carry out the program. (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(A))
- 3. The political subdivisions of this State are authorized, as part of the State highway safety program, to carry out within their jurisdictions local highway safety programs which have been approved by the Governor and are in accordance with the uniform guidelines promulgated by the Secretary of Transportation. (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(B))
- 4. At least 40 percent of all Federal funds apportioned to this State under 23 U.S.C. 402 for this fiscal year will be expended by or for the benefit of political subdivisions of the State in

carrying out local highway safety programs (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(C)) or 95 percent by and for the benefit of Indian tribes (23 U.S.C. 402(h)(2)), unless this requirement is waived in writing. (This provision is not applicable to the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.)

- 5. The State's highway safety program provides adequate and reasonable access for the safe and convenient movement of physically handicapped persons, including those in wheelchairs, across curbs constructed or replaced on or after July 1, 1976, at all pedestrian crosswalks. (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(D))
- 6. The State will provide for an evidenced-based traffic safety enforcement program to prevent traffic violations, crashes, and crash fatalities and injuries in areas most at risk for such incidents. (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(E))
- 7. The State will implement activities in support of national highway safety goals to reduce motor vehicle related fatalities that also reflect the primary data-related crash factors within the State, as identified by the State highway safety planning process, including:
 - Participation in the National high-visibility law enforcement mobilizations as identified annually in the NHTSA Communications Calendar, including not less than 3 mobilization campaigns in each fiscal year to—
 - O Reduce alcohol-impaired or drug-impaired operation of motor vehicles; and
 - o Increase use of seatbelts by occupants of motor vehicles;
 - Submission of information regarding mobilization participation into the HVE Database;
 - Sustained enforcement of statutes addressing impaired driving, occupant protection, and driving in excess of posted speed limits;
 - An annual Statewide seat belt use survey in accordance with 23 CFR part 1340 for the measurement of State seat belt use rates, except for the Secretary of Interior on behalf of Indian tribes;
 - Development of Statewide data systems to provide timely and effective data analysis to support allocation of highway safety resources;
 - Coordination of Highway Safety Plan, data collection, and information systems with the State strategic highway safety plan, as defined in 23 U.S.C. 148(a).
 - (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(F))
- 8. The State will actively encourage all relevant law enforcement agencies in the State to follow the guidelines established for vehicular pursuits issued by the International Association of Chiefs of Police that are currently in effect. (23 U.S.C. 402(j))
- 9. The State will not expend Section 402 funds to carry out a program to purchase, operate, or maintain an automated traffic enforcement system. (23 U.S.C. 402(c)(4))

67-5-4. [Discontinuance; procedure; viewers; county-line roads.]

Whenever, in the opinion of the board of county commissioners of any county, any road or part of road then established and maintained as a public highway is not needed, or the repairs of the same are burdensome and in excess of the benefits therefrom, they may at a regular meeting appoint a board of commissioners of three freeholders of the county as viewers, to view such road or part of road, and make report thereof to the board of county commissioners at their next regular meeting, setting forth fully their finding, and if they recommend a discontinuance of such road or part of road, then the board of county commissioners may order the same vacated: provided, that if such road runs on the county line between two counties, the county commissioners of both the counties interested shall appoint viewers and the concurrence of the county commissioners of both counties shall be necessary to vacate it.

RESOLUTION	

Establishing the Solid Waste Management Fee as provided in Ordinance 94-12

WHEREAS, the county of Torrance has entered into a contract for collection and billing of solid waste services for the residents of unincorporated Torrance County, with the Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority; and,

WHEREAS, said contract with Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority identifies costs associated with providing collection and billing of solid waste services to residents of unincorporated Torrance County; and,

WHEREAS, the Torrance County Board of Commissioners does levy the Solid Waste Management Fee enacted in Ordinance 94-12, to offset the costs of solid waste services for the citizens of unincorporated Torrance County; and,

WHEREAS, the Torrance County Board of Commissioners, upon revising solid waste ordinance 94-12, does wish to grant certain discounts of the solid waste management fee to residents of unincorporated Torrance County, by resolution;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Torrance County that the Solid Waste Management Fee will hereby be established at the base rate of \$19.21 plus tax per month per billable account, and so instructs the Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority to proceed as contracted; and,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of County Commissioners instructs the Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority to offer the following discounts to County residents who qualify:

1. Any responsible party, as herein defined, may make application to the Solid Waste Authority, on forms approved by said Authority, for a reduced monthly fee as set out above, and by furnishing to the Authority with said application proof that the responsible party is an individual that qualifies for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), according to the standard of need as set forth in Sections 27-2-3 and 27-2-4 NMSA 1978, as they currently exist or may hereafter be amended. Upon approval of the application, the solid waste management fee for any such responsible person shall be 50% (Fifty Per Cent) of the established solid waste management fee.

2. Any responsible party contracting with a private hauler franchised to collect and transport solid waste within the county shall be entitled to a reduction of the established county solid waste management fee. The reduced rate is hereby set \$6.40 per month, plus tax. Proof of contract with a private hauler shall be the responsibility of the property owner, and shall be submitted biannually. If it is determined that the contract with the private hauler has been terminated, the Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority will change the billing for that property owner to the full amount.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT STILL FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of County Commissioners

Further instructs the Estancia Valley Solid Waste Authority to waive the solid waste management fee to any responsible party owning or possessing a vacant residence, upon affidavit and verification that the residence is indeed vacant. Affidavit shall be the responsibility of the property owner, and shall be submitted biannually. Any property owner falsely certifying that a residence is vacant is in violation of the Solid Waste Ordinance, and is subject to penalties set forth in Section 16.A.

Proposed Definition of "Vacant" for Ordinance 94-12, Solid Waste Ordinance Section 13.E.

Vacant is defined as: When something is without content or occupant. A dwelling with furniture by no occupant is not considered vacant, it is unoccupied. The Code Enforcement Officer will verify the vacant status of the residence through legal means with permission from the home owner or an inspection order issued by the Court. Home owners or the party responsible for the property may appeal the Code Enforcement Officer's determination to the County Commission by submitting in writing on prescribed forms obtainable from the Zoning Director upon payment of the applicable fee. Appeals not submitted within 30 days after determination shall not be considered by the County Commission.

TORRANCE COUNTY, NEW MEXICO BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

The Board of County Commissioners, having heard testimony and considered evidence at its regular meeting on August 23, 2017 considered the decision of Torrance County Planning and Zoning determination that Dennis May exceeded the limitations of his Certificate of Non-Conforming Use for his property located at #4 Turner Ridge Rd. on multiple lots in Tract D of the Bella Vista Subdivision, and enter the following Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Mr. May's property is zoned "PL."
- 2. Mr. May's property contains more than twenty-five unregistered and/or inoperable vehicles.
- 3. Mr. May's property contains several unpermitted structures containing solid waste as that term is used in the Torrance County Solid Waste Ordinance.
- 4. Mr. May's property also contains solid waste that is kept outside of structures or containers on the property.
- 5. Neither the collection of unregistered vehicles, the unpermitted structures, nor the solid waste fall under any permissive or conditional use of PL zoning under the Torrance County Zoning Ordinance, Section 10.
- 6. Mr. May's property was subject to a valid Non-Conforming Use certificate issued in October, 1990.

- 7. The Non-Conforming Use certificate allowed Mr. May to continue to use his land in the manner in which it was used prior to April, 1990 regardless of whether that use would be permitted under the Zoning Ordinance.
- 8. Mr. May expanded his use of the land beyond the use protected by his Non-Conforming Use certificate by adding additional structures, adding additional vehicles, and accumulating additional solid waste since April 1990.
- 9. The Board of County Commissioners conducted a hearing on this matter on August 23, 2017 during which it permitted sworn testimony and cross-examination of witnesses both for and against Mr. May's requested determination.
- 10. The Board of County Commissioners considered the following prior to rendering its decision:
 - A. Whether a valid Certificate of Non-Conforming Use gives a landowner the rights to expand or extend their Non-Conforming Use of their property beyond the use that existed when such certificate was issued.
- 11. The testimony and written evidence left no dispute as to the original scope of the Non-Conforming Use certificate or the fact that Mr. May's use of the property had expanded beyond the usage that existed in April, 1990.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- Section 20(D) of the Zoning Ordinance does not allow a landowner to extend the scope of a non-conforming use of their property beyond the scope that existed at the time that the Non-Conforming Use certificate was issued.
- 2. The decision of Torrance County Planning and Zoning is Affirmed.
